Cantabs Win Over Oxtord By Five Lengths in Great Boat Race on Thames River Today

PUTNEY-ON-THAMES, England, April 4: (CP)-Cambridge" eight defeated the Oxford crew today for the thirteenth time in succession in the annual inter-varsity boat race along the Thames River by five lengths in twenty-one minutes and six seconds. Oxford led at the one mile mark after Cambridge had got away first but, as the race progressed, Cantabs overhauled their rivals and went ahead.

It is estimated that 100,000 spectators lined the banks, undeterred by a cold, drizzling rain.

Bravely, Expiates Kidnap-Murder of Four Years Ago

Never Confessed

Final Scene in Sensational Case Which Cost One Million Dollars to Solve

TRENTON, N.J., April 4: (CP)-Bruno Richard Hauptmann was put to death in the electric chair at the New Jersey State Prison here last night for the kidnap-murder MINISTER of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr. MINISTER on March 1, 1932, a crime which he refused to the end to admit. He met death bravely, praying in German, hopeful to the end that another miracle might save his life. However, one failed to materialize.

OTTAWA, April 4: (CP)-An appropriation bill exceeding \$50,000 .-000 for relief purposes and to provide employment will be submitted to Parliament before the Easter adjournment next Wednesday. Premier William Lyon Mackenzic King announced in the House of Commons last night shortly before the House gave second reading to the government bill establishing a national employment commission.

FIGHT FOR RECOGNITION

A letter published elsewhere written by Olof Hanson to Doodads vs. Bluebirds. the minister of marine asking for recognition of the porti, of Prince Rupert in all future ship subsidies, is just one detail of the fight for recognition which it is necessary for any small and aspiring port to make before it is eventually looked upon as a real Canadian port. The small place is usually handicapped as against the big centre. That is why it is so necessary that Prince Rupert have a strong and active Chamber of Commerce.

A GREAT RELIEF

It is a great relief, even here in Prince Rupert, to think! that Richard Hauptmann has passed to the great beyond. If he had lived he was in danger of becoming an international hero. As it was he provided headlines for newspapers persistently for several years.

The incident draws attention to the need in the United States of a more circumspect manner of dealing with criminals. To allow newspapers to pass on every detail of FOR SALE 80 h.p. Gulowsen Grei their actions while in jail and to play up the exhibitions; of grief by nearest relatives, is hardly in the public interest. The gruesome details which fill newspapers and radios in connection with the execution of a baby killer reminds one of the public executions of a few years ago. when everyone took holiday to see the misery of the GENTLEMEN-Personal drug sunwretched criminal and to jeer at him in his last moments. Today we are publishing details of this execution, not because we think it in the public interest to do so but because it is being done by every other newspaper depending on public support for its existence and the public seem to demand it as long as it can be obtained. While doing so we still feel that such scenes should not be available to the RELIABLE man to take care store public. We are not apologizing for its publication but possibly doing so will be one step toward making people realize that restriction of such scenes would be in the best interests of the people of the continent.
