## LORD'S DAY ACT TO BE ENFORCED IN VANCOUVER

### LAUNCH QUEEN MARY IS WRECKED CROSSING METLAKATLA SAND BAR

Entwhistle Brothers Have an Unfortunate Start to Their Trip to Masset—Had to Spend the Night on an Island Without Shelter—Lost Their Cargo of Gasoline—Indian Who Lost His Grapes Lost a Box of Oranges Also

An incident showing the risks of the journey to Masset in small gasoline boats loaded with the passenger steamers will not carry on in the small hours yesterday morning. The launch Queen Mary belonging to the Entwhistle brothers of Masset piled herself on a rock outside Metlakatla in the darkness, and was so badly damaged forward that she flooded most at once, and was only pulled ashore and beached in time to save half the cargo. The rest was washed into the sea and brewed the shore near the scene. Their dinghy broke adrift at the time of stranding.

**Had to Swim for It**  
In the effort to save the launch one of the brothers, R. B. Entwhistle, had to swim ashore with a rope at some risk in the darkness, and all on board the wrecked launch were wet through when they landed on the small uninhabited island off Metlakatla. Here they endeavored to make themselves comfortable for the night, managing to light two fires with the only two dry matches they possessed. They had no shelter, and spent the better part of the night searching along the shore to save cases of gasoline which had gone overboard when the launch swamped.

**Hit the Bar**  
On board the Queen Mary on the trip were R. W. Entwhistle, R. C. Entwhistle, A. Munro, and two Indians, Mark Spence and Robert Brown. Brown is one of the best Indian pilots on the coast, but the launch struck as he was trying to make a new short cut at half tide across Metlakatla Bar. Probably if the launch had not been loaded with seventy cases of gasoline she would have passed safely over the sunken rock which pierced her.

**Is He a Hoodoo?**  
Mark Spence (not Brown) is the Indian who fell into the water at the wharf the night the launch started for Masset. He was in his bunk sleeping at the time she struck, and the others were much amused after the "lost grapes" incident, to find that Mark's chief anxiety during the wreck was over a case of oranges he had purchased for the family at home in Masset.

**Lost His Oranges, Too**  
While the rest toiled after cases of gasoline on the beach Mark scoured the shore for oranges, and aroused the frequent enquiry whether he was expecting to find his lost grapes too. In the morning when they were busy signalling to Metlakatla for a boat to take them over there, Mark was busy drying over the fire the colored handkerchiefs he had bought for the youngsters. The accusation that poor Mark is a hoodoo glances harmlessly off his imperturbable personality. He's like Kipling's married man "He wants to get home to his tea."

**Cargo is Principal Loss**  
The Entwhistle brothers think that the repair bill for the launch will be light. The engine is all right. Some of the cargo is lost, that is the main loss. The Queen Mary represents a value of \$1000 at least, and her owners are thoroughly experienced boatmen on this coast. They are, in fact, the holders of the record for the trip from Masset to Rupert in a gasoline boat, and have made long trips north and south of Rupert also.

### ISHI WILL HANG

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—It is reported that it is the intention of the Government to appoint a commission to investigate the business methods of the late Government. It is said it will take two years to complete the researches.

### MASSACRE OF ALL EUROPEANS PLANNED BY TURKS AT SALONICA

Foreign Warships Will Steam to the Protection of the Town—Outbreak of Cholera at Tripoli—Italian Cistern-Ships Will Prepare to Transport Pure Water to Africa for Use of Troops—Casualty List is Said to be Exaggerated

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
Rome, Oct. 19.—A great massacre of all Europeans is planned by the radical element among the Turkish residents of Salonica, in European Turkey according to reports from that place. Measures are being taken at once to afford protection. Vessels from the foreign navies will be despatched.

**Arabs to Fight**  
Constantinople, Oct. 18.—Forty thousand Arabs will fight the Italians in the interior of Tripoli, according to advices received here from the scene of action.

**To Use Aeroplanes**  
Brindisi, Italy, Oct. 18.—Two dirigible balloons, accompanied by officers and soldiers who are experts in aerostatics, were brought here today and placed on board a vessel which sailed for Tripoli. The vessel was escorted by a flotilla of torpedo boats under command of Vice-Admiral the Duke of the Abruzzi.

