

best endeavor to facilitate the achievement of that object, it being understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of the existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine."

Prof. Garstang says the mandate was created with the latter aim in view and, although it contained the proviso quoted the Arabs received it with misgivings.

Palestine's resources are very! imited and the Arab population and other small communities aleady number nearly 1,000,000. The Arabs became alarmed when in 1926 the tide of Jewish immigration eached the high level of 13,000. Economic problems ensued. The administration advised restraint and immigration was limited.

As a result of repeated riots and disturbances, the British government sent two royal commissions to the Holy Land and, upon their findings, a statement of policy, published in 1930, recognized "that there was a shortage of land, and that immigration should be more

closely controlled." "It would appear to have been the plain duty of His Majesty's government," Prof. Garstang continues, "to have suspended immigration entirely at this stage. What, however, followed? During the last five years more than 160,-000 Jews were admitted into the country and a further 100,000 acres passed from the Arabs to the Jews. No country in the world could support such rapid development as

### Backward Dad Must Beware

Judge Reminds Father That Victorian Era Has Passed
