WILL URGE DISARMING

French Will Make New Peace Move at Geneva—Canadian Delegates Arrive

PARIS, Sept. 18.—France, it was intimated in official quarters last night, will open a new campaign for general European disarmament at the forthcoming session of the League of Nations Assembly with a view to ending the present arms race. The co-operation of United States and Japan, without which nations it is admitted no such move could meet with success, will be sought.

One of the first proposals of France will be that all nations should publish their military budgets, something which Germany, Italy and Russia are not now doing.

The disarmament campaign may later be broadened into an economic discussion, the French plan.

LONDON, Sept. 18:—Further details of his projected sub-atmosphere flight across the Atlantic Ocean on October 17, Captain James A. Mollison stated yesterday that his plan was to take off from Brooklyn and make a west to east crossing. He hoped to reach England in seven to ten hours.

Roosevelt At Harvard Today
Attending Three Hundredth Anniversary of Founding Celebration
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 18:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt is here today to attend the three hundredth anniversary celebration of the founding of Harvard University. From here he will proceed to his home at Hyde Park, New York, to remain until he goes to Syracuse, New York, where he will make the opening speech of his presidential re-election campaign.

LONG TIME IN CHURCH
Rev. Byron Sykes Dies in Edmonton at Age of Ninety-Five—Five Brothers in Clergy
EDMONTON, Sept. 18:—Rev. Byron Sykes, one of five brothers all of whom were in the ministry of the Presbyterian Church, died here yesterday at the great age of 95 years. He and his brothers had served with the church in Saskatchewan, Alberta, California and Michigan. He is survived by a widow, three sons and six daughters.

B. C. HEALTH PLAN WILL SWEEP CANADA, MEDICO BELIEVES

MOSCOW, Sept. 18:—The War Commissar of Soviet Russia declared last night that the Red Army was now ready to face the world. "Any nation that would be so bold as to invade Russia," he declared, "would have its forces cut to pieces."

Patmore is acting as counsel for the Margalice which pleaded not guilty to the charge.

G. O. P. NOT OBJECTING
Would Welcome Recount in Maine Senatorial Contest, it is Declared
NEW YORK, Sept. 18:—Republican National Chairman John Hamilton said last night that his party would have no objection to a recount in the Maine senatorial election in which Senator Wallace H. White, Republican, was declared re-elected by a majority of 5,081 over his Democratic opponent Governor Louis B. Brann. Hamilton expressed confidence that the recount, if held, would only increase White's majority.

Blizzard In Peace River
Early Winter Storm Isolates Some Communities of Northern Agricultural Area
PEACE RIVER, Sept. 18:—One of the worst blizzards in years was continuing in the Peace River district last night after having been on for thirty-six hours. Telegraphic communications were interfered with yesterday and the only contact some communities had yesterday with the outside world was by short wave radio.

Churchill Scion Chasing Sister

LONDON, Sept. 18:—Wilfrid Churchill, son of Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, embarked for New York aboard the liner Queen Mary, chasing his sister, aboard the Bremen, with a view to talking her out of marrying a young actor with whom she took part in a recent play.

Thirty Salteries Granted Licences
One Less Plant Being Operated This Year Than Last
VICTORIA, Sept. 18: (CP)—Thirty salmon salteries have been licensed by the provincial government this fall in British Columbia. Seven plants which operated last year will be closed down and six new ones opened, the department says.

Ex-Mayor Taylor Running Again
Will Be Again in Field For Chief Magistracy of Vancouver, He Announces
VANCOUVER, Sept. 18:—Former Mayor Louis D. Taylor, despite advancing years and frail physical condition, announces he will again be a candidate for mayor at the forthcoming civic election.

Blum Hopes To Have Mills At Work By Today
PARIS, Sept. 18:—Following a conference at his home last night between representatives of employers and employees at which the former agreed to grant a six percent increase in wages, Premier Leon Blum expressed hope that the Lille textile mill strike would be ended today and the plants humming again.

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TOLEDO, Spain, Sept. 18:—Leaving some 400 dead on the field and taking hundreds of others injured with them, Spanish loyalist forces were reported last night to have retreated ten miles along the main road towards Madrid before the rebels after one of the most sanguine battles so far in the civil war. The scene of the bloody hand-to-hand struggle was in the vicinity of Talavera.

CORRESPONDENTS ARE TAKEN INTO CUSTODY; FOUND NEAR AIRPORT
MADRID, Spain, Sept. 18:—Three well known American war correspondents, one of them Floyd Gibbons, have been taken into custody for alleged infraction of regulations through having been in the neighborhood of a secret air field where German aviators are said to be based in collaboration with the rebels in the Spanish civil war.

