MORE JAPANESE TROOPS IN CHINA

BLAINE IMMIGRATION OFFICER IS SLAIN

Partner of Red Ryan In Serious Condition After Border Affray

Drew Gun and Shot United States Inspector When Stopped For Searching at Bus Station—Identity Given by Fingerprints

BELLINGHAM, Wash., May 29: (CP)—A man positively identified by means of fingerprints as being Edward McMullen, partner of "Red" Ryan, killed last weekend in a liquor store hold-up at Sarnia, Ont., is in a serious condition in hospital here following a shooting affray at the customs office at Blaine yesterday in which Charles Flachs, United States immigration officer, was killed. The man, who gave immigration officials the name of John A. Fraser of Vancouver as he stepped from a bus at the international boundary line, refused to allow himself to be searched when suspicions of officials were aroused. He pulled his gun and shot Flachs. Others grappled with him and, as he attempted to shoot again, his gun discharged, a bullet entering the left eye and piercing the brain.

Official Announcement of May 12 As Date is Made Today

LONDON, May 29: (CP)—Proclamation setting the date for the coronation of King Edward VIII as May 12, 1937, was issued yesterday by Premier Stanley Baldwin. It has been announced that the ceremony of investiture with authority of the British Throne will take place in Westminster Abbey.

STRIKE IS ALL OVER

Tie-up of Logging and Lumber Industries Down the Coast is Completely Ended

VANCOUVER, May 29: (CP)—The strike of British Columbia loggers and lumber workers is now completely over, according to statements Wednesday from both the British Columbia Loggers' Association and the British Columbia district coast council of the lumber and shingle workers.

EARL ROWE IS LEADER

New Head of Conservative Party in Province of Ontario Chosen

TORONTO, May 29: (CP)—Hon. W. Earl Rowe, aged 42, was yesterday elected as new leader of the Conservative party for the province of Ontario. Former Dominion Conservative organizer and Member of Parliament for Dufferin-Simcoe, Mr. Rowe succeeds Former Premier G. S. Henry who resigned the leadership yesterday after having held it for five years.

Cabinet Shuffle Is Not Expected

Following Appointment of Successor to "Jimmy" Thomas as Colonial Secretary

LONDON, May 29: (CP)—No further immediate realignment of the British cabinet is expected now following the appointment yesterday of Rt. Hon. William George Armstrong-Gore, former Postmaster-General, as Colonial Secretary succeeding Rt. Hon. James H. Thomas who resigned after his name had been connected with premature disclosure of budget secrets.

Death List In Crash is Seven

More Lose Their Lives in Northern Quebec Than Was at First Reported

SENNETERRE, Quebec, May 29:—Seven and not six persons as at first reported were killed in the airplane crash in the mining country near here, it was officially announced.

CAMPAIGN WARMS UP

Tight Three-Cornered Contest in Victoria Federal By-Election

VICTORIA, May 29: (CP)—With the nomination of C. J. McDowell as Liberal candidate, there are now three in the field for the federal by-election in Victoria on June 8 made necessary by the death in Ottawa recently of D. B. Plunkett. A close fight is anticipated with Dr. S. F. Tolmie given a good chance to retain the seat for the Conservatives. The C. C. F. candidate is Prof. King Gordon whose supporters are expecting him to make a strong run. Mr. McDowell will have the prestige of being the government supporter.

IS NAMED CANDIDATE

Dr. Alfred Thompson to Contest Omineca in Provincial By-Election

(Special to the Daily News)
BURNS LAKE, May 29:—The Conservative nominating convention for the Omineca provincial by-election in Burns Lake yesterday with Robert Reid of Vanderhoof in the chair unanimously chose Dr. Alfred Thompson of Vancouver as Conservative candidate. Seventy delegates were in attendance at the convention at which considerable enthusiasm was displayed.

A well known and popular northerner, Dr. Thompson for many years was Member of Parliament at Ottawa for the Yukon. He formerly practised as a physician and surgeon at Dawson but for several years now has been located in Vancouver. He is a brother of James H. Thompson of Prince Rupert. Last fall he took part in the federal election campaign in Skeena and Cariboo ridings in support of the Conservative candidates.