**Casualties Slight**  
London, Oct. 18.—Now that the cable has been repaired between Tripoli and Malta it is shown that previous reports of the fighting were greatly exaggerated. Dispatches from Malta state that the town is practically unharmed by the bombardment and that the Italian gunners fired so wildly that most of their shots passed over the forts and buried themselves harmlessly in the sand. The only casualties were three people killed while watching the bombardment.

**Cholera at Tripoli**  
All the cistern ships in the Italian navy have been ordered to be made ready for the transportation of drinking water to points along the Tripoli coast occupied by the Italian army if such a course proves necessary. This precaution is the result of the appearance of cholera among the troops.

**Want Turkey Supported**  
Lucknow, British India, Oct. 18.—The Council of Moslems of all India has appealed for the intervention of the British Government in behalf of Turkey. It has advised also a boycott of Italian goods.

**SEATTLE BANK FRAUDS**  
Spurious Pay Checks in Wide Circulation  
(Canadian Press Despatch)  
Portland, Oct. 19.—The local and Seattle banks have been defrauded of large sums by spurious paychecks. The fraud was discovered today when some of these were presented for payment at the National Bank. It is believed that Spokane banks are also victimized.

**RAIN STOPS MATCH**  
Fourth Game in the World's Series Has to be Postponed Until Tomorrow.

Philadelphia, Oct. 19.—Rain has interfered with the fourth game for the world's baseball series, over an inch falling during the day. The indications are for good weather tomorrow.

### ELEPHANT AT TORONTO IS STUDYING DENTISTRY

Has Succeeded in Performing the Difficult Task of Extracting One of Its Own Aching Molars With Its Trunk—The Ache Measured About Three Cubic Inches

Toronto, Oct. 18.—There is an elephant at the Riverdale Park Zoo here which is fast qualifying for a diploma from the Royal College of Surgeons. It has done what many a qualified dentist cannot do. It has drawn one of its own teeth.

For several days of late the elephant was observed to be suffering pain. Its agonies were such that those standing by supposed that someone had broken the law by feeding it something nauseous. It threw up its head and groaned, and inserted the tip of its trunk in its mouth, as though wishing to dislodge something which had stuck there. It worked the trunk frantically, until at last, with a snort of relief, it drew the obstruction out, and cast it outside the enclosure. What was the keeper's surprise to pick up a large molar which had been the cause of all the trouble.

The tooth which the elephant thus extracted for itself measured roughly about 2 1/2 x 2 1/2 inches. It was only a couple of inches deep, and had evidently been broken off in the gums. The crown was in a good state of preservation, but decay was apparent lower down.

### CHINESE REBELS SUFFER DEFEAT

Pitched Battle is Fought Outside Hankow---Chinese Troops Assisted by the Gunboats Defeat the Republicans---Hand to Hand Fighting With Bayonets in the Trenches---Chinese in Canada Send Money to Rebels

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
London, Oct. 19.—Advices from the East today state that the Chinese Imperial troops and revolutionists have come to grips at Hankow. A battle is now raging but is as yet indecisive.

**Government Victory**  
The Government at Peking claims a great victory. Their troops hold the trenches at Hankow as well as the station where the reinforcements are hourly arriving. The rebels have fallen back upon Wu Chang which is said to be strongly fortified. Casualties on both sides are supposed to be large, the fighting at times being at the bayonet point.

**Gunboat Damaged**  
During the fighting, the land forces and Chinese warships shelled the rebels' position, but the despatches state that the fire from the forts was much more effective, and that at least one of the Government gunboats is badly damaged.

**Rebels Attack Foreigners**  
Hankow, Oct. 18.—The rebel mob made an onslaught on all foreigners, especially the Germans, and a battle ensued in the streets of the city. The Germans endeavored to put a stop to the pillaging that has been going on here since the outbreak. The Imperial troops are now on the move to the city. A battle is expected tomorrow. Admiral Piling has reached here with the gunboats and is waiting the arrival of the Imperial troops to give battle.

