### Frisco Xmas Business Big

Averaged Ten Percent Better Than Year Ago, It Is Estimated

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 29.—Despite the maritime workers' strike which crippled the business of the port, San Francisco department stores had ten percent more turnover this Christmas than last year, an estimated average shows. One store reported that it had done twenty percent better on one day than for any one day since it was established twenty-five years ago. December retail business for San Francisco is estimated to have aggregated \$60,000,000 this year.

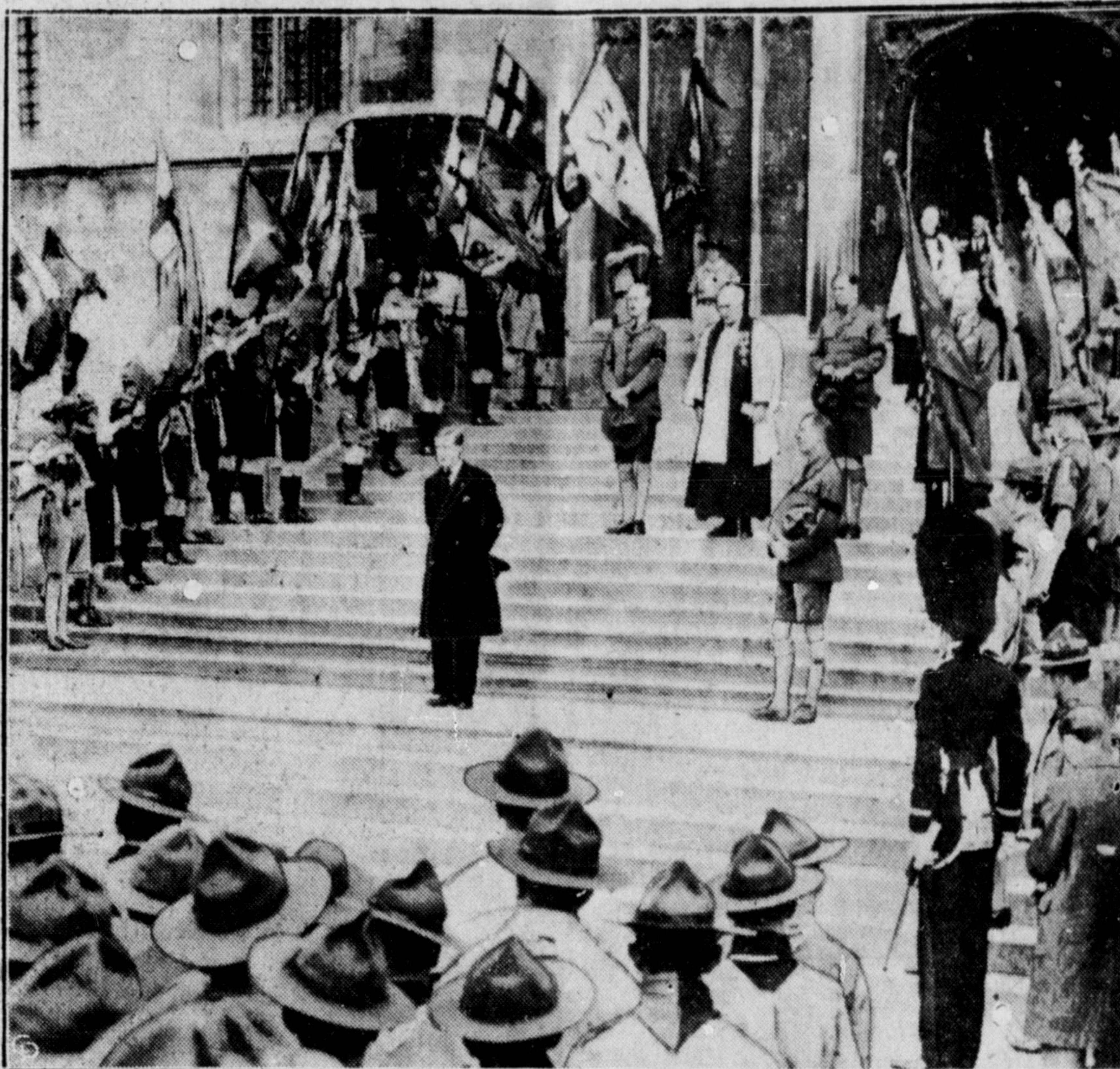
