# TRAPPED BANDITS TAKE OWN LIVES

## Hunt For Murderers In Hold-up of Vancouver Bank Ended Last Night

Jack Hyslop and George Lawson Kill Themselves in Preference to Being Taken by Police—Were Located At East End Rooming House

VANCOUVER, Jan. 23: (CP)—The week old manhunt for Jack Hyslop, aged 23, and George Lawson, 35, wanted on murder warrants, ended last night when they turned their guns on themselves as the police surrounded their east end hide-out. Lawson died instantly of a bullet wound in the head and Hyslop succumbed in hospital two hours later of a similar wound.

The police announced that the deaths of the two suspects ended the search for those implicated in the hold-up last Wednesday of the Powell Street branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce when three bandits escaped with \$1200 after the bank teller, William Hobbs, had been fatally wounded and the manager, Thomas Winsby, was also shot. Winsby is recovering in hospital. Two other men held by the police are charged with murder in connection with Hobb's death. They are Charles Russell, whom a coroner's jury has named as the actual killer of Hobbs, and Earl Dunbar. Two other men, Walter Davies and Fred Healy, are held as accessories to the murder.

## VANCOUVER ROBBERY

One Man Arrested After Trio Had Held Up Beer Parlor in Southern City

VANCOUVER, Jan. 23: (CP)—Stuart Cameron was arrested last night and charged with robbery after three men had held up the Cecil Hotel beer parlor and escaped with \$100.

Cameron, when captured, was driving a taxi which had been stolen from a driver who had been bound and gagged and left in Stanley Park. His companions had left him and the money has not been recovered.

## CONGRESS IN FAVOR

House of Representatives Adopts Senate's Bonus Plan

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 23: (CP)—Congress has voted for immediate payment of the soldiers' bonus by more than the two-thirds majority necessary to override a presidential veto. The House of Representatives yesterday accepted the Senate's "Baby bond" payment plan with an ultimate cost of more than \$2,000,000,000.

## ITALIANS ARE ALSO ADVANCING NORTH. ROME REPORTS CLAIM

ROME, Jan. 23:—A tremendous drive is being made by Italian forces in Northern Ethiopia, it is reported here. The defenders, it is claimed, are falling back in disorder before the invaders and positions which were lost in December are being recaptured by the Italians.

## TREATY IS BROKEN BUT LEAGUE OF NATIONS IS STILL FIRST BULWARK

Backed by Britain and France Geneva Organization Shows Strength in Present World Turmoil Including Italo-Ethiopian Conflict

GENEVA, Jan. 23: (AP)—The Treaty of Versailles is today but a shadow of its once formidable self. Put into force through exchange of ratifications 16 years ago—on January 10, 1920—it was designed to punish the defeated central powers and to make the world safe against future wars by the organization of an international peace body, the League of Nations. The League, bulwarked by the leadership of Great Britain and France, has continued to play a role in world affairs, and is showing its greatest strength in the Italo-Ethiopian conflict. Territorial and colonial provisions of the Treaty, by which the frontiers of the defeated powers were shortened and Germany's colonies placed under League mandates have been carried out.

But the Reich last year announced open repudiation of the army and air clauses of the Treaty and has put this refusal into action by building up these branches of her war forces. In addition, Reichsfuehrer Hitler has indicated his abrogation of the naval provisions of the Treaty by an agreement with Great Britain. The latter country accords Germany the right to build up to 35 per cent of the British Navy.

This pact permits Germany a total of 420,595 tons, based on the Washington and London naval treaties to which Britain has adhered. The Versailles Treaty restricted the Reich's navy to 109,000 tons. Germany already has a navy of 122,915 tons, with 104,000 tons under construction.

Germany's Rearming The extent to which Hitler has reinforced Germany's land armament has not been revealed officially by the Nazis. French experts, however, claim Germany has an armed force of 600,000 men; Leon Archimbaud, military expert of the French Chamber of Deputies Finance Committee, asserted recently Germany would have 900,000 to 1,000,000 men under arms soon. The Versailles Treaty fixed the full strength of the German army at 100,000 men.

Suspected by the French for many years of violating the war treaty secretly, Germany gave its first public defiance of the pact when it announced creation of a military air force. The treaty specifically said: "The armed forces of Germany must not include any military or new air force." France has raised frequent cries of warning against the Reich's violations of the Treaty which, if effectively enforced, would have eliminated French concern over attack from that sector.

The United States, associated partner with the allies in crushing central powers in the War, refused to adhere to the Versailles Treaty despite the pleas of President Woodrow Wilson. The League of Nations, partly the product of Wilson's mind, met with little favor in the American Senate, and separate treaties, without the League provisions, were made with the opposing belligerents.

May Demand Colonies Germany has not demanded official restoration of any of her colonies taken away by the Versailles Treaty, but there is widespread belief among European political observers that she may make this move eventually. Reparations installments for the war damage done by Germany have not been paid since 1931, when President Hoover declared a moratorium on the war debts to the United States and European powers made a similar gesture to Germany. France fears Germany's next step in violation of the Versailles Treaty will be militarization of the demilitarized Rhineland zone, and Frenchmen assert there are already strategic airdromes and railways there in addition to 45,000 militarized police.

