United States Chief Executive Is Swept Back into Office With Largest Endorsation in History

Popular Vote Was Two to One in His Favor While Electoral College is All But Solid For Him—Landon Carries Only Two Small States

New Deal Endorsed on Emphatic Scale

Pennsylvania Goes Into Democratic Column For First Time Since Civil War—South Stays Solid—Connecticut Also Deserts Republicans

NEW YORK, Nov. 4: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt was re-elected chief executive of the United States yesterday and given a mandate to proceed with his New Deal by the most tremendous endorsement ever given a presidential candidate in the history of the nation. Roosevelt overwhelmed his Republican opponent, Governor Alfred M. Landon of Kansas, by a popular vote approximating two to one and his majority in the electoral college was even more impressive. His triumph overshadowed the landslide on which he rode into the White House in 1932 over Herbert Hoover. Indications today, with tabulations...

Throughout the country there was an overwhelming endorsement of the New Deal candidates although possibly not on as impressive a scale as the personal victory of the President. In the wake of the Roosevelt tornado, the Democratic Party retains control of the Senate and also of the House of Representatives by overwhelming margins. The vote was so emphatic as to leave no doubt as to the attitude of the people with respect not only to the President but also to the New Deal. Never before since the Civil War has the Democratic Party won two consecutive decisive national victories.

Early in the counting it became apparent that great key states such as New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois and Ohio were going for Roosevelt and going strong. New York, despite the optimism of the Republicans, had been expected to go Democratic but it was different in Pennsylvania. For the first time since the Civil War that great industrial state went into the Democratic column. Landon failed even to carry his home state of Kansas which the most of election forecasters had conceded to him in advance. The vote there, however, was close.

The Republicans had counted upon New England for pretty solid strength and the loss of Connecticut and New Hampshire, which had withstood the Roosevelt landslide in 1932, and Rhode Island, which it had been confidently expected would return to the Grand Old Party fold, constituted a disappointment.

The Solid South remained as solidly Democratic as ever. There was not a defection anywhere. The Middle West and Far West were also solidly Democratic. The Republicans had hopes in such states as Wisconsin, Nebraska, South Dakota, Minnesota and Oregon but here again they were due for disappointment. It is believed that 45,000,000 people voted, some five million more than ever before. Landon congratulates Roosevelt. NEW YORK, Nov. 4: (CP)—In the latest popular vote figures gathered this afternoon from the whole nation, 90,389 districts out of 122,773 gave President Roosevelt 21,768,354 votes while Landon received 13,575,602.

end, Republican National Chairman John Hamilton, at a late hour, would still not concede defeat. He apparently believed that the agricultural vote might yet improve the situation for his party. As expected, the large industrial areas had gone emphatically for Roosevelt.

The support given the Lemke third party movement was negligible, its threat fading from the picture with the first trickle of returns, and the Socialist and Communist candidates fared even worse.

There was also the Democratic trend in state governorships. Some of the more outstanding individual results included the three to one re-election of Governor Lehmann, Democratic governor of New York. Senator William E. Borah was re-elected in Idaho with a comfortable majority. In Washington Governor Clarence D. Martin was re-elected over Ex-Governor Roland H. Hartley, Canadian-born former Republican governor. Vic Myers, Seattle orchestra leader, was re-elected as Lieutenant Governor. Senator E. H. McNary, Republican, was re-elected in Oregon. Senator Norris, veteran Independent, was re-elected in Nebraska.

Landslide in Washington SEATTLE, Nov. 4: (CP)—Repeating the landslide of 1932, Washington State gave President Roosevelt a plurality of more than two to one over Governor Landon, re-elected all Democratic state officials and, apparently, returned a solid Democratic delegation to Congress. In the bitter gubernatorial race, Governor Clarence D. Martin defeated Former Governor Roland H. Hartley by more than two to one.

Austrian Cabinet Resigns But Was Quickly Re-Formed

VIENNA, Nov. 4:—The entire cabinet of Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg resigned yesterday but it was quickly reorganized by the Chancellor with the elimination of three former ministers.

WILL LOOK INTO RATES

Junior Chamber of Commerce Not Satisfied with Transportation Charges

Other Business

Committees Announced at Regular Monthly Dinner Last Night

A special committee consisting of S. A. Prudhomme and Foster Willan was appointed by the Junior Chamber of Commerce at its regular monthly dinner meeting in the Knox Hotel last night, to investigate the question of alleged discrimination against Prince Rupert by transportation companies in the matter of both passenger and freight rates and to take the subject up with the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce.

A communication from the Dominion meteorological bureau at Victoria seeking information as to wireless equipped vessels travelling in waters one hundred miles off the Queen Charlotte and Vancouver Islands with a view to obtaining meteorological data from them was referred to the secretary.

Cliff Gilker reported for the radio committee that arrangements had been made with station CFPR to carry a half hour Junior Chamber of Commerce program each Friday evening at 6:45 commencing next week. They will be time available during the broadcast to publicize projects of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. S. A. Prudhomme reported on efforts that were being made to bring Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission programs into the local station. Owing to the policy of the new radio governing body having not yet been crystallized however, the matter was at present resting in abeyance. It was believed, however, that there was a good possibility of obtaining these programs.

A communication from the Japanese consulate in Vancouver requesting pictures and items of interest regarding life and industry around Prince Rupert to be sent to the Pan-Pacific Peace Exposition at Noyoga was referred to the outside publicity committee for report.

