# BIG MILL FOR MISSOURI ANNOUNCED

## Important Construction Project For Well Known Portland Canal Mine is Officially Made Known

### Underground Plant Will Have Daily Capacity of Five Hundred Tons—To be Installed in 200 Foot Excavation on Salmon River Side

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3:—Installation of a new underground mill at the Big Missouri mine near Stewart is announced by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. The mill will have a capacity of five hundred tons daily and will be installed in an excavation two hundred feet below the 2300 tunnel from the Salmon River side.

For the past couple of years the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. has been carrying out extensive development work at Big Missouri preliminary to permanent operation on a large scale which is now definitely assured. Only a week or so ago construction officials of the company were on the ground making final arrangements for the starting of the extensive mill construction.

It has already been announced that power for the Big Missouri mine would be taken from Anyox.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3:—Capt. Harvey G. Bowering, fire warden for the city of Vancouver, in an official statement yesterday, declared that nothing yet had developed to warrant an official inquiry into the fire which recently destroyed the Vancouver Arena and a number of adjoining buildings.

## Roosevelt Now On His Return East

Chief Executive Gives Addresses From Platform of Train At Cheyenne and Laramie

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Sept. 3:—On his way east after a trip as far as Salt Lake City where he attended the funeral of Secretary of War George Henry Dern, President Franklin D. Roosevelt passed through here yesterday. At Laramie and Cheyenne he addressed large gatherings from the rear platform of his special train. Many came for miles to hear the chief executive who was given a cordial reception.

Awaited in Washington WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 3:—Officials, admitting the seriousness of the situation and the necessity for immediate action, said yesterday that the return of President Franklin D. Roosevelt from the west was being awaited before undertaking the program of drought relief.

## Stock Market Trend Upward

Industrials, Utilities and Rails All Show Slight Gains On Wednesday

NEW YORK, Sept. 3:—The stock market showed an upward trend yesterday although it was not marked. The industrial average at closing was 166.65, up .30; rails, 54.96, up .34; utilities, 34.88, up .25. The industrial turnover amounted to 110,300 shares; rails, 138,900, and utilities, 90,000.

## Prosecutor For Fall Assizes In Vancouver Named

VICTORIA, Sept. 3:—Hon. Gordon Sloan, attorney general, yesterday announced the appointment of J. A. Russell as crown prosecutor for the Vancouver fall assizes.

## INSURGENTS MAKE GAINS

Irún, Gateway to San Sebastian, Now Appears Likely to Fall To Rebels

HENDAYE, France, Sept. 3: (CP)—Spanish rebels, in a terrific offensive against Irún, stormed and captured Mount Turiarte Heights, overlooking the city, shortly after noon yesterday and completely surrounded the strategic loyalist posts of Lapuncha and Port San Marcial. The loyalist defence of Irún, gateway to San Sebastian, appeared doomed. Indeed some reports last night said rebels had already entered Irún.

MAY RESTORE MONARCHY BURGOS, Spain, Sept. 3: (CP)—Indications of a determined movement for restoration of the monarchy if the rebels gain control of Spain was seen today following creation of the "National Carlist War Council" to co-ordinate monarchist activities in all parts of the country controlled by Fascist insurgents. The insurgent junta issued a statement, however, saying that the uprising had no political tinge beyond representing unity of Spaniards who want to save Spain from the tyranny of Moscow.

## RECREATIONAL PLAN INTRIGUES OTTAWA; EISENHARDT CALLED

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3:—Ian Eisenhardt, director of physical and recreational education for the Province of British Columbia, has been called to Ottawa to explain his plan to the National Unemployment Commission. This is taken as an indication that federal authorities are taking an interest in a project the operation of which is so far confined to British Columbia.

## SEARCHERS SEE WRECK

But No Sign of Survivors on Kenai Peninsula—Believed To Have Perished

ANCHORAGE, Sept. 3: (CP)—The wrecked plane of Pilot Steve Mills, missing since last Sunday on a flight from here to Russian River on Kenai Peninsula with five passengers, was reported sighted yesterday by a search plane piloted by Al Horning on Kenai Peninsula near Skilak Lake sixty miles south of here. There were no signs of life and it was feared those who had been on board the plane might have perished in the crash. It was impossible for the search plane to make a landing. Rescue operations are continuing, it being reported here that Horning had picked up five men at Seward with whom he was returning to the wreck today.

