Salmon taken in Canadian waters, chiefly on the Paci-St. Louis fic Coast are the most valuable fish taken. The total catch last year was sold for something over twelve million dollars. Next to salmon in value came lobsters with cod third, herring fourth, whitefish fifth and halibut sixth. Here in Prince Rupert where halibut is looked on as being so important, it will be a surprise that halibut ranks so low and that herring, used here chiefly for bait, should rank so high.


