CHARGE OF ESPIONAGE

Japanese Naval Officer and Former U. S. Petty Officer Indicted In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, June 25: (CP)—A man identified as Toshio Miyasaki, a lieutenant commander in the Japanese Navy, and a former non-commissioned officer in the United States Navy, were indicted by a federal grand jury on Wednesday on charges of conspiracy to violate the Espionage Act.

The United States officer indicted was Petty Officer Harry Thompson who allegedly received money for revealing naval secrets.

ON FLIGHT TO MOSCOW

Clyde Pangborn, Noted Long Distance Aviator, Planning Daring Trip to Europe

DALLAS, Texas, June 25:—Clyde Pangborn, noted long distance flier, is here on his way from California to New York with his "Flying Wing" plane, embodying many new and radical features in aircraft construction and equipment, in which he will attempt to fly via New York and Paris to Moscow. His intention is to fly through the stratosphere at an altitude of 20,000 feet, taking special oxygen equipment for breathing.

Disposes of His Residence on Fifth Avenue East to Capt. Sam Hougan

DIAGNOSIS OF CANCER

Chances of Recovery Described At Convention in South

VICTORIA, June 25: (CP)—Early diagnosis of cancer was possible only through competent x-ray and only through surgical removal of the gastric lesion might the patient be afforded a prospect of cure, Dr. Verne C. Hunt of Los Angeles said in an address to the Canadian Medical Association at its annual convention in Victoria today.

Approximately twenty percent of patients with cancer of the stomach may be cured by operative means, Dr. Hunt said.

President Installed

ADDIS ABABA, June 25:—Ethiopian prisoners of war numbering 322 were released by the Italian authorities yesterday. Fifty of them are said to be joining the Italian Army at their own request while the most of the others are taking jobs with the Italian government.

BIG FIGURE IN MARKET

Trading Success of Arthur W. Cutten Made Him Mystery Oracle

CHICAGO, June 25: (AP)—Arthur W. Cutten, who died yesterday in Chicago, balanced the world's need for breadstuffs against the world's precious supply of them, calculated the result, added the wiles of an expert market trader, and converted the mixture into a tremendous bank account.

He did it so unerringly and so often that he made himself a legend. To the uninitiate in the nation's market places he was the personification of astuteness; a figure cloaked in mystery, an oracle who spoke seldom but weightily.

He had a small office across LaSalle Street from the Chicago Board of Trade. His name was not lettered on the door. There was nothing to indicate that behind it were issued orders that profoundly affected the prices of commodities and of stocks and, indirectly, many lives.

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LAST BIG PARTY OF INDIANS DUE HERE TOMORROW

VANCOUVER, June 25: (CP)—One hundred and eighty Indians from Hazelton left here aboard the steamer Prince George last night for Prince Rupert on the last lap of a 1500-mile journey from their homes to the Skeena River fishing grounds where they will be employed for the summer. They are the last of four parties totalling 700 who have been brought around via Jasper Park and Vancouver owing to the railway tie-up out of Prince Rupert.

SALVAGE DELAYED

Impossible to Release Vancouver Tug From Boxer Reef Until Higher Tides

Capt. W. P. Armour returned to port this morning from Boxer Reef near Butedale with the salvage boat Algie, reporting failure so far to take the Vancouver tug D.B.M. off the rocks where she piled up at a high tide this week while engaged in towing Queen Charlotte Island logs to Ocean Falls. Higher tides on July 3 or 4 are being awaited before another attempt is made to free the D.B.M. The vessel is leaking slightly but is believed to be in no immediate danger.

The smaller salvage tug Daly, which was also called to assist in the salvage of the D.B.M., has proceeded to Ivory Island to pick up and return to port with a scow which was used recently in taking building material for the new lighthouse to be built at Ivory Island by Mitchell & Currie.

IS COMING TO ISLANDS

Noted Explorer and Writer Now in Vancouver on Way North

VANCOUVER, June 25:—An interesting visitor at the Canadian National Steamships offices here yesterday was Amos Burg, famed National Geographic Magazine writer, explorer and lecturer whose hair-raising adventures in the south seas have been witnessed by thousands of travel motion picture enthusiasts. This summer he will make motion picture stories in Alaska and in British Columbia's Queen Charlotte Islands for release through one of the large Hollywood organizations. He also plans on writing a number of travel articles in which the waters of British Columbia will receive prominence.

REPUBLICAN CHIEF SURE

National Chairman Declares Election is "In the Bag" For Republicans This Year

WASHINGTON D.C., June 25:—Arriving here yesterday, John Hamilton, chairman of the Republican national committee, predicted that the presidential election was "in the bag" for the Republicans. The Grand Old Party, he declared, would carry all but six or seven states. The entry of a third party, he felt, would be all for the benefit of the Republicans.

Hamilton stated that Republican headquarters would be moved next week to Chicago.

ROBINSON CHAIRMAN

Veteran Senator and Staunch New Dealer to Guide Philadelphia Convention

PHILADELPHIA, June 25:—The veteran Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas was yesterday elected permanent chairman of the Democratic national convention here. One of the chief champions of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and the New Deal, Senator Robinson made a great fighting speech after being chosen to the chairmanship. He declared that, notwithstanding all charges to the contrary, President Roosevelt had adhered faithfully to the Democratic platform as laid down at the national convention in Chicago in 1932. He raked the Republican 1936 platform and its interpretation by Governor Alfred M. Landon, presidential candidate, from top to bottom.

A STRANGE STORY

A strange story of modern communication is being told by the United States ambassador in connection with the relief of the United States Legation at Addis Ababa at the close of the Italo-Ethiopian War. The two legations in Addis Ababa were only five miles apart, but the Americans were beleaguered by a murderous rabble and no message could be sent direct. However, with a small portable wireless set the American minister got in touch with one of his country's warships, who relayed it, via the Philippines, to San Francisco and Washington. Washington got on the trans-Atlantic telephone to Mr. Bingham in London; Mr. Bingham rang up the Foreign Office, and five minutes later Sir Sidney Barton in Addis Ababa was making his dispositions for the relief of the threatened legation.


