Ontario Revels in Cool Breezes As Does Also United States- Still Warm on Prairies

TORONTO, July 16: (CP)-Ontario yesterday revelled in cooling breezes and lower temperatures after the most terrible seven days of heat in the history of the province. Toronto at noon reported a temperature of eighty degrees above with a brisk breeze

Clear and hot weather still ruled over the Canadian prairies yesterday but early relief is anticipated.

Rain and cool air hovered near the last strongholds of the recordbreaking twelve day heat wave in the United States.

TRAINS TO MOVE NOW

Way Freight Arrives From Pacific And Regular Service Will Be Restored Tomorrow

The first train to come over the line of the Canadian National Railways from Pacific to Prince Rupert since the disastrous floods of May 30 which washed away a good portion of the line arrived at 1:30 this morning. It was a return way freight which had gone east the previous day. It handled much needed supplies and provisions for points along the line.

Tomorrow regular train service is to be resumed with a passenger train leaving for the east at 6 p.m. and one due in at 10:20 p.m. which, however, will be late.

On Sunday night last the first train to leave Terrace for six weeks left at 11 p.m. for Pacific.



FATAL FALL

"WOMAN IN GREY" CREDITED WITH DEFLECT-ING WEAPON-ALLEGED ASSAILANT, 34-YEAR OLD SCOTSMAN, SAYS HE DID NOT INTEND TO INJURE MONARCH.

LONDON, July 16: (CP)—A man pointed a loaded revolver at the King today. A woman in grey knocked it from his hand and the man was immediately seized by * profitably and pay the fisher- * the police. Before the man was taken into custody, there was a violent scuffle during which the weapon was precipitated into the roadway. The prisoner's name was given by the police as George Andrew McMahon, a Scotsman, about thirty-four years old.

The stocky full-faced man aimed at His Majesty as he rode at the head of troops to Buckingham Palace. The man was later charged with intent to endanger the King's life and with unlawful possession of a firearm.

The authorities described the alleged would-be assassin as middle-aged, slightly bald and, seemingly, clubfooted. He limped to the dock in Bow Street station and was remanded for eight days.

Detective Inspector John Sands, giving formal evidence in connection with the arrest, said the prisoner told him enroute to the station: "It's all the fault of Sir John Simon (Home Secretary). I wrote him last night and 'phoned him this morning. The King wasn't hurt in any way, was he? I didn't want to hurt him in any way. I only did it as a protest.

Sands, describing the way the man was taken into custody by a constable, said: "I was handed this five-chamber revolver which was loaded with ball and ammunition in four chambers but not in the top chamber which gave immediate access to the barrel." The detective said there was no evidence that the weapon had been fired for a considerable time.

The assailant pushed his way through the ranks of spectators and police as the King, in uniform, rode down Constitution Hill on his way to the palace after presenting colors to six battalions of footguards.

The King remained calm throughout although several spectators said they believed he saw the armed man in the crowd before quick commotion broke out. Women screamed and fainted. Powerful bobbies swarmed in on the suspect and rushed him away. The King rode on into the courtyar dof Buckingham Palace.

Various versions as told by different persons standing close by indicated that the revolver was thrown at the King or knocked out into the roadway by bystanders or policemen. One generally accepted account was that "a woman in grey" seized the man's arm as the gun came up. Policemen went quickly to the woman's assis-

Some persons asserted that the revolver was thrown so accurately it hit the flank of the King's horse, causing the animal to flinch.

Scotland Yard asserted that the revolver actually was thrown but did not indicate that it landed anywhere near the King.



"Then the militia of Canada would be forced to rely on the army and navy of the United States. The United States would have to come to the rescue unless it wanted to see an entrance into North America of nations steeped in medieval war traditions and each worshipping as a god a national state which might at any time repudiate treaties and condone in its interests the overthrow of the most sacred principles of Christian civilization.

"We Canadians want no change in our status-only time to work out our national vocation on the soundest lines," he writes. "But when we stop to look at matters closely, the foundations of our security are as I have stated them. How, then, may the destiny of Canada be worked out so that we may preserve our language, our liberty and our institutions? Only by closer co-peration! between her, Great Britain and the United States. History has molded our nations in the same patterns. Though there are superficial differences in our points of view, we are one.

"It was always a matter of surprise and consternation to Canadians that Britain at any time should wish to limit the size of the United States Navy. That navy, surely, through the Monroe Doctrine, is the ultimate security of the Dominion. Now, thank God, in the last naval conference, England has recognized the fact that the stronger the United States Navy is the better for her in the end."