OTTAWA, May 29: (CP)—Official announcement was made by the federal Department of Public Works last night of the awarding of the following contracts in connection with the improvement of the fishermen's floats at Prince Rupert: Floating breakwater, John Currie & Son, \$9,741. Dredging, Armour Salvage & Towing Co., \$6,765. Work on both contracts will be started almost immediately.

CREDITORS IN FIELD

New Political Party Makes Debut—Communism and Fascism Flayed

VANCOUVER, May 29: (CP)—Social Credit became officially a political party in British Columbia today with Premier William Aberhart of Alberta as the first honorary president of the British Columbia organization. Representing eleven provincial constituencies, fifty-five delegates organized Wednesday night. The party's manifesto flays communism, fascism, financial dictatorship and "financial racketeering."

MARY HAS SET MARK

Has Speedy Day's Sailing But is Unlikely to Lower Record of French Liner Normandie

ABOARD R.M.S. QUEEN MARY, May 29: (CP)—It is estimated that, if the great new Cunard White Star liner Queen Mary, now about midway across the Atlantic Ocean on her maiden voyage, maintains her present rate of progress, she will be about nine hours short of the present record for the ocean crossing held by the French steamer Normandie. The Normandie's time for the crossing is four days, eleven hours and forty-two minutes. Her average time was 30 3-10 miles per hour. The Queen Mary broke the Normandie's record for a full 25-hour day's run by travelling 747 miles up until noon today ship's time. The average speed during the period up to noon was 29.76 knots. The Normandie's best day's run was 744 nautical miles.

IDENTITY IS MADE

Body Found Up Harbor Yesterday Was That of Johnny Larsen, Missing Fisherman

By means of the clothing, identity of the man whose body was found up the harbor yesterday between the entrance of Shawatlans Passage and Delhi Bay has been definitely identified as being that of John Larsen, local fisherman, who became missing from his trolling boat, Shrimp, at Cow Bay about February 5 and was believed to have fallen overboard. An inquiry was held yesterday afternoon by Deputy Coroner A. J. Lancaster who satisfied himself that death was due to accidental drowning.

Larsen was about 30 years of age and was born at Port Essington. He was unmarried. Surviving relatives include a brother, Eddie Larsen at Klemtu, and three sisters Dora Larsen of this city and Elsie and Mary of Vancouver. The remains are in the hands of Hayner Bros., undertakers. The funeral took place this afternoon with Adjutant Eva Laycock, Salvation Army, conducting the rites. Interment was made in Fairview Cemetery.

Tientsin Has Warlike Appearance Today As Further Troops Enter

Chinese Are Beginning to Feel They Have to Resist With Force if Incursions Into North Part of Their Country Continue

TIENTSIN, China, May 29: (CP)—Defying official Chinese protests, Japan sent three thousand marching men into North China today. Tientsin took on a warlike appearance as Japanese infantrymen and tank corps moved into barracks. The troop movements give rise to declarations among the Chinese that the country must prepare to resist further incursions by force.



Dallying of United States Senate On Sockeye Pact—Purse Seiners Object

Forging Ahead in American League—Cards and Giants Battling Hard

NEW YORK, May 29: (CP)—Scoring a close 5 to 4 victory over Brooklyn Dodgers at the Polo Grounds Wednesday, New York Giants, behind the pitching of Carl Hubbell, moved into a tie for leadership of the National League with the St. Louis Cardinals who were swamped by the Pittsburgh Pirates at Sportsmen's Field. The Cards, however, resumed exclusive leadership yesterday although beaten by Pittsburgh as the Giants dropped a double-header to Boston. The Pirates, as a result of two victories, were again in third place ahead of Chicago Cubs who lost on their home field to Cincinnati Reds on Wednesday but won yesterday. The Reds are in sixth place. The Phillies, playing at home, defeated the Boston Bees and climbed out of the cellar, leaving Brooklyn once again at the bottom.

The New York Yankees, by defeating the Boston Red Sox at Boston Wednesday and Thursday, increased their margin of leadership in the American League to two and a half games.

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DR. LENOX IS LEAVING

Gave Farewell Address at Annual Meeting of Anglican W. A. Yesterday

Dr. Eleanor Lenox, Japanese missionary under the Anglican Church in Prince Rupert, gave her farewell address to the Women's Auxiliary yesterday afternoon at the annual meeting in the Cathedral Hall. She has been superannuated after many years in the service of the church, thirteen of which had been in connection with the Japanese mission in this city.

