He predicted that the third party would carry at least 12 states in November, that it would hold the balance of power and that he would be the next occupant of the White House.

DEAN DOING GREAT JOB

National League City Chosen For Opening of Annual Baseball Classic

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—At a meeting on Saturday of Major League executives concerned with Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, commissioner of organized baseball, Wednesday, September 30, in the National League city winning the pennant, was set as the opening date for the 1936 World Series. The second game will be played the next day in the National League park and the scene will then shift to Yankee Stadium for the third, fourth and fifth (if necessary) games on October 3, 4 and 5. Further games, if necessary, will be played in the National League venue.

New York Yankees, who have long since cinched the American League pennant, may be faced by either the New York Giants, St. Louis Cardinals or Chicago Cubs with the Pittsburgh Pirates also having a remote chance to get in.

Lone Hurler Keeping St. Louis Cardinals in Pennant Race

NEW YORK, Sept. 14. (CP)—St. Louis Cardinals, crippled as their pitching staff may be, are continuing their game fight for the National League pennant and, as a result of week-end play, actually clipped the lead of the New York Giants another half game to three and a half games. Again the sensational pitching of the great "Dizzy" Dean kept the Cardinals in the running. On Saturday Dean pitched a gem for the Brooklyn Dodgers to seven hits in the nightcap of a double-header and the Cards won 10 to 3 after having lost the opener 9 to 8. Yesterday the Cardinals again dropped an opener to the New York Giants and Dean was called into the breach in the nightcap and stopped a Giant rally, giving the Cards the win 4 to 3. The largest Major League crowd on record—64,417, crowded the Polo Grounds to see yesterday's games. Lon Warnecke pitched the Chicago Cubs to a brilliant four-hit shut-out over the Giants on Saturday.

There was little change in the American League situation as a result of week-end play. The Cleveland Indians won a double-header from the Philadelphia Athletics yesterday and moved into a tie for fourth place with the Detroit Tigers who lost to Boston Red Sox.

Collier attained fame in the newspaper world in April 1898 when he "scooped" the world on the story of the avalanche on the Chilkoot Pass which killed 63 "Gold Rushers." In those days before there was telegraphic service to the Yukon, he delivered his story south to the Hearst newspaper service by specially chartered steamer in a hectic race against time with other newspapermen.

DON'T SPOIL YOUR SAVINGS

THE accumulated assets of the life insurance policy-holders of Canada are the largest—by far the largest—single class of investment holdings in the country. They include every type of speculative investment, but owing to the nature of the insurance contract the greater part of them consists of credit claims against property, with principal and interest payable in fixed dollar amounts, rather than ownership equities whose value and income depend upon earnings. The owners of these investments are only nominally the insurance companies themselves, some of which are wholly mutualized, and all of which administer total funds in which the shareholders' proportion is an almost infinitesimal part; the real owners are the policy-holders themselves. And in spite of the existence of a fair number of very large policies which may be regarded as a class of rich men's investments, or thousands of dollars, the chief asset and the metaphorical anchor to windward of some industrial, commercial or professional worker who has not accumulated and never will accumulate any other important asset.

No act of destruction or partial destruction of the value of any such credit claim, be it a government bond, a municipal bond, a public utility bond, a railway bond, an industrial bond or an ordinary property mortgage, can ever fail to impair the assets of the life insurance policy-holders of the country. Any widespread destruction of such values must necessarily render the function for which those policy-holders rely upon them. The same is true of any tampering with the value of the unit of currency in which these credit claims are expressed. Policy-holders who have any real regard for the interests of their beneficiaries—the women and children whose benefit the vast majority of life insurance policies are taken out—should set their faces immutably against all government tendencies leading to partial or complete repudiation of debt contracts, for such tendencies are destructive to the whole system of insurance.

The object of insurance is to make something sure. The effect of repudiation is to make everything unsure.

