Getting Supplies

The rival forces in Spain seem to be getting all the supplies they can use from nations friendly to the respective combatants. Russia is evidently sending airplanes, arms and ammunition to the government and Italy, Germany and Portugal are providing the Fascist rebels with the sinews of war. This may not have an important bearing on the outcome of the struggle. If the Spanish government has the personnel it should have the best of the deal in the matter of supplies because neither of the backers of the rebels has any money to squander away on Spain unless someone is willing to foot the bill.

While Britain and United States are supposed to be out of the picture, yet goods manufactured in these countries have been reaching Spain. The whole situation is a most delicate one and may lead to a general European mix-up at any time. And yet, as we have often said, the things we fear most do not usually occur. There may be no implication of other nations in the struggle.



This is trap of their own making. known as the Tuberculin Test. It; is a very simple procedure, practically painless in its application, and quite harmless in its effects. The substance used for the test is a specially prepared protein solution, perfectly sterile and containing no germs. The usual procedure is to rub or inject a small dose into the surface layers of the skin of the forearm and then to examine the site 48 hours later. Individuals who are not infected show nothing on the arm at the end of this time but, if living tuberculosis germs are present in the body, there will be a reddened area varying in size up to a 25-cent piece. This test does not make the individual sick as vaccination and similar procedures | would do.

It is proposed to tuberculin-test as many children in our public and high schools this fall as possible. The testing would only be done with the permission of the parents and a signed consent will be obtained in every case. In testing the children, we hope to accomplish two things: first, detect any active cases of tuberculosis among school chillren; second, by following up such active cases and examining their contacts, to detect the adults responsible for the infection.

Dr. Lamb, travelling medical health officer, will be in Prince Rupert during the latter half of November to superintend this work and we ask the hearty co-operation of the parents of our school children, in this attempt to control more adequately the occurrence of this dread disease. 