**Money from Vancouver**  
Vancouver, Oct. 18.—The local Chinese who sent \$20,000 to China to aid the revolutionary movement in February are again collecting a campaign fund. They anticipate the overthrow of the present government and the installation of a progressive administration.

**\$17,000 from Montreal**  
Montreal, Oct. 18.—The Chinamen here have collected a sum of \$17,000 which has been sent through a bank to Hongkong to aid the revolutionists.

**SNAPPED THE BEATRICE**  
Mr. Harris, of Digby Island, Has Some Interesting Photographs.  
Mr. Harris, one of the wireless operators at the Digby Island station, has some interesting photographs of the Princess Beatrice ashore at Noble Island. He snapped the vessel on Tuesday, when she was visited by the Prince Rupert on which he was a passenger.

**Reception for Roche**  
Minnedosa, Man., Oct. 19.—(Special)—Dr. Roche, the new Secretary of State, was tendered a non-partisan reception by the electors of Marquette upon his arrival home today from Ottawa.

**Make Way for Minister**  
Ottawa, Oct. 19.—(Special)—George Gordon, elected member for Nipissing, has resigned in order to allow Mr. Cochrane, Minister of Railways, to offer himself for election.

**BODY WASHED ASHORE**  
Remains of James Carter Who was Drowned Off Queen Charlottes Buried There.  
Yesterday the body of James Carter, the young man who lost his life by the upsetting of a launch in heavy weather off the Queen Charlottes recently, came ashore, and was taken up to the Indian settlement near the scene where the remains were interred.

### "KINGSWAY" CAUGHT MONSTER SHARK

When the trawler Kingsway came into harbor this morning she had on board besides a fine haul of about 120,000 lbs. of marketable fish, a real monster of the deep in the shape of a huge ground shark about fifteen feet long and weighing according to Captain W. H. Brown's estimate nearly 2,400 pounds.

The shark is one of the ugliest looking monsters you could well see, black, rough skinned, with huge girth. Its "waist measure-

ment" is probably about twenty feet. Its stomach was distended with fish, for the ground shark devours everything it can catch, and does considerable damage to the fish beds. Instead of throwing the creature overboard now it is caught, the Kingsway's crew will take it to Paofo where at the fishing station it will be converted into fertilizer. The liver produces a kind of oil useful commercially, and this will be extracted.

Captain Brown mentions that this trip owing to severe weather outside was not as good as many. "There is the chance always with good weather," he says, "of getting a haul of 10,000 pounds of fish in two hours' trawling. To see the net come up filled with red cod, grey cod, white cod, flounders, halibut and sole after a successful shot is a great sight. It looks just like a big colored balloon. Only bad weather prevents us from making such shots every time on the fishing grounds out of Rupert."

### WILD ERA OF LAWLESSNESS ROUSES BOWSER AT LAST

Murder of Ah Wye, Crown Witness Against Alleged Murderer Who Escaped Jail Stirs Public Opinion—Large Illicit Liquor Trafficking With Indians is Blamed

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
Victoria, Oct. 19.—Instructions have been given to Constable Burr, of Ashcroft, to take immediate measures to lead to the speedy termination of the epidemic of law defiance there, largely the result of illicit trafficking in liquor among the Indians of the Clinton Chilcote districts.

It will be remembered that after the murder of Edward White occurred, the suspected Indian Moyie succeeded in breaking jail and is still at liberty. It is regarded as significant that Ah Wye, the Chinaman who was the Crown's principal witness against Moyie, was mysteriously butchered a fortnight ago.

As the first step towards disciplining the Indians, Constable McMillan has been retired from the service to be relieved by the best man procurable. A selection is now under consideration.

### WILL STOP ALL SUNDAY TRADING

Attorney General Bowser Consents to Lord's Day Act Being Enforced in Vancouver.

## THE CENSUS RETURNS

It appears the reciprocity orators who balanced the trade of eight million Canadians against the trade of ninety-two million Americans were all wrong. Canada has not yet attained eight millions. She has only got a good start off from the seven million mark. By the time the complete returns are in her population will still be well below seven and a quarter millions.

