DAVOS, Switzerland, Feb. 5: (CP)—Wilhelm Gustloff, Swiss Nazi leader, was assassinated yesterday by Da-Frankfurther, Jewish medical student, who surrendered to the police and said his act was against the regime which made impossible normal existence for his fellow Jews in Germany. The slaying has aroused fears of grave international complications.

CLAIMED

Seventeen Hundred Italians Slain On Southern Front-Rome Defies League

ADDIS ABABA, Feb. 5:-A decisive victory was claimed here last night for Emperor Haile Selassie's troops in a heavy battle yesterday on the southern front. It was claimed that 1700 Italians had been slain and left dead on the field. Eighteen tanks, seven machine guns and three mounted guns, it was asserted, had been

Thirteen miles south of Adigrat on the northern front the Ethiopians also claimed another victory with many of the invading forces taken prisoner.

AND FROM ROME

ROME, Feb. 5: - Ethiopian claims of victory yesterday on both the southern and northern fronts in Ethiopia were denied here yesterday.

In defiance of the League of Nations, it was stated, after a meeting of the Fascist Grand Council, that Italy would continue to fight in Ethiopia "until it gets what it wants."

The Grand Council also gave the government direct control over all industries and trade in orde to more effectively combat sanctions.






