

British Fighters Lined Up Ready For "Bombing Raid" on London



When 72 bombing aeroplanes raided London recently they were met by these 72 fighting aeroplanes. In the maneouvres that followed in the sham battle, bombers and fighters hurtled recklessly over London. Britain's drastic re-armament program totals more than one-fourth her total budget this year. In turning out thousands of new aeroplanes like those shown above at Hornchurch, automobile factories have found it more profitable than the manufacture of motor cars.

CASE WAS NOT FAIR

Governor of New Jersey Still Far From Satisfied With Hauptmann Trial

TRENTON, N.J., March 28: (CP)-Governor Harold G. Hoffman said yesterday that the whole Hauptmann case "reeks with unfairness, passion and prejudice."

The governor also said that he was "more firmly convinced than ever that Hauptmann had not been given a fair trial in line with what we consider to be American standards of justice."

Bruno Richard Hauptmann stands sentenced to be electrocuted next Tuesday night for the kidnap-murder of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr.

A goodly number of people gathered at the Pentecostal Assembly last evening to enjoy the lecture given by the Rev. N. A. Harkness, B.A., B.D., secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society for B.C. from Vancouver. The lecture, entitled "The World's Best Seller." was accompanied by a fine set of lantern slides while the lecturer told of how, during the last six years of depression, the number of Scriptures circulated was over sixty-seven millions and the new translations during that period numbered seventy-four. In the last 132 years, since the formation of the Bible Society, five hundred million copies had been printed and circulated in as many as 980 different languages.