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EAST GETS BIG STORM

Steamer El Amarante in Trouble Last Night—Hurricane Does Damage Ashore Too

NEW YORK, Sept. 18:—Owners of the steamer Al Amarante, which is believed to be carrying no passengers, were advised last night that the vessel was in distress sixty miles off Cape Hatteras in a great hurricane which was sweeping the Atlantic seaboard. The 75-mile tropical gale was gaining intensity along the North Carolina coast last night. At midnight the barometer had dropped to 29.15 and was still going down. Telephone lines had been severed for hours. Coastguard vessels were removing hundreds of people from points of danger. Summer resorters were being evacuated and arrangements were being made for special emergency relief measures.

NIGHT OF TERROR
NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 18: (CP)—Four hundred persons, trapped on Ocracoke Island, North Carolina, emerged safely today after a night of hurricane terror while the storm swept northward along the coast of the United States. A nine-foot tide, driven by a gale, swept completely across the island as the inhabitants took shelter in a lighthouse. Along the coast communications were wrecked and seaside communities flooded.

Missing Fliers Are Being Taken To Edmonton Now
FORT RELIANCE, N.W.T., Sept. 18:—Flight Lieutenant Sheldon Coleman and Aircraftsman J. Forty, Royal Canadian Air Force fliers, who were found on Wednesday at Point Lake, 250 miles north of here, after having been missing for a month while on a survey flight, were receiving medical treatment at the Air Force base here last night. Considering that they had subsisted for a month on a diet consisting of little more than wild berries, they are in fairly good shape. They are to be flown today to Edmonton to receive such further treatment as may be deemed necessary.

Total of Pupils Attending School Here This Year Practically Same as Last Year
Taking into account the ten pupils who will be enrolled in the Senior matriculation which it has been decided to conduct again at King Edward High School, enrolment this term at the city schools totals within one pupil of last year at the same time. There are now enrolled an aggregate of 1122 pupils as compared with 1123 a year ago.

NEAR CINCH FOR GIANTS

Little Danger of Being Overtaken Now in Pennant Race

NEW YORK, Sept. 18:—New York Giants defeated Brooklyn Dodgers at Ebbets Field 17 to 3 yesterday to add another half game to their margin of supremacy in the National League, their lead over the St. Louis Cardinals, idle yesterday, now being five full games. The Giants made 23 hits and Brooklyn 8. It was the largest number of runs the Giants have made in any game this year. There is but the scantest chance of the Terry Men now being beaten for the pennant. In the only other National League game, Detroit Tigers took exclusive possession of third place by defeating Cleveland Indians 5 to 2 at Detroit while St. Louis Browns, at home, were downing the Chicago White Sox by a similar score. Despite the lateness of the season, four American League clubs have yet to decide runner-up positions and rights to world series shares, only two and a half games separating the second place Chicago White Sox from the fifth place Cleveland Indians.

Story of Trip To Canal Zone

Edward Lipsett Tells of Visit To Columbia and Costa Rica At Rotary Luncheon

The story of a trip to Colombia and Costa Rica was told by Edward Lipsett of Vancouver at the luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at the Commodore Cafe yesterday. What seemed to have particularly impressed Mr. Lipsett in regard to Colombia was the large crop of beggars which kept up a continual barrage on the visitors. At Cartagena the people had neither their water supply nor sewer system but the country around was infested with snakes. The natives were very clever in using the machete in cutting a path through the jungle. Occasionally they met with a boa constrictor but they cut off his head and used the body for food. A traveller in that country found his party had run out of fat for frying. Next morning they had fried eggs for breakfast as usual and, when he inquired where they got the fat, they said it was snake grease.

The beauties of the canal and surrounding country were extolled by the speaker and also the wonderful healthful condition made possible by the American engineers who rid the whole section of the country of mosquitoes.

Costa Rica was a wonderful producer of coffee and fruits. Huge quantities were exported. A visit was paid to San Jose, about four thousand feet up in the mountains. There the climate was very pleasant compared with the coast which was too hot for clothes. Cattle were kept in large numbers in the high country and the meat exported.

Mr. Lipsett told a number of interesting stories and his snappy way of telling of his experiences kept the members of the club and visitors interested all the time.

From the Waterfront

According to word received in Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon from Alaska, business people of Ketchikan, Juneau and other Southeastern Alaska ports have been warned by the Alaska Steamship Co. that the company may have no boats operating north from Seattle after the end of the month owing to marine strike conditions and advising that supplies be brought in before that time. The present agreement with longshoremen at Seattle expires at the end of September and, apparently, a marine tie-up is regarded as quite possible.

There were 151 passengers in all aboard the steamer Princess Louise on her arrival here yesterday afternoon from Alaska enroute to Vancouver. Eight passengers disembarked from the vessel here while four took passage at this port for the south on her.

Three hundred and seventy-six whales have been taken this season in waters around the Queen Charlotte Islands by the six ships of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation operating the whaling stations at Rose Harbor and Naden Harbor.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. Henry Anderson, is due in port at 7 o'clock this evening from the south and will sail at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

A. S. Munro, chief engineer; Fred Coram, purser, and other members of the crew of the steamer Prince George, which has been tied up in the local dry dock for the winter, sailed for Vancouver on the Prince Rupert last night.
