What it does say is that Canada has been very strong for collective security but that one by one Canadian statesmen are coming to the conclusion that there is no lander the League of Nations but only danger.

All this has to do very much with Canada's place in the British Empire. Some people see in the anti-league movement an insidious effort on the part of unfriendly countries to undermine the strength of the British Empire by leading Canadians to believe that they would be safer if the Empire tie were cut and Canada were to become an independent nation or a part of the United States. Other people fear that Canada will be led into a war for which she has no liking as a result of the duplicity and selfishness of European statesmen who care for Canada only as a pawn in the great seething world. They say that the mass of the people of the world who are against war have scarcely any say in the matter, even in so-called democratic countries. They are all in the hands of a few leaders who can do practically as they wish and by control of the sources of information can make the people believe they are right even if they are wrong.

The question is being pondered by Canadians everywhere. There are the ultra-loyalists who are willing to follow Britain anywhere, at any time, without question. There are people who came from some European nations, who owe their allegiance elsewhere and who are strongly against British dominance in Canada. There are those whose sympathies and ties are with the United States who would like to see the country a part of the American union and there is the ever-increasing body of young men of Canadian birth who look upon Canada as their native home and hope, and who look upon outside connections with suspicion and in many cases with disfavor. Then there is always the solid French-Canadian third of the nation whose rights and privileges have been guaranteed by the British North America Act who seem to prefer to continue British but would at the same time like to be allowed to mind their own affairs without taking upon themselves any of the duties of British citizenship. All these factions were being slowly welded into a unit of the British Empire until it was suddenly called to their attention that they might have to become active citizens in defence of their rights and privileges or of somebody else's rights and privileges. Then they commenced to separate into their component parts. And the chief disintegrating factor was the fear that they might be used by some power not their own and drawn into a war not their own or of their own making and not to their liking.
