# Gerry Is On Warpath At Ottawa

## New Alliance In Europe Proposed

Italy, Germany and Austria Said to be Getting Together To Offset Russo-Franco-British Movement

FLORENCE, Italy, Feb. 19: (CP)—According to a high authority here the countries of Europe are dividing into two camps. Italy, Germany and Austria are formulating a three-point agreement to offset the talk of alliances between Britain and Russia and also between France and Russia.

LONDON, Feb. 19:—The proposed alliance of Italy, Germany and Austria came as no surprise here as it has been known that these countries have been moving in that direction. It will probably not affect the present situation insofar as the war in Ethiopia or the League of Nations are concerned.

## To Approve Farm Relief

Measure Replacing Triple A Expected to Pass Congress By Friday of This Week

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 19:—The administration's farm program, replacing the invalidated Agricultural Adjustment Act, is expected to be passed by the House of Representatives by Friday. It provides \$500,000,000 annually to assist the farmers in soil conservation measures, etc. Already the Senate has overwhelmingly approved the measure which is assured of the presidential signature.

## Emergency Operation

## Senate Approves Extension of U.S. Neutrality Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 19:—The Senate yesterday agreed to the extension of the United States neutrality bill, which has an important bearing on the League of Nations sanctions against Italy in connection with the Italo-Ethiopian campaign, from February 29 until May 1.

## Some Sub-Colors Of Royal Purple

British Color Council Names Variety For Semi-Mourning

LONDON, Feb. 19: (CP)—In response to requests for guidance, the British Color Council states that for royal ceremonial occasions the correct colors are royal purple and silver grey.

Royal purple is, however, a somewhat difficult color to wear, and for semi-mourning the following colors may be substituted: Amythyst, plum and egg plant. It is probable that these colors, together with black and white, will continue to be used for accessories after the period of national mourning.

## HERDS NOT DEPLETED

Northern Pilot Says Cariboo Still Numerous and Natives and Trappers Must Hunt Them to Live

PRINCE ALBERT, Feb. 19: (CP)—Belief that there is no danger hunters may soon exterminate northern cariboo is expressed by Walter E. Gilbert, northern airplane pilot, who says in recent flights from Fort Smith, N.W.T., to Cameron Bay on Great Bear Lake he passed over hundreds of thousands of the animals.

"To people living on the true fringe of the Barren Lands of the Arctic," says pilot Gilbert in a letter to the Prince Albert Herald, "the annual appearance of the cariboo means a certain food supply for the long, bitter winter. A non-appearance of the herd may easily mean starvation and death."

The herds, moving over the northern wastes, take no definite course, and their wanderings are followed closely by native and white hunters. Although their habitat comprises two-thirds of Canada's area, says the airman, a population less than that of Saskatchewan is dependent on them for a livelihood.

Wolves, he claimed, are responsible for far more cariboo slaughter than hunters. When conservation becomes necessary, he says, "the first step will be to 'war' against these killers."

Referring to the present size of herds, the airman remarks "I have seen winters, when for full three months on end, one might fly the 600 miles from Fort Smith to Cameron Bay, and beyond, and be ever in sight of teaming herds of these animals. Short flights to the edge of the barrens showed equal tens and hundreds of thousands of grazing animals." These herds, he adds, form but one of at least three major bodies of cariboo.

## BIG HAUL OF GOLD MADE FROM BANK IN NEW YORK BY POLICE

NEW YORK, Feb. 19:—Under orders of the Treasury Department, police officers entered a New York bank yesterday and seized \$200,000 in gold from the safety deposit of a customer of the bank whose name was not revealed. The gold, it is alleged, was being held in violation of the federal anti-hoarding laws. The law provides for the hoarding of gold the penalty of forfeiture of the metal and a fine of twice its value.

VICTORIA, Feb. 19: (CP)—Harry Green, Nanaimo-Victoria bus driver, 50 years of age, and Jessie Anderson, 25, a government stenographer, are believed to have been drowned while skating at Langford Lake last night. Their tracks were found leading to a hole in the ice after they failed to return to the skating party by their companions. Dredging operations commenced today.

## ITALIANS CELEBRATE

Students in Rome and Elsewhere Stage Demonstrations Over Victory—Big Vote For Campaign

ROME, Feb. 19:—Students here and elsewhere throughout Italy staged mass celebrations yesterday of the reported great victory over Ethiopia in the East African war. These celebrations were in spite of Ethiopian statements denying any great victory, which statements, of course, did not get much publicity in this country.

The Fascist government yesterday voted \$125,000,000 to carry on the campaign in Ethiopia, \$93,000,000 going direct to the army, navy and air force.

He is at present attending dental college in Portland. The bride is a nurse.

## REDUCTION OF TRANSPACIFIC STEAMSHIP SUBSIDY IS NOT APPROVED BY MAYOR McGEER

OTTAWA, Feb. 19: (CP)—Reduction of \$149,000 in the subsidy for trans-Pacific steamship service proposed in the estimates of Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce, drew the criticism of Mayor G. G. McGeer, member for Vancouver-Burrard, in the House of Commons last night. Mr. McGeer said that it was false economy and that the government had failed to realize the importance of Pacific shipping to the rising power of Japanese commerce in an area where Canada should play a large part.

Mr. Euler replied that he was prepared to retrace his steps and increase the subsidy should he be convinced that he was wrong. He had no intimation from the steamship company, however, that the reduction would result in an impairment of service.