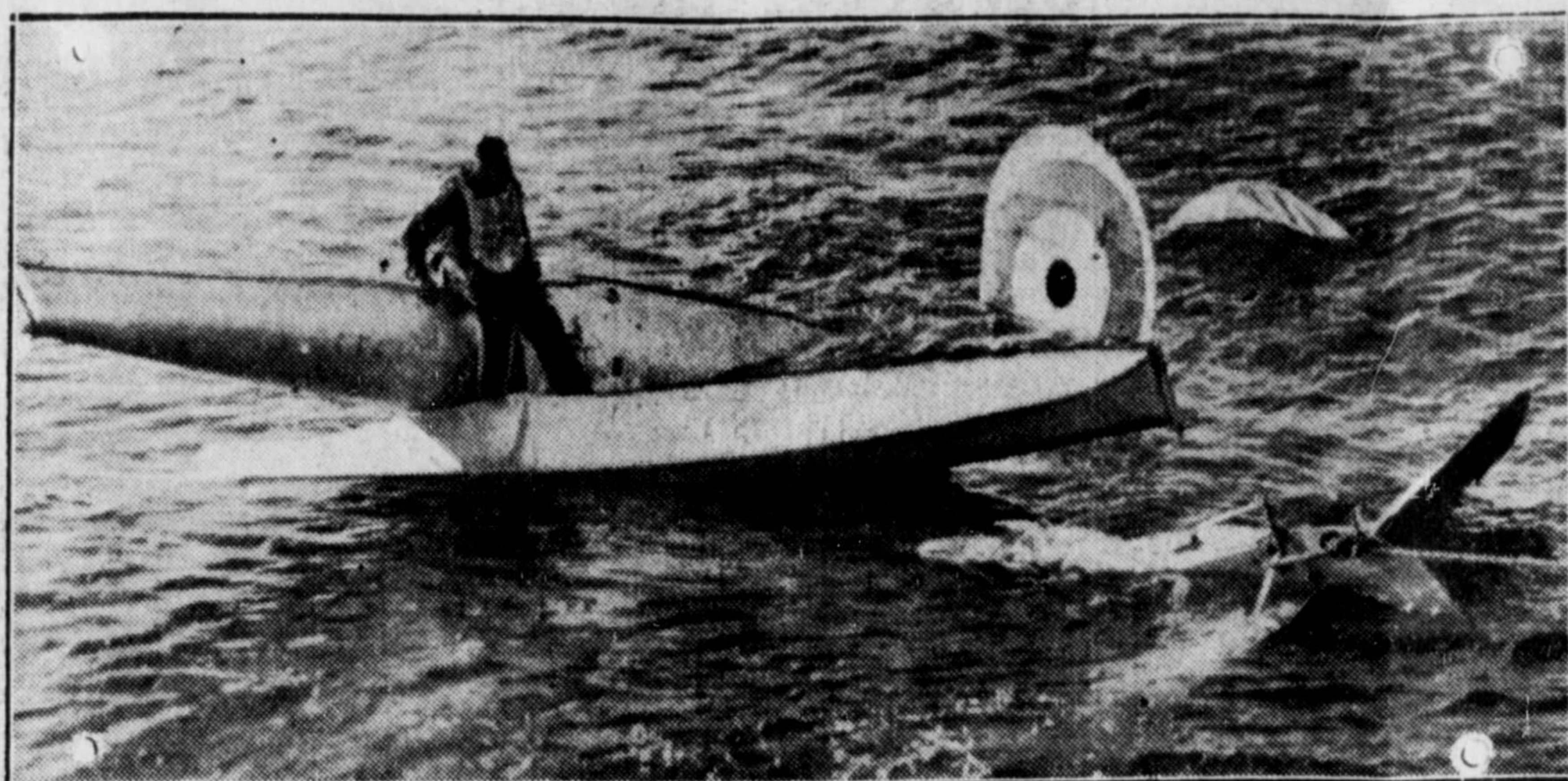
