Mukden Declares It an "Act of War"-International Observers See Possibility of General Warfare On **Extensive Scale**

MUKDEN, Manchuokuo, Feb. 14: (CP)-Two Russian bombing panes were declared yesterday by Manchuokuan authorities to have dropped missiles on Manchuokuan teritory, constituting what is said to be the most serious inident so far since the recent strained relations between Russia and Japan developed and a virtual "act of war."

OTTAWA, Feb. 14: (CP)—The King government emerged from the first test of strength in the House of Commons last night when Liberals, Conservatives and Social Creditors voted enmasse against an amendment of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation to the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, the division being 208 to eight. The House then passed the main motion without division.

The amendment, proposed by J. S. Woodsworth, the C. C. F. leader, condemned the government for not presenting a program designed to ameliorate distress conditions and to distribute the wealth among the people:
