Young Guardians of Forests Doing Good in Small Communities Of Central Interior

VICTORIA, Aug. 6:- In the little communities of British Columbia, west of Prince George, boys and girls known none of the delights of city amusements and they have to make their own fun. Out of this necessity has come a unique young people's movement to which the provincial forestry service attaches great importance - the Young Ranger Bands, who have taken upon themselves the job of guarding British Columbia's for-

E. C. Manning, chief forester who has just erturned from a tour of the central portions of the province and was initiated as an honorary member of the movement, said he did not believe any thing quite like the Ranger Bands existed elsewhere.

A member of a Ranger Band belongs to a secret society, full of a rich symbolism which is built on forestry lore. The meetings are held in secret, with pass words and elaborate ritual, all representative of the forest. Thus the "Pine" Tree," the "Cedar Tree" and the 'Spruce Tree' are high officials of the lodge.



Georges Rivollet, former French pensions minister, said French veerans are proud to show their appreciation and friendship which remain as sincere as when the Canadians cast in their lot with the French in the bloodiest war the world has ever known.

Following M. Rivollett, Major M. Gregg, V.C., Ottawa, said:

"I interpret the thoughts and feelings of all members of this pilgrimage when I voice their warmest gratitude to the government of France, to Marshal Petain, to the members of the honor and reception committees, to the veterans and to all the people of France for your wonderful generosity."

Marshal Petain, summoned by the blowing of a bugle, then approached the balcony of the Invalides, and in a ringing voice said, in part:

"During the war a daily communique from the front sometimes announced reverses, but for the Canadians they only brought news of victories. They were valiant soldiers whose courage knew no

"Their memory will live forever n the hearts of the French poilu, because he, having overcome the hardest trials, knew how to appreciate true courage."