The population ten years ago was recorded at 5,371,315. This makes an increase of one and three quarters millions in ten years, an increase roughly of about one third. This while a little less than was expected is an excellent showing. A similar increase in the next ten years will place Canada very close to the ten million mark.

An analysis and comparison of the figures is very interesting. They show that the growth is almost uniformly greater the further west one goes. Prince Edward Island alone has gone back. She had 103,259 in 1901. Today she has but 93,722. Nova Scotia has done little better than hold her own. Ten years ago she had 459,674 population. Today she has 461,847.

Ontario and Quebec, the old rivals have had a curious paralleling of growth. Quebec has increased by 351,799. Ontario has increased by 336,955. The slight advantage Quebec shows makes a much better showing when looked at from the percentage of growth, for she had a smaller population to work on. Today Ontario has a population of 2,519,002 and Quebec 2,000,697. Quebec's growth which is more rapid than the growth of Ontario, has also been much less assisted by immigration.

The greater increases are in the west. Manitoba with an increase from 255,211 to 454,691 nearly doubles her population. British Columbia with an increase from 178,657 to 362,768 (without Yale-Cariboo) succeeds in more than doubling herself. Alberta and Saskatchewan do even better, each of them practically multiplying their population by five within the ten year period. The exact figures to date are: Alberta in 1901, 73,022; in 1911, 372,919. Saskatchewan in 1901 numbered 91,779. Today (without Regina and Battleford) she numbers 453,508.

Most spectacular of all is the growth of the Western cities. Calgary and Edmonton have increased ten fold, while Regina beats all percentages by an increase from 2,249 to 30,210. Vancouver and Winnipeg have room for an argument as to which is entitled to the individual honors for the largest growth. Winnipeg has increased from 42,340 to 135,430, a gain of 73,090. Vancouver has increased from 27,010 to 100,333, a gain of 63,323. But if Vancouver is entitled to take in North and South Vancouver (and this is the way the population of London, England, is calculated) then her growth is 87,125.

Prince Rupert's population is given at 4771. It may be remembered that the News some months ago predicted that the population would be found to be a little under 5,000. One effect of the city census will be to cut off three of the liquor licenses in the city, our Board of License Commissioners having already issued licenses to the limit allowed for a city of 7,500. This liberality by our temperance Mayor may have been due to his desire to show that he is not a bigoted teetotaler. But this, of course, would not be considered a sufficient excuse for wilfully violating the license laws.

Always the human mind turns from the accomplishment of today to regard the hopes of tomorrow. Ten years ago—five years ago—no man imagined that the shores of Kaien Island would ever bear a city. Today we have a city of 4,771 souls. What will we have when the census of 1921 is taken?

## NEWS ABOUT STEWART MINES

Little Joe O. K. Mine is Offered to the Portland Wonder Co.—Mining Progress.

Stewart, Oct. 19.—The chief item of news in Stewart mining circles this week is the offer by Joe Perrault, owner of the O. K. Mine, to sell his property to the Portland Wonder Company. This move is with the idea of protecting the stockholders in the company, which has fallen through owing to the non-payment of the bond by the promoters. Mr. Perrault is now developing the property himself, and has opened up a new tunnel, 200 feet west of the original workings. The new ore is reported very rich.

## Engineers Galore

Five mining engineers have arrived on visits this week, and this indicates the amount of outside attention Stewart is receiving. Both Portland Canal and Red Cliff are on the shipping list, and others will soon follow. The annual meeting of Red Cliff will be held in Vancouver on the 27th inst., when good reports are promised.

## Ben Bolt

Thirty-six men are on the payroll and sinking and drifting are in progress. Application has been made for a wagon road to the property to permit taking in machinery. It is probable that a snow road will be arranged for this fall. Next spring Sir D. D. Mann has in view the erection of a concentrating plant.

## Cascade Falls

Clarence Kirk has commenced the driving of a 300-foot tunnel under contract. Supplies have been taken into camp and development will be continuous.

## Portland Canal

The company purpose sending out another large consignment of concentrates to the Tacoma smelter before the end of the month.

