# IMPORTANT ELECTION ON SUNDAY

## TRANSCANADA AIR MAIL IS CONSIDERED ONLY MEN WILL ELECT NEW PARLIAMENT FOR OLD FRANCE IN POLL

### Service From Coast To Coast is Plan Of Federal Government

Cannot be Said Yet, However, When Actual Start May Be Made, Explains Hon. J. C. Elliott, Postmaster General

OTTAWA, April 25: (CP)—Trans-Canada air mail service from Halifax to Vancouver is being considered by the government, Hon. J. C. Elliott, Postmaster General, told the House of Commons today. Plans have not yet been advanced to the stage where a possible estimate can be made as to when the service may start.

### BIG DRIVE CONTINUES

Italian Armies Still Driving From Two Directions Towards Heart Of Ethiopia

ROME, April 25:—In its biggest push so far in the Italo-Ethiopian war, General Graziano's army was driving from the direction of Italian Somaliland on the southeast front further into Ethiopia yesterday.

At the same time, Marshal Badoglio's forces continued their advance from Dessye towards Addis Ababa.

### DEATH OF CHURCHMAN

Rural Dean William Sweetnam Of Fraser Lake District Passes Away in Vancouver

Word was received in the city today of the death in St. Paul's Hospital, Vancouver, following an operation for appendicitis and complications, of Rev. Rural Dean William Sweetnam, for years in charge of Anglican Church work in the Fraser Lake district with headquarters in Fort Fraser and Enako.

A native of Cork, Ireland, he was over sixty years of age and is survived by a widow, one daughter, and two sons.

The funeral will take place Monday or Tuesday in Vancouver and it is hoped that Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia, who left last night for Vancouver on church business, will be able to attend.

### Hunger Marchers Squat at Capital

No Attempt Being Made to Interfere With Demonstration At Trenton Providing There Is No Trouble

TRENTON, New Jersey, April 25:—Unemployed hunger marchers from various parts of the state were squatted at the Capitol here but nothing is being done to remove or interfere with them so long as they remain peaceful. Extra police guards are, however, posted to the grounds. Violence threatened yesterday morning but did not materialize.

### CUP FOR ARSENAL

Defeated Sheffield United By Score of One to Nil at Wembley Stadium Today

LONDON, April 25: (CP)—London's famous Arsenal football team won the English Cup today for the second time in its career, defeating Sheffield United one to nil before 93,000 persons at Wembley Stadium.

It was one of the tightest cup finals in recent years. The teams fought on even terms in the first half, the only goal being scored in the final forty-five minutes.

A passing movement between Bowden, Bastin and Drake brought the lone score. Drake snapped up the pass and sent the ball into the net after seventy-four minutes of play. ### BIG CUT IN FARES

Rail Rates Being Generally Reduced, it is Announced

MONTREAL, April 25: (CP)—Substantial reduction in railway passenger fares in Canada will become effective June 1, it was announced yesterday by C. P. Riddell, chairman of the Canadian Passenger Association.

Basic fares of first class coach travel are being reduced approximately thirteen percent.

Round trip tickets will be good for six months instead of the present thirty-day limit.

Standard parlor and sleeping car accommodation rates are also being reduced.

Under the French election system candidates at the first poll must receive one vote more than fifty percent of the total to be returned. ### KING FUAD VERY ILL

Italo-Ethiopian Crisis Anticipated Should Monarch Expire—Heart Takes Bad Turn

CAIRO, April 25:—King Fuad of Egypt lies gravely ill at his palace in Cairo. The sixty-eight year old monarch has been suffering from heart trouble for some time but his condition took a turn for the worse yesterday.

Since 1922 Fuad has been the constitutional monarch of Egypt. For five years prior to that he ruled as sultan.

Fuad's death, it is feared, might result in a crisis in Anglo-Egyptian relations which have been strained of late.

### Review of Issues

When the Frenchmen go to the polls they will be asked to choose, in a broad sense, between the policies of the Right and Left. This is more true this year than in the past because of the coalition of the parties of the left in the "Front Populaire."