The plane contained two married couples and another man besides the pilot, all being from Anchorage.

## Gas Price In Vancouver Is Still Weaker

## ATLANTIC CROSSING

Harry Richman and Dick Merrill Break All Records on Round Trip Ocean Flight

LEWYCELYN, Wales, Sept. 3: (CP)—Harry Richman, screen and stage star and night club owner, and Dick Merrill, his pilot, who hopped off from New York yesterday afternoon on their attempted round trip speed flight to London and back and were sighted last night over New Brunswick, landed out of gas but safe in a field near here today.

Richman and his pilot said they had a "comfy" trip and would fly back to America right away.

The plane was undamaged when it landed 175 miles short of Croydon airrome.

The trans-Atlantic crossing took less than eighteen hours and broke all previous records.

## Nearly Missed Ship; Marine Is Hoisted Aboard

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3:—As the British cruiser Apollo was pulling away from the dock here yesterday following her visit to this port, a young marine who had been left behind dashed up. The commander, from the bridge, stopped the ship and put out the crane used in handling aircraft. The marine grabbed the hook and was swung aboard much to the interest of many spectators who were witnessing the warship's departure.

## Elderly Woman Is Badly Hurt

Mrs. M. Stevenson Not Expected To Recover From Injuries Sustained When Hit by Car

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3:—Mrs. Fanny Stevenson, aged 60, sustained a fractured skull and both legs were broken as a result of being struck by an automobile yesterday at Fraser and Twenty-Fourth. She is in a very serious condition and is not expected to recover.

## FRASER RIVER GILL NETTERS CLEAN UP MILLION DOLLARS

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3:—Fifteen hundred salmon gill-netters on the Fraser River were estimated yesterday to have cleaned up more than \$1,000,000 on this season's operations. This would be an average of about \$700 to the boat. Some boats are known to have cleared as high as \$3,000.

## Election Is Close

Liberal Returned in Burrard With Plurality of 376 Over C. C. F.

## Heavy Vote

Conservative in Third Place While Socialist Did Not Figure Seriously

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3: (CP)—Congratulating the victor in yesterday's Burrard by-election, Dr. F. T. Patterson, leader of the British Columbia Conservative party and losing candidate for that party, declared: "The result is a victory for democratic and constitutional government and a clear verdict for the two constitutional parties in Canada." It was pointed out that Liberals and Conservatives between them had piled up a total vote of almost two to one over the C. C. F.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3: (CP)—J. Howard Forester, Liberal, was elected to the British Columbia Legislature to succeed Mayor G. G. McGeer M.P. in the provincial by-election yesterday. He retained the seat for the Liberal government with a plurality of 376 votes over Dr. J. Lyle Telford, Co-operative Commonwealth Federation candidate, in a total of just over 20,000 ballots. Dr. F. T. Patterson, Conservative, was 1800 votes behind Forester in third place, Robert Walker, Socialist, received only a handful of votes and was not a factor in the contest. The final count was as follows:

Forester got an early lead as the west end of the riding counted its votes, first with Patterson a fairly close second and Telford a good third. East end returns favored Telford and went rather badly against Patterson. However Telford was not able to overcome Forester's lead although he reduced it substantially.

The first polling station to report was Lord Tennyson School which gave Forester 221, Telford 202 and Patterson 149.

A summary of west end voting was: Forester, 2607; Patterson, 2271; Telford, 2045; Walker, 10. This accounted for 54 out of 152 polling stations.

A later progress summary after east end returns had been pretty well accounted for gave Forester 7119; Telford, 6820; Patterson, 5599; Walker, 45.

Voting was slow in starting in the morning but speeded up in the afternoon.

### YESTERDAY'S ELECTION

In view of the prognostications and the line-up in the election in Burrard yesterday Premier Pattullo may feel well satisfied today as he surveys the political situation. In the first place the Liberal candidate won by a sufficiently large majority to do away with the possibility of a change from a recount, such as happened when McGeer was elected in the same area. In the second place a new candidate, little known outside the party organization, was running against two party leaders who had been before the public for years. Dr. F. T. Patterson, leader of the Conservatives, had the backing of the Province newspaper. Dr. Lyle Telford has been laying his views before the electors for years and he had the backing of the Communists. Yet he received little more than one-third of the vote.

