The British Columbia Game Department is endeavoring to stock the Queen Charlotte Islands with beaver and last evening a family of these fur-bearers consisting of the male, female and three young arrived at Prince Rupert by the steamer Catala from Bowron Lake in the Cariboo district, where they had been captured, and was taken this afternoon by Game Warden Ed. Martin aboard the provincial police boat P. M. L. 8, in charge of Sergeant Harold Raybone, to Yakoun River in Massett Inlet to be liberated.