Captain Jack Williams, champion mile swimmer of the world in 1882, is in Canada today. Williams defeated Captain Matthew Webb, the first conqueror of the English Channel, in a great swim in the new basin of the Lachine Canal for the world's championship and a prize of \$1,000.

Captain Williams, who was 77 in April, recently distinguished himself by swimming 33 miles in August last, from Altham, Illinois, to St. Therese, Missouri. During the ex-champion's career he made many notable swims around Montreal, and for a time was swimming instructor at St. Helen's Island. In 1890 he swam across the San Francisco Bay against the cross currents, taking 2 hours and 10 minutes to cover the five miles. A short while later, in an exhibition swim, he went around the famous Seal Rock.

During his life he has saved no fewer than thirty-six persons from drowning, six of these being in Montreal, and in one instance he brought a drowning man back to life after he had been immersed for twenty-five minutes.

Captain Jack Williams is a Portuguese by birth, and came to Montreal in 1874, leaving again in 1882 for the United States, of which country he is now a citizen. In spite of his age, the ex-champion looks as hale and hearty as ever.

"Dentists will tell you that the sugar you take in your mouth acts directly upon your teeth. Dentists shut their eyes to the evident fact that decay starts first in the pulp beneath the intact enamel and honeycombs the interior tooth until the shell-like bridge of enamel breaks beneath the strain.

"The enamel gives absolute protection against the external attacks of acids and sugar. I have immersed sound teeth for months in a solution of fruit acids and sugar and have been unable to detect any erosion of either the enamel or the pulp.

"When you eat sweetmeats the sugar, with its irresistible affinity for soluble lime, combines with the calcium of the blood, and the blood retaliates by seeping the soluble from the pulp and substance of the teeth. Druggists make use of this affinity of soluble lime for sugar when preparing the official syrup of lime. Lime forms a solution thirty-five times stronger in simple syrup than in the same quantity of water. If you want your children to have sound, white teeth, see that their diet is rich in lime and poor in sugar."

### Tomato and Corn Combined

A delicious vegetable dish is "corn and tomatoes." Skin and cook ripe tomatoes as for stewed tomatoes. When about half cooked add sweet corn which has been scored and scraped from the ear, so as to get as little as possible of the fibre of the grains. Stir frequently after adding the corn. Season with salt, pepper, sugar and butter to taste. Also add a small bit of fine-minced onion.

### Potato, Tomato and Salad

Cut four cold boiled potatoes into cubes, and two tomatoes into eighths. Thoroughly mix the potatoes with three tablespoons oil, one tablespoon vinegar; one teaspoon tarragon vinegar, salt and pepper to taste, and one tablespoon finely cut chives. Mould in the centre of a platter, surround with sections of tomatoes, and a border of lettuce.

### Tomato and Crab Salad

Peel and scoop out interior from six ripe tomatoes, salt, drain, and chill. Remove the meat from six or eight crabs, according to size and chill. At serving time mix lightly with mayonnaise dressing which has been delicately flavored with tarragon vinegar and put into the tomato cups. Serve on lettuce.

### Tomato Salad

Wash and cut in small pieces, but do not chop, one large ripe tomato, one small onion, and one green pepper. When ready to serve, pour over salad one-half cup of good vinegar, one teaspoonful salt, and wash of pepper.

### USEFUL INFORMATION

#### Handy Hints for Household Help

Dishes which have contained dough or pastry should be washed in cold, not hot, water. The hot water cooks the dough and so makes it much harder to remove. For scrubbing kettles that have been burned or for removing food that has stuck to the pan in the

process of cooking, nothing is better than a piece of very coarse sandpaper.

A simple way to clean plain pieces of silver is by placing it in a pan in which have been put one quart of cold water and a tablespoonful of washing soda. When the water begins to boil the silver should be removed and immediately wiped.

Batters should be beaten well and then allowed to stand some time before using, in order that the air may pass into them.

Use a hot oven for bread, meat and pastry; a moderate oven for buns and large cakes, and a slow one for milk puddings.