Mayor McGeer accused the government of economizing by cutting down on a "rather niggardly subsidy." "We are not going to help the minister of finance obtain taxes in that way," he said. "We are not going to help the cities of Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert nor the provinces of Alberta and British Columbia obtain taxes in that way."

Leadership of the British Empire was being challenged on the Pacific and it was up to Canada, in its own interest, to play a part in maintaining it, Mr. McGeer said.

## New Execution Date is Fixed

Week of March 30 to be Time When Bruno Hauptmann Will Go to Chair

FLEMINGTON, N.J., Feb. 19:—Justice Trenchard automatically signed a new death warrant today providing for the electrocution of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, kidnap-murderer of the Lindbergh baby, following expiry of the reprieve of Governor Harold Hoffman last Saturday. It is decided the new execution date will be March 30 week. It is the third execution date to be set following the conviction. Virtually the only hope for further delay lies in a second reprieve which is extremely unlikely.

#### PRINCE RUPERT'S NEEDS

Prince Rupert has many needs. The city needs local attractions to tourists. She also needs improved roads, improved parks, improved gardens, an improved public spirit, more industries, improved train and mail services and more than anything else it needs completion of the highway to the interior.

We talk about the highway to Terrace as if it were a simple matter, the only necessary thing to do being to convince the authorities at Victoria of the need and presto it will be done. What the sensible businesslike Prince Rupert people ask is that real progress be made on this highway so that its completion will not be a matter of centuries. Last year the work was recommenced by the Pattullo Government after a shutdown of several years. That was an important move but it is not enough. Greater speed is asked with the employment of more of the idle men of the district. There is reason to believe that this will be done but it is always a good thing to remind the authorities that this is a very important undertaking and will benefit us and the whole province, especially the northern interior.

#### ANOTHER LOCAL NEED

Another local need that is very important to the city just now is the erection of the totem poles at present stored at the Canadian National Steamship dock. The tourists will soon be here and it would be a great boost to the city from a tourist standpoint to have the totems for them to see when they arrive. Doubtless the city commissioner is aware of the importance of this work and probably he plans to have it done. At any rate the citizens will be behind him if he decides to spend the few dollars required, paying wages to local people in getting it done.

**HERB PENNOCK IS 42**  
Herb Pennock, veteran southpaw pitcher, manager of the Charlotte club in the Piedmont League, farm club for Boston Red Sox, was born in Kennett Square, Pa., 42 years ago today. He had 11 seasons with New York Yankees before going to Boston in 1934. He has a world's series pitching record of five wins against no losses.

## SPORT CHAT

Stella Walsh has one goal left on the Cinder tracks before she hangs up her spikes and retires from competition that made her world famous as a sprinter. She wants to win the women's 100-metre dash for Poland in the Eleventh Olympic Games at Berlin next August, then turn the family's sprinting activities over to her 17-year old sister, Clara. Stella will be 25 in April. She was 21 when she won the 100-metre in the 1934 international track and field carnival at Los Angeles in the Olympic record time of 11.9. Since then she has cut the world mark to 11.8 and 11.7 only to see her best efforts topped by a farm girl, Helen Stephens of Fulton, Mo., who outsped the Polish-born flash the only time they ever met. That meeting took place as an exhibition sprint indoors at St. Louis a year ago and subsequently the Missouri miss ran the 100-metre event three times in 11.6 seconds. They are expected to renew their rivalry in Berlin next summer.

Almost on the eve of the last Olympic Games, the Cleveland girl decided to sprint for Poland, dropping plans for naturalization that would have permitted her to compete for the United States. She will run for Poland again this year. "I am automatically a member of Poland's Olympic team because I am Polish national champion," she points out. Stella began winning championships in her early teens, becoming women's senior champion of Cleveland at the age of 14. At 17 she made her first trip to Europe and for the first time equalled the women's world record of 7.6 seconds in the 60-metre sprint. After that, records fell with regularity under the spikes of the flying Polish girl star. Her past and present records for the world, the United States, Canada, Japan and Poland total 52 in the dashes, long sprints and field events. Stella plans to become an instructor in athletics after retirement from competition and to train little sister Clara for the 1940 Olympics. Clara, she will tell you, has the old Walsh speed.

SMITHERS, Feb. 19.—The longest cold spell in the memory of old timers of the Bulkley Valley still remains unbroken.

For fifteen days out of the last sixteen the thermometer has stood below zero and sometimes so far below zero as to be near the bottom of the figures indicated on the glass.

Four nights in succession during the past week the minimum was between 40 and 50 degrees below zero but Monday night was comparatively mild at 16 below zero which is now considered quite spring-like.

The days are fine and bright with strong sunshine, the sun now producing quite a lot of heat which however, is soon dissipated in the sub-zero temperatures prevailing.

The dealers in coal and wood are kept very busy and at the Dookrill coal mine in Telkwa the coal is taken away from the mine as fast as it is produced.

The district is fortunate in having lots of fuel available so that, no matter how cold it gets or how long it lasts, there is not much danger of having to resort to the burning of one's household furniture for fuel as has been reported in some districts.

Northern British Columbia was beginning to congratulate itself on the mild winter and hoping that there would be no severe weather when the country was caught in the present icy grip of nature which has now lasted three weeks and has been a whole winter in itself.

The barometer still remains very high and there is no indication of an early break but it is hoped that this week will see a change to more moderate weather.