In her address to the ladies she told of her early life in Toronto where, at her mother's wish, she studied medicine at the university and took her degree of medical doctor. Her mother did not live to see her desire fulfilled as she died while her daughter was taking her oral examination. The death of her father took place soon afterwards and it was then she decided to accept a call to go to the mission field in Japan.

In Japan there was keen competition with the Buddhists which made the work there difficult. The Buddhists formed women's associations and also adopted music in their services to offset the Christian hymnal services.

At Port Essington a Buddhist temple had recently been erected. The fishermen's union and the Japanese consul opposed this move.

An encouraging sign was that one of the leading Japanese and his wife were recently confirmed as members of the Anglican Church. Miss Lenox said she had enjoyed the work in Prince Rupert very much. She did not yet know who her successor would be.

Mrs. Rix, after commenting on the wonderful work she had done in the city, moved that a standing vote of thanks be given Miss Lenox.

Mrs. Brown of Port Essington, in seconding it, spoke of the splendid work Miss Lenox had done in Port Essington.

Mrs. J. B. Gibson gave an encouraging and inspiring presidential address.

Mrs. G. A. Kelsey was made a life member in the organization in recognition of her outstanding work for the church. Mrs. J. D. Allen and Mrs. Rix performed the ceremony of pinning on the badge. Rev. Canon Rushbrook spoke most appreciatively of the work done by Mrs. Kelsey at St. Peter's. Tea was served by the ladies at 4 o'clock and after tea Miss Davies gave a report on the pageant "Like a Mighty Army" during the Jubilee celebration at Ottawa.

NEWS OF THE MINES

Placer Areas of North Recommended to Prospectors —Activity in Omineca District—Another In Two Brothers Valley

The black sand deposits of the Queen Charlotte Islands are among placer areas of the province of British Columbia recommended by the provincial Department of Mines to prospectors who are well conversant with mining. Other areas in this district suggested by the department as fruitful placer mines include Douglas, Maroon, Hall

men arrived at Vanderhoof recently from Vancouver and continued their journey to Fort St. James. Part of the crew is going as far as Baldy Mountain and the rest will journey to Manson Creek. They have taken a quantity of supplies north from Vanderhoof with them.

Mike Milos and partners have been doing assessment work recently on the Portland claims, formerly known as the Big Mike, down the canal from Stewart.

Sam Kirkpatrick, well known pioneer miner of Stewart, who has been since 1931 in the Red Rock area of the Cariboo district, is expected to return to the Portland Canal camp shortly.

S. G. Blaylock, vice president and general manager of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., in his annual report to the shareholders, refers as follows to the company's placer operations at Slate and Manson Creeks in the Omineca district: At Slate and Manson Creeks the drainage ditch was completed in December and bedrock gravel tested in the lower sections. Values up to \$13.50 per yard were obtained and, with some additional equipment, a profitable

operation is indicated for the coming season. Transportation facilities are becoming gradually improved and the area is attracting other operators.

Reward Mining Co. Ltd. is proceeding with its operations on the Edye Pass property, adjoining the Surf Point mine on Porcher Island, which it recently acquired from F. T. Patterson for \$40,000 payable over a period of three years. New camp buildings have been erected and, during the past week or so, approximately \$17,000 of mining machinery and supplies have been placed on the property. A tunnel has been started at sixty feet above sea level with the object of encountering the second vein in which surface work has indicated an ore shoot of over three feet wide and assaying two and a half ounces of gold per ton. All of four veins, which indicate an average value of well over one ounce of gold per ton, will be cut on the first level by this tunnel. As soon as sufficient ore has been developed underground, a concentrating mill will be built and the concentrates shipped to Tacoma smelter. The directors of the company report that they fully expect to have a small mill in operation on the property by November of this year. The Frank Waterhouse freighter Northholm today called at the mine with a large shipment of machinery and mining equipment.

Morgan Logging Co.'s tug J. R. Morgan, formerly Prince Albert, was in port this morning from the Queen Charlotte Islands to take on fuel. The J. R. Morgan, which is in command of Capt. S. Salvesson, is busy these days towing rafts of logs from the Islands to the mainland.