It must also be remembered that Burrard was supposed to be the government's weak spot. It was charged that the government was so fearful of losing that it delayed bringing on the election and even went so far as to make a temporary change in the election law to enable the delay. It was also generally reported in the north that the Pattullo government was dead insofar as Vancouver was concerned and that if there were a general election it would not win a single seat.

The fact that the government candidate got less than half of the votes means little. If Forester received less than a majority, the leader of each of the other parties received less. Had there been no Conservative in the field, there would have been a different tale to tell and so would it have been different had there been no C. C. F. candidate in the field. The reason the government man did not get a majority vote was because there were so many candidates in the field.

### CONSERVATIVE SENTIMENT GROWING

One of the features of the election was the indication of a growth of Conservative sentiment in the province. Since the Conservative collapse under Dr. Tolmie, when the party was practically wiped out, they had not been a factor in elections but yesterday they showed a decided comeback.

For the C. C. F. it must be admitted that they do not seem to have suffered much from the Connell defection. They are still a strong factor to be reckoned with in British Columbia politics.

## RACE IS TIGHTER

New York Giants Lose While Both Cardinals and Cubs Win On Wednesday

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 3. (CP)—The National League pennant race tightened up again yesterday when the leading New York Giants lost to second place St. Louis Cardinals in a close contest while the third place Chicago Cubs were shutting out the Brooklyn Dodgers. The lead of the Giants over the Cards was reduced to three full games with the Cubs but one game behind the Cardinals.

In the American League the New York Yankees lost a close one to the second place Cleveland Indians, their margin of leadership being pared to 16 games. The Washington Senators lost to Detroit Tigers and dropped out of fourth place in which they had been tied with the Chicago White Sox who lost yesterday. The St. Louis Browns won in a slugging contest with the Philadelphia Athletics who dropped below them into the cellar.

## YACHT RACE DATES SET

First For America's Cup July 24, Although New York Yacht Club Would Like Later Date

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—The first race for the America's Cup between T. O. M. Sopwith's British challenger Endeavor II and a United States defender will be held on July 24, 1937.

This is confirmed by officials of the New York Yacht Club, who are bound under the mutual consent clause to agree to the dates set by the challenger.

It is understood club officials would have preferred a later date because at least one defence candidate, a boat being built by a syndicate headed by Harold Stirling Vanderbilt, skipper of the Rainbow in the last series for the cup, and the winner, is still in the blueprint stages.

The Endeavour was launched some weeks ago in England and has been sailing extensively all summer.