Generally speaking the Left makes a dominant issue of fascism and holds the democratic institutions of France in peril from the Fascist tendencies of the Right. However while elements of the Right have to a degree supported Fascist organizations, it is not true the right is solidly Fascist.

The Right on the other hand accuses the extreme radicals of the Left, Communists, of having entered an alliance with Socialists and more constitutional parties as hypocrites. The extreme radicals are charged with being opportunists and actually maintaining their theory of violent overthrow of the government with the establishment of a proletarian dictatorship while wearing the sheep's clothing of the "Front Populaire."

The economic issue is of the greatest importance with France at

### BRITISH COLUMBIA INCREASE

The increase in the number of automobile sales in British Columbia exceeds that of all other provinces except Ontario, according to figures just received. The sales for the year ending February 29, 1936, have jumped to 98,411 from 91,006 in 1934 or a net increase of 7,405. The increase in Alberta was 4,520; in Saskatchewan, 4,308; in Manitoba, only 340; Quebec, 5,358; New Brunswick, 2,303; Nova Scotia, 2,012, and in Prince Edward Island, 43. In Ontario the number in 1934 was 559,393, which increased last year to 585,938, an increase of 26,545, considerably larger than British Columbia but a much smaller percentage of increase. That would seem to indicate that British Columbia is either recovering more quickly than any other province or that the people are more extravagant.

There is every reason to believe that this increase in motor sales is still in progress and that British Columbia will show she is not by any means the last province in recovering her former prosperity.

### ELECTION TOMORROW

The French elections take place tomorrow and they are being watched with interest in view of the critical condition of European politics just now. There is a big fight for control of the government by the Popular Front which includes socialists, communists and other radical groups. At present the Chamber of Deputies is controlled by united forces of the centre and right.

While the first vote takes place tomorrow, it is largely an elimination or primary vote. To be elected a candidate must get an absolute majority of the votes cast and also a vote of at least one fourth of all electors registered in the constituency. Tomorrow will see the disappearance of freak candidates but the Popular Front groups have an arrangement by which the lower candidates will retire no matter of what particular radical group.

BROOKLYN, April 25: (CP)—New York Giants were defeated again by the Brooklyn Dodgers at Ebbetts Field yesterday, the score being 8 to 2. The Dodgers, as a result, advanced from sixth into fourth place. The Chicago Cubs, playing at home, won an easy 6 to 1 victory over Pittsburgh Pirates and went into a tie for second place with the Cincinnati Reds who, with the St. Louis Cardinals, did not play yesterday. The lowly Boston Braves defeated the Phillies at Boston 4 to 1, the Phils slipping from fifth into sixth place.

The Cleveland Indians stretched their margin of leadership in the American League by winning again over the Chicago White Sox at Cleveland 6 to 2 while the second place Boston Red Sox were losing 3 to 1 to the Philadelphia Athletics at Shibe Park. New York Yankees scored a decisive 10 to 1 victory over the Washington Senators at Yankee Stadium and ousted the White Sox from third position. Detroit Tigers went into the leadership of the second division by scoring a 9 to 3 victory over the St. Louis Browns who dropped into the cellar below the Mackmen.

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





**WATERFRONT WHIFFS**  
Heaviest Week's Halibut Landings So Far This Season—All Set For Model Yacht Racing—Not To Rebuild Oceanic Just Now  
Prince Rupert has just had its heaviest week's halibut business so far this season with a total of 573,700 pounds being landed of which 333,500 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 240,200 pounds from American. This brings landings for the season to date up to 1,784,800 pounds consisting of 1,038,800 pounds from Canadian boats and 751,000 pounds from American. On account of the heavy landings, prices dropped back somewhat but not unduly. The large majority of 29 Canadian boats which landed catches during the week received 6c and 5c with the top bid of the week for Canadian fish 6.4c and 5c received by the Relief for 14,000 pounds. For American fish the high price of the week was 7.3c and 5c paid the Garland for 13,000 pounds and the low 6c and 5c which the Sunde received for 25,000 pounds.