### Handy Mirror

A substitute for a cheval glass may be provided in a little house by fastening an ordinary looking-glass to the inside of a closet door where there is a good light, so that the lower edge of the glass shall be almost level with the bottom of the door. In this mirror one may see very well how a skirt hangs.

### Saves Carpet

Old stair carpet should not be wasted, for it will make good pads to go under the new stair covering. First shake the carpet and then cut away the bad parts; divide the remainder into short lengths, double them, and tack them at the edge of each step, where the thread comes, before laying the new carpet.

### Helps Mother

A gate between two rooms has proved a blessing in one house. It is fastened in the doorway, between the nursery and "mother's room." There are times when the mother likes to watch the children without being right among them. Often sewing or writing may be done more easily with the gate between the mother and the little ones.

### Soft Icing

In case your icing is too soft, try tying a hard of stiff wrapping paper a little higher than the cake, and see how nicely it sets the icing. There is another advantage in this bard. If left on the cake and stood in the cake box they are just as moist a week or two later as the first day baked.

### Woman Diplomat

The first woman to enter the diplomatic service of any country is Miss Clotilde Luisi who has been appointed by the President of Uruguay an attache of the Uruguayan Legation at Brussels. Miss Luisi recently obtained the university degree of Doctor of Laws.

## TWO CONSTABLES ARE DISMISSED

Services of Constables McArthur and Swasey Dismissed With by the Police Commission at Special Meeting Yesterday.

Constables McArthur and Swasey, both of the Prince Rupert police force have been dismissed from the force. This decision was come to after a short meeting of the Police Commissioners, Acting Mayor Hilditch taking the place of Mayor Manson as chairman of the Commission. The meeting was held yesterday afternoon in the Mayor's office at the City Hall and was held behind closed doors.

No reason for the dismissal of the constables is given out beyond the statement by Acting Mayor Hilditch that the men's services are unsatisfactory to the Commission. The Acting Mayor, however, hinted that the reason for the Commission's dissatisfaction with these constables was based on the result of an investigation of charges made that the constables had been too familiar in their associations with the restricted district, for the presumed purpose of keeping themselves posted with the movements of the criminal class frequenting that district.

"The Commissioners intend to put a stop to this intimacy between the police and the restricted district," are the words of Acting Mayor Hilditch as chairman of the Police Commission.

## TROOPS CLASH WAR IN CHINA

Fierce Fighting Between Rebels and Imperial Troops at Hankow—Twelve Warships Present.

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
Pekin, Oct. 19.—The army of rebels and the Imperial troops came into collision near Hankow on Wednesday morning and a battle is now in progress. A strong force is at Wu Chang, and eight warships are in the river opposite the city, the bombardment of which will take place on Saturday. In addition, twelve foreign warships are present.

The German sailors while endeavoring to stop pillaging at Hankow today came into conflict with the rebels and a sharp engagement ensued. Admiral Winslow commanding the British Eastern fleet has arrived at Wu Chang and will take command of the international forces. It is reported that General Li Hung, the commander of the rebel forces, has deserted.

Welland, Oct. 18.—(Special)—The Grand Trunk have in operation between Bridgeburg and Port Colborne a steam motor car with a capacity of 58 people, oil being used for fuel. It is claimed this will be an economical and successful experiment.

### Woodworth Bids

A launch carrying intending bidders for the work of clearing Woodworth Lake shores left for Shawatians Lake this morning. It is remarked in the city that owing to the shortness of the time limit—two months—and the \$25 penalty clause, prices on this work are likely to range higher than might have been expected.

## PRINCESS MARY COMING NORTH

Fine New C. P. R. Flyer Will Make Northern Run This Week End.

News was telegraphed to the port this morning that the C. P. R. steamer Princess Mary will leave Vancouver for the north late tonight, to take the trip advertised for the Princess Beatrice. She will probably be in the harbor on Saturday night.

The Princess Mary is one of the most recent additions to the C. P. R. coast fleet, and is handsomely fitted and fleet-heeled boat. She recently arrived on the coast after making a trip out from Scotland. If she manages to make the port during the evening, she will be the cynosure of many eyes.
