Some of the newspapers of Canada are unkind enough! to suggest that the move to give votes to Orientals followed close on the visit of Mr. Woodsworth to Japan and that it is not a wholly disinterested motive that brings this new policy to the fore. Lest we should be misunderstood, we are not suggesting that Mr. Woodsworth is receiving! pay for his influence as leader of a new party, but evidently he never thought of such a policy as the one adopted until he was in Japan.

We are sorry that this Oriental question has been brought again into Canadian politics. We are neighbors of the Oriental countries and we do business with them. We respect the aims and aspirations of the Japanese and Chinese people and it seems a pity that a question such as the one mentioned should be again thrown into the maelstrom of politics. In the early days many an election was won and lost over the Oriental question and much illfeeling was engendered. Of late, however, the bogy seemed to have been laid low, until once more brought to the fore by a new and inexperienced party that did not realize it had teeth in it and the teeth are still there.