All is set for the renewal of the local model yacht race on Sunday afternoon when all vessels with the exception of those who won first and second prizes last Sunday will compete for the third and consolation awards. Following the running of the races, presentation of trophies will be made. Prior to and during the race the Prince Rupert Boys' Band under direction of Bandmaster Robert Greenfield, will play along the waterfront.  
James Martin of Massett has been getting the former snagboat Bobolink, now used as a commissary and store on the North Island trolling grounds, in readiness to take out from Massett, according to word received this week from the Islands.  
The Ocean Packers will not be rebuilding its cannery on Smith Island outside of Prince Rupert Harbor following the fire which destroyed the plant last fall. The remainder of the plant will be used this season as a camp, the fish to be handled the Canadian Fishing Co. at Carlisle cannery. It is reported on good authority that the Canadian Fishing

Co. has purchased the plant altogether. The Ocean Packers some time ago considered the idea of building a new cannery at Prince Rupert but the project has, apparently, been abandoned.  
Capt. Harry Hanson and Capt. Andy Christiansen of Queen Charlotte City have left Skidegate Inlet for the West Coast of Queen Charlotte Islands with their trolling boats to start in on the season's fishing operations. A few springs are being caught at Langara Island, it is reported. No reports have yet been received from the West Coast.  
Having completed repairs a few days ago at the local dry dock following her recent stranding on Barret Rock at the entrance of the harbor, the lighthouse tender Newington, Capt. Harry Ormiston, is back in commission again. She left on Wednesday of this week for a trip down the coast between here and Egg Island in Queen Charlotte Sound.

**Cardena Very Late**  
Very late again owing to having had heavy freight cargo for cannery points on her voyage up the coast, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. J. E. Boden, is not expected in port before early this evening from the south. She was discharging at Skeena River points this morning.  
Pete Jensen, a former member of the crew, has purchased the well known Prince Rupert halibut boat White Hope, which was formerly owned by Capt. Pete Thompson. The purchase was made from the Prince Rupert dry dock by Capt. Jensen and the price was \$8250. Built at the dry dock, the White Hope was commissioned in 1930. She is fifty-four feet in length and is equipped with a 50 h.p. Gardner diesel engine. The new owner took the vessel out on its first trip under his command today.

**Timely Recipes**  
**SALMON LEFT-OVERS**  
Intelligent use of "left-overs" is one means of keeping down the family food budget and, what's more, it may be made the means of providing dishes which are attractive in appearance as well as nourishing and tasty. For example, there's a moulded salmon salad which may be made either from canned salmon or from what's left over from a dinner of fresh salmon.  
In making this salad an egg should be beaten and to it there should be added two tablespoons of sugar, a half tablespoon each of flour and mustard, a half teaspoon of salt, a cup of milk, and a half a cup of vinegar. Then the mixture should be cooked for ten minutes, with constant stirring, and poured over a tablespoon of gelatine which has first been softened in a quarter of a cup of cold water. After that two cups of salmon, separated into flakes, should be added to the mixture and the whole turned into a mould that has been rinsed in cold water. When the salad has been allowed to chill until it has become firm it is turned out on to a platter and served.  
If canned salmon is used in preparing this salad the liquor from the can should not be thrown away but poured in with the other ingredients of the mixture. The reason for that is that salmon oil is a valuable source of vitamins.

the bottom of a depression. The Left is opposed to the deflationary methods of past governments and has a variety of schemes for a planned economy. It opposes the power of financial interests and proposes to check big business, laying hands on the Bank of France, an institution privately controlled, and nationalizing the arms industry.  
The Right charges the policies of the Left would result in inflation—an event sincerely dreaded by the French who suffered heavily in 1928 when the franc was stabilized at one-fifth of its pre-war value.  
Foreign policy with the German re-occupation of the Rhine takes a much more important place in the coming election than in other years. The Left charges the lukewarmness of the rightists in support of Great Britain and the League in the Ethiopian affair, permitted Hitler to disregard the League and Locarno. The Right holds the Left responsible for alienating Italy and claims the Communists and the U. S. S. R. want to attack Germany.  
The various parties of the Right and Left, however, are by no means in entire agreement on these questions.
