"THE FIRST GREAT BETRAYAL"

It is not to be expected that any political leader selecting a Cabinet can please all his followers. But Mr. Borden in his efforts to secure a ministry of all the talents seems to have been more than ordinarily unfortunate. Tory Toronto, the headquarters of Conservatism in Canada, seems to be very much torn over his Cabinet selections. The selection of Mr. W. T. White-probably the ablest and strongest of all the new ministers, is being made the subject of bitter protests.

The Toronto Telegram, whose ultra violent Conservatism is almost a byword has come out in open attack and is asking the Ontario Conservatives to defeat Hon. W. T. White and Hon. Frank Cochrane at the forthcoming by-elections. The introduction of the French Nationalist and clerical representatives into the Cabinet is the ground of the Telegram's bitterest ire. In an editorial entitled "The First Great Betrayal" it says:

"If Hon. R. L. Borden and the Borden Government have any real friends in Ontario, these friends will set to work and defeat Hon. Frank Cochrane and Hon. W. T. White in any constituency to which they may appeal in this Province.



PEANUT FARM FOR PROFITS

Plant Peanuts Instead of Potatoes and Put Pence in Your Pockets.

A farmer named Cleveland Roberts of Feeding Hill, U. S. A., has raised a remarkable crop of peanuts during the past season that proved profitable as well as an interesting experiment. Early last spring he invested in a pint of unroasted peanuts-60 peanuts in all, count 'em-at one of the local stores, and planted them on his farm, with such success that he sold his crop of four bushels to Henry J. Perkins at a price that shows that native-grown peanuts are as profitable as potatoes.

> The pint of peanuts was planted in a light soil in the same manner that one plants potatoes. one peanut being placed in each hill. The crop was cultivated in the same way as potatoes, several hoeings being given to keep down the weeds. When harvest time came Mr. Roberts was surprised ' not only by the size of the crop, but also by the size of the peacuts. Many of the shells contained six large, perfectly-formed peanuts and there were large quantities of the humped-back, double-jointed va-

Mr. Roberts kept the largest peanuts and will exhibit them at the Suffield fair. He is convinced that profitable crops of peanuts can be raised in Feeding Hills as well as in Virginia, and will plant larger amount next season.


