By R. R. Webster

R. R. Webster of Vancouver adgiris dressed a good sized audience in the C. C. F. Hall on Thursday evening on the subject of "Problems of Unity." Ex-alderman Oscar Lar-Scandinavian folk dance, girls, sen, president of the Unemployed

Mr. Webster, a clear and forceful speaker, said there were three chief obstacles to labor unitychauvinism, secterianism and opportunism. These narrowing tendencies the speaker deplored. Without breadth of vision and a willingness to sink individual prejudices for the common good labor unity was impossible. The forces of reaction could not be successfully overcome and the danger of a fascistic dictatorship was imminent. The solution of the Communist Party for the problems of labor was a united front with socialist, fraternal and cu'tural organizations of liberal tendency and thought.

Mr. Webster was well received and answered questions and criticism. A collection was taken up to defray expenses.