## SPORT CHAT

Jimmie Dunn, snapback of Hamilton Tigers, Eastern Canada football champions, was born in Hamilton 25 years ago yesterday. A product of the City League of the Ambitious City, Dunn joined the Bengals in 1934 after playing with Tiger Cubs in the Ontario Union. 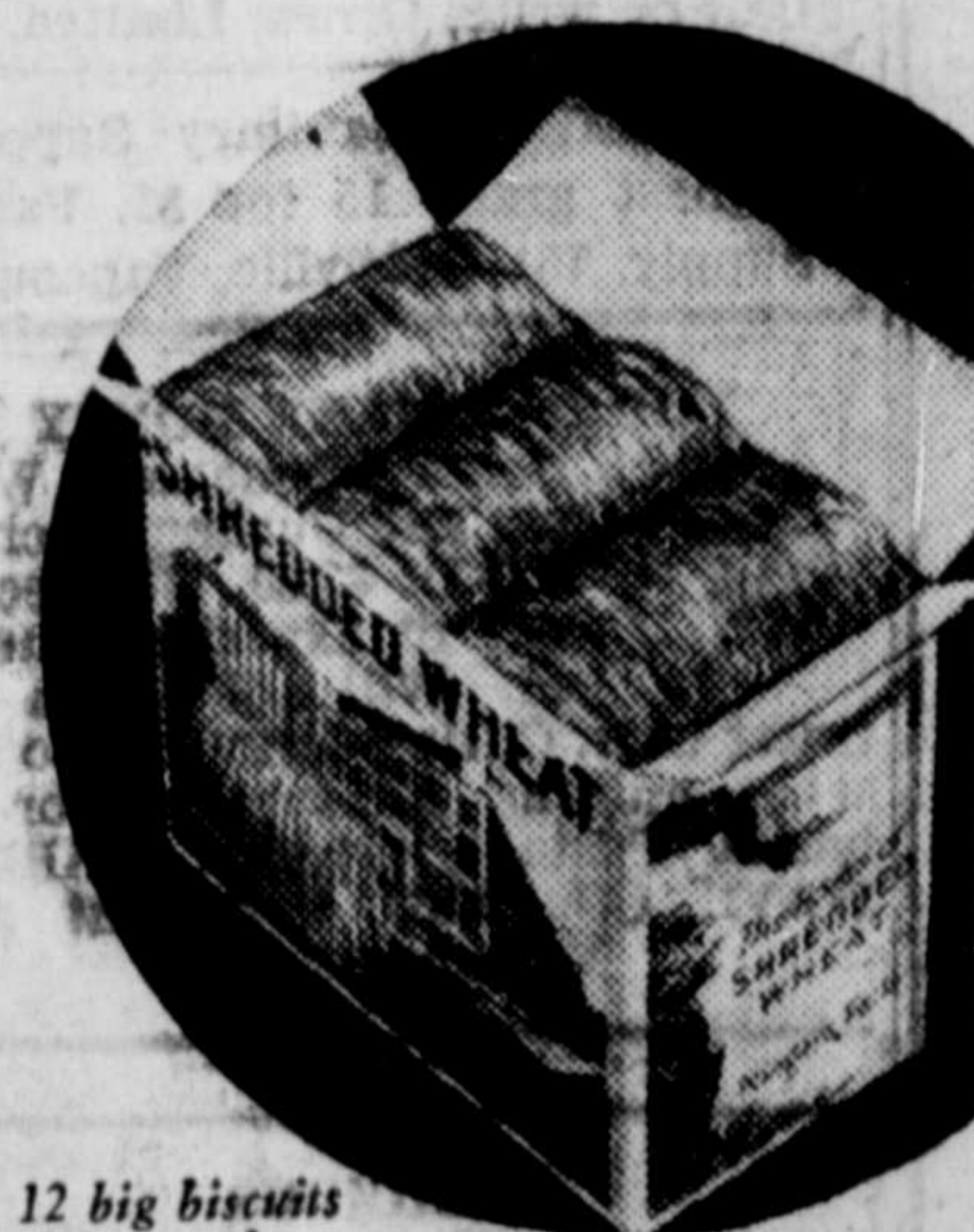

## BIG MUSIC FILM HERE

### Spectacular "Follow the Fleet" Is Coming For Last Half of Week To Local Theatre

"Follow the Fleet," an adaptation of two famous plays "Hit the Deck" and "Shore Leave" with music by Irving Berlin, and Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers, the noted screen dancing team, heading the cast, comes to the screen of the Capitol Theatre here Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week. It is the story of gobs and girls when the fleet's in. ## TO VISIT FAR EAST

### Canadian Goodwill Tour Leaving Victoria January 19

VICTORIA, Sept. 3.—Business men from all sections of Canada will participate in the trade mission and goodwill tour to the countries of the Far East, sponsored by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, and scheduled to leave here January 19 next year aboard R. M. S. Empress of Asia.

George I. Warren, secretary of the Victoria Chamber of Commerce, has been advised that the trade mission will travel to Hongkong by the Empress of Asia via Yokohama, Kobe, Nagasaki and Shanghai.

From Hongkong the party will sail by the ss. Hakusan Maru for Singapore, where they will entrain for Penang, Bangkok and Aranya Prades, thence by automobile to Angkor. From Angkor they will motor to Phnom-Penh and on to Saigon.

At Saigon the mission will embark on a Messageries Maritimes steamship for Hongkong, from where they will make a side trip to Canton.

The return journey will be made from Shanghai, March 21, by R. M. S. Empress of Canada, arriving back here April 7.
