BRUSSELS, Belgium, Oct. 26: -Leon Degreille, Leader of the Rexist Fascist party of Belgium, and 800 followers were arrested and 76 were injured in wild dis-

TOUCHES NEAR BELLA BELLA SEATTLE-The Alaska Steamship Co.'s ,freighter Latouche struck a rock near Bella Bella today and is taking water in the fuel tanks. After inspection, she proceeded toward Seattle, the company reported.

CHINESE GOVERNOR SLAIN HANKOW-General Yang Yun Tai, Governor of Hupeh Province and right-hand man of General Chiang Kai Shek, was assassinated yesterday as he left a reception given by Paul Joslin in the United States consulate at Hankow. Yang had come across the river from his own seat at Woochow to attend the reception. Fifty-six years of age, he was believed to be a Japanese! sympathizer. Chen Hsien Chao, a twenty-year old Chinese patriot, is being held. Motive of the assassination is believed to be political.

So Say Both Mussolini and Hitler -They Believe in Security Though

BOLOGNA, Italy, Oct. 26:-Addressing a huge gathering of Fascists Saturday night in Bologna almost on the same spot where his assassination had been attempted en years ago, Premier Benito Musolini declared that Italy was holding out the olive branch of peace to Europe out of a forest of eight imillion bayonets well sharpened and held by Fascist youths. While Italy had taken the necessary steps to ensure its own security, Il Duce thundered out that peace was the aim of himself and his country.

Parley in Berlin BERLIN, Oct. 26: (CP)—Peace by security was declared to be the keynote of a conference at Berlin on Saturday between Reichsfeuhrer Adolf Hitler and Count Ciano. lemissary of Premier Mussolini, as a result of which Germany's fornal recognition of the annexation of Ethiopia by Italy was announced. The spirit of goodwill and understanding which was being built up between Italy and Germany, it was suggested, would be one of the greatest bulwarks for peace in chaotic Europe, for the maintenance of which both nations were so desirous.

Mussolini's envoy, his son-inlaw, expressed admiration for everything he had seen in Germany during his visit.

Germany on Saturday officially recognized annexation of Ethiopia, climaxing a "concrete and definite" Italo-German accord and bringing together the two strong Fascist-Nazi nations. It is predicted Austria and Hungary will follow suit.

Spanish Capital Being Starved Out-Foreign Diplomats Get Ready to Leave

RUSSIA BLAMED

Portugal Charges Moscow With Trying to Incite Red Revolution

BURGOS, Spain, Oct. 26:-Joining forces on several sectors, the Fascist insurgents were reported today to be continuing their steady advance towards Madrid on a combined line of fifty miles length within 20 miles of the capital Fascist troops overwhelmed strong forces of government defenders north of Aranjuez, strategic centre thirty

miles south of Madrid. Four roads leading to Madrid are under complete control of the rebel forces, it is stated, and, with the line of communications and supplies cut off, a deplorable condition on account of lack of food and supplies is said to be developing. Some of the residents, it is asserted, are already facing starvation. At Burgos the Fascist provisional government claimed yesterday that Madrid was completely isolated and predicted it would be captured within ten days.

In spite of obvious Fascist victories, the government also reported some gains in yesterday's fighting.

Foreign diplomats are now making preparations to leave Madrid.

RUSSIA, ITALY BLAMED LONDON. Oct. 26: (CP)-British authorities announced on Saturday night that definite evidence had become available of violation by both Russia and Italy of the Spanish non-intervention agreement. Arms and fighting planes had been landed

in Spain by both countries. Italy and Germany, communicating with the non-intervention committee last night, promised to respect the terms of the nonintervention agreement but declared that they would recognize General Franco, Fascist leader, as the head of the only government which they considered "representative of law and order" in Spain.

PORTUGAL CHARGES RUSSIA LISBON, Oct. 26:-The Portuguese government vesterday formally charged Russia with trying to foment a Red revolution in Portugal and that the Soviet ambassador in Madrid was actually dominating the Spanish government with Russian officers directing the defence of Madrid. Arrival of twenty thousand Russian volunteers at Barcelona to bolster the Catalan defence was reported imminent by Portuguese arriving in Lisbon from Barcelona.

LONDON, Oct. 26: (CP)-The Dowager Marchioness of Dufferin Rideau Hall when Lord Dufferin was Governor General of Canada from 1872 to 1878, died on Sunday at the age of 93 years.

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

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

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
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
