BRITISH COLUMBIA INCREASE

The increase in the number of automobile sales in British Columbia exceeds that of all other provinces except Ontario, according to figures just received. The sales for the year ending February 29, 1936, have jumped to 98,411 from 91,006 in 1934 or a net increase of 7,405. The increase! in Alberta was 4,520; in Saskatchewan, 4,308; in Mani-! toba, only 340; Quebec, 5,358; New Brunswick, 2,303; Nova Scotia, 2,012, and in Prince Edward Island, 43. In Ontario the number in 1934 was 559,393, which increased last year to 585,938, an increase of 26,545, considerably larger than British Columbia but a much smaller percentage of increase. That would seem to indicate that British Columbia is either recovering more quickly than any other province or that the people are more extravagant.

There is every reason to believe that this increase in motor sales is still in progress and that British Columbia will show she is not by any means the last province in recovering her former prosperity.