The question of having further University extension lectures here during the coming winter was referred to the committee on that subject for such action as may be found possible.

Deplorable Picture of Chinese Control in B.C. is Portrayed

Have Reduced Integrity of Courts, Made Puppets Of Judges, Undermined Legal Profession and Flouted Laws, Clive Planta Declares

VICTORIA, Nov. 4: (CP)—Speaking in the Throne Speech debate in the Legislature yesterday, Clive Planta, Peace River, said: "The Chinese have reduced our law courts to the status of kangaroo courts. They have made puppets of some of our judiciary. They have undermined the ethics of the legal profession. They have flouted the statutes of this province and the Dominion. They have defied the police of the country and they have brazenly defied municipal by-laws."

Vancouver Mill Fire

VANCOUVER — The North Shore mill and stock of the Burrard Shingle Co., valued at \$70,000, was destroyed by fire last night. Two 30,000-volt power circuits were burned out, cutting off for eight hours electric power to North and West Vancouver and Howe Sound settlements.

Edmonton Cuts Interest

EDMONTON—The City of Edmonton yesterday ordered a reduction of interest payments on all Edmonton bonds held by the province. City officials said it was in retaliation for the Aberhart government's action in cutting interest rates on its own debentures.

Effect Is Widespread

NEW YORK—Every major port in the country has become affected by the spread of the Pacific Coast marine workers' strike. Numerous industries are also involved and millions of dollars of business and payrolls are held up. Some manufacturing plants are closing down. Fighting broke out on the New Orleans waterfront yesterday and several arrests were made.

Closing On Madrid

MADRID—All citizens of Madrid have been called upon to leave their normal jobs and rally to the defence of the city. Rebel forces are reported to have advanced to within six miles of the city on the south and General Francisco Franco was threatening to enter as early as today. Reorganization of the Socialist cabinet is said to be impending.

New Trial In Murder Case

Vincent Macchione of Galloway, B.C. to Get Another Chance For Life

VANCOUVER, Nov. 4: (CP)—The British Columbia Court of Appeal today granted a new trial to Vincent Macchione of Galloway, B.C., who was to have hanged here Friday for the murder of Michael Hudock near Fernie.

CHARGED WITH TREASON

BREMEN, Nov. 4:—Lawrence Simpson, an American seaman, is being charged with treason here.

Eminent barristers of Vancouver and ill-advised decisions of some of the judiciary had enabled the Chinese to blind the authorities to prevailing conditions. Removing Taxes

The Pattullo government announces that taxes on fishermen as such will be removed at this session of the Legislature. This will affect the whole coast but particularly the men who fish in these waters because this is the most important fishing area in British Columbia.

The government realizes that the fishing industry is more or less precarious. At the beginning of the season no person can tell what the catch will be. The fisherman has nothing to do with sowing the seed or cultivating the crop. All he does is help reap the harvest and this harvest is always uncertain. The action of the government will be appreciated.

Securities Act

There seems to be general dissatisfaction in the mining district over the working of the Securities Act. Everywhere the people interested in mines and the financing of mines complain that it is impossible under present conditions to raise money for the development of good properties.

While we all realize that the public has to be protected in connection with the selling of shares in joint stock companies, yet all mining is a gamble, even more so than fishing, and people who dabble in mining stocks know that they are taking chances. It does not seem wise to retard the development of the mining areas by making it seem that mining stock investments are comparable with consuls.

While not competent to discuss the details of the law, it is evident that mining men are pretty much a unit in asking that it be repealed or modified.

The Department of Mines has done some good work in preventing misrepresentation and it is urged that this policy be continued and the public be protected in such a way as not to hinder development of the industry. Here is the way the Stewart Board of Trade puts it:

"Whereas there is a considerable body of opinion throughout the province opposed to the present 'Securities Act' and the administration thereof.

"And whereas, the said Act and its administration is found to be detrimental to and retarding the mining development of this province;

"Be it resolved that the present Act be repealed, and that it be replaced with an Act that will protect the public from misrepresentation, and where deliberate misrepresentation is found, the parties guilty thereof be given a severe jail sentence. Such Act to be drafted as to permit of bona fide mining development."

It's interesting to know when reading the Daily News that the people of the whole district are doing the same.

Timely Recipes

HONEY PUMPKIN PIE

One cup cooked pumpkin, 1/2 cup honey, 1-3 teaspoon ginger, 1-3 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 1 1/4 cups milk.

Press the pumpkin through a fine sieve, add salt, spices, and honey. Beat well. Add well-beaten egg; then the milk. Pour into a deep pie plate lined with pastry and bake at 450 degrees F. for ten minutes, then reduce heat to 325 degrees. Bake until custard is firm. Pumpkin custard is excellent for children and may be served when pie is served to adults. For the custard, use above recipe, omitting the spices. Bake in custard cups.

The esteem in which the young man was held in the community was revealed by the abundance of floral contributions.

M. Shikatan conveyed the sympathy of the Skeena Fishermen's Association. Mr. Nakagawa spoke on behalf of the parents of the Japanese community and M. Naida expressed the sympathy of the Young Men's Association of which Sadoa was a member. At the close of the service in the cemetery M. Nagami and M. Usuel at request of the parents, thanked the friends who had contributed flowers and in many other ways had shown their kind sympathy. M. Usuel spoke in English.
