Many people, especially financial experts, seem to autumn colors. think Alberta is in the soup because the credit of the province makes it impossible to borrow money. Prince Rupert is in a somewhat similar position. The ections by Mrs. J. C. Gilker and credit of the city is not good enough for borrowing so we Miss Aileen Hamblin. must do without things we cannot pay for. That is probably a good thing for the city. Alaska cities have been in that position, yet it was possible for them to build their own schools, taking up the bonds themselves instead of going outside for the money, just as Vancouver put up the money for the new city hall.

Unrestricted credit is often a bad thing for any community. It will be several years before Prince Rupert is PHONE-957 able to go to the money markets for funds, even if the present plan of close financing is kept up and the city is not suffering from inability to borrow.

With the money markets of the world closed to Alberta, the most the province can do is to spend her own money and that she has a right to do as long as she does not interfere with the other provinces. Refusing to meet her obligations with the outside simply cut her off from outside supplies for public purposes. Why should we worry? Why should she?

Why Cheerful

Prince Rupert people are cheerful today because of the prospects. Plans being made for the city include a new post office, an ore sampling plant, improvements and additions to both big cold storage plants, the establishment of a pulp mill in the city, building of a naval reserve headquarters, increased shipping through the port including grain shipping, mining development in almost every direction, other possibilities not yet announced. This should be enough to make everyone expectant to say the least. It also seems likely that home building will re-commence on a small scale next year and that will set a good many people to work.
