PRINCE DAVID IN ANOTHER SEA MISHAP Fitty Prizes Coming

"Jonah Ship" of C.N.R. On Bermuda Reef But Is Quickly Refloated

Not Believed Seriously Damaged-Was Being Prepared To go to Halifax For Repairs and Refitting After Long Tie-up

HAMILTON, Bermuda, May 23: (CP)—Tugs straining at heavy hawsers yanked the Canadian National Steamships liner Prince David off coral reefs of Great Sound today. The liner ran aground while preparing to sail for Halifax after a lay-up of two years here. Trouble was at first experienced at the David's moorings. Then the steer-

ng gear was reported out of order. A strong wind drove her on the coral bottom before the tugs could assist. She is believed to be not seriously damaged. She is to be taken to Halifax as soon as possible for; epairs and refitting.