## Timely Recipes

### NEW CORN SOUP

Corn on the cob is a gastronomic delight and unhappy the man with millions if he can't enjoy, just once a year, well-buttered corn. But after these golden kernels were cut from the cob, cookery imagination seemed to stop until recently when some delicious new corn dishes were developed.

Corn soup is no longer a glorified white sauce affair. With up-to-date cooking methods, tiny particles of quick-cooking tapioca "bind" the flavorful ingredients into a creamy nourishing soup. It's a perfect dish to round out a "slim" meal, or start off a salad luncheon on a chilly day.

One and a half cups canned corn, 1 cup meat broth or 1 cup water and 2 bouillon cubes, 2½ cups rich milk, 1½ tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, 1 teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon sugar, dash of cayenne, ½ teaspoon scraped onion, 1½ tablespoons butter.

Cook corn in broth 10 minutes; force through sieve. Combine with milk, tapioca, salt, sugar, cayenne and onion in top of double boiler. Place over rapidly boiling water. Bring to scalding point (allow 5 to 7 minutes) and cook 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Add butter. Serves 4 to 6.

## PRODUCERS BETTER OFF

Crops More Bountiful And Prices Higher During 1935

OTTAWA, Jan. 23: (CP)—Some improvement was recorded in the position of primary producers of Canada during 1935, according to Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce. Crops on the whole were more bountiful than in the preceding year. Wholesale prices for many farm products, especially animal products, reached a higher level. The number of live stock on farms showed recession in each of the main divisions, resulting from recent liquidation at relatively attractive prices.

Increased production of metals was the feature of the mining industry, the output of copper, nickel and zinc recording new highs in history. The output of gold was also greater, due to the arrival of many new mines at the production stage.

The lumber industry measured by the number employed was more active but the export of planks and boards showed recession, due mainly to reduced shipments to the British market. The output of newsprint reached a new high point, but the price remained at depression levels. The catch of sea fish showed a decline of 2.6 per cent and the value showed a corresponding tendency. Exports of fish, however, including canned salmon, were worth about seven per cent more than in the same period last year.

Despite the decline in prices, the value of fur exports was nearly maintained.

The production of manufacturing plants, according to the official index, was appreciably in advance of the preceding year, while the gain in employment was more than seven per cent. The iron and steel industries engaged in the production of industrial equipment showed marked gains over the preceding year. The food and textile industries took on a new lease of life in 1935, the gain in output being about 30 per cent. The oil industry reported further progress, but a contrary tendency was shown in the manufacture of tires.

### Power Output Up

The power industry with a gain in output of about 11 per cent over 1934 reached a new high point. Owing to the rapid long-term growth, the reaching of maxima in the monthly output of electric energy has become a commonplace.

The gain in construction contracts was about 11 per cent and building permits in principal cities showed a much greater percentage gain. Despite governmental construction, the industry failed to reach the normal levels of pre-depression years. The increase in railway traffic was decidedly slight and the modest gain in gross operating revenue was very much more than counter-balanced by the increase in operating expenses. The net operating revenues of the railways in the

first nine months consequently showed a decline of 15 per cent. Tonnage of vessels clearing from six principal ports showed a slight gain, while the cargo tonnage from five ports, Montreal statistics being unavailable, was nearly five per cent less.

### Fisheries Science Topic of Interest

Biology and Technology Figure In Address by B. E. Bailey

In an educational address Tuesday night, before the Prince Rupert Labor College, B. E. Bailey of the scientific staff of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station dealt with the scientific work and progress of fisheries experimental stations, the discourse on "Science and the Fishing Industry" being based on about six years of study and research. Reference was made to various sciences involved in industry as modernly applied and to the rapid progress being made by nations other than Canada and the United States.

The knowledge acquired was power, involving biology and technology. Biology involved the study of oceanography and fish life including various animal and plant foods, life history of the fish, scientific experimentation, fish maintenance and pathology.

Under the head of technological work, the speaker dealt with equipment, seine and net preservation, preservation of fish, smoking, salting, canning and the persistent endeavor to save as much of the product as possible.

Some time was spent on the matter of by-products. Questions were asked and other points developed.

A hearty vote of thanks followed the address.

## Princess Light Of Addis Ababa

Haile Selassie's Third Daughter Is Well Educated And Indispensable

ADDIS ABABA, Jan. 23: (CP)—When the third daughter was born to His Majesty Haile Selassie and his Empress Etaje Mennan, she was named Zahae Work—which means the golden sun.

The Princess today is a slender, willowy girl of 18, whose skin is a delicate brown and whose black hair is combed high above the forehead. Her features are regular and dainty. Her simplicity and poise have been enhanced by several years in European schools, where she acquired fluency in several languages.

As she transposes both French and English into Amharic with the greatest facility for her royal mother, she seems almost indispensable to court life. She also takes an active part in the work of the Ethiopian women, having just accepted the presidency of the women's Red Cross. She is often found assisting in the work of making bandages.

Largely through her influence, the women's Red Cross will be made a permanent organization in Addis Ababa.

At Red Cross headquarters the Princess wears the regulation white apron but, when seen in the palace, she wears often a white embroidered European gown, and thrown over her shoulders a modern black velvet cape. Some extra wrap is always necessary, as the palace, like all houses in Addis Ababa, is cold. The Princess does not wear the shamma, the native gown of Ethiopia.
