HONOR OF FORMER KING IS QUESTIONED

Outspoken Words of Archbishop Of York; Speaks on Abdication

Should Have Made Decision Before Awakening Love For Another Man's Wife Developed Into Passion, High Churchman Declares

YORK, Eng., Dec. 22: (CP)—The Archbishop of York broke his silence on the abdication of King Edward VIII and in words even more outspoken than those of the Archbishop of Canterbury which drew fire of sections of the press and Parliament implied that the former monarch's decision would not have been made by a man of honor.

Inter-American Peace Parley At Buenos Aires Ended Yesterday

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 22:—The Inter-American Peace Conference concluded yesterday with the final plenary session when final adoption was given before adjournment to numerous resolutions which had been passed during the sessions of the past few weeks. Delegates are leaving today on their return to their homes. The American delegates, of course, will be unable to get home in time for Christmas.

NO BREAK IN SIGHT

Hopes For Early End of Shipping Tie-up Dimmed by Latest Move

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 22: (CP)—Hints of extension of the maritime unions' "united front" to include the Atlantic and Gulf port strikers dimmed prospects today for an immediate break of the shipping blockade.

As the costly tie-up entered its fifty-fourth day Harry Lundeberg head of the Sailors' Union of the Pacific, indicated that a membership vote on a tentative agreement with the ship-owners may be deferred indefinitely.

PROMINENT IN FERNIE

Sherwood Herchmer Was Mayor Of Crow's Nest Pass Town For Two Years

FERNIE, Dec. 22:—Sherwood Herchmer, barrister and solicitor of 35 years' standing here, was one of the best known of Fernie's citizens. He was an ex-mayor of the city and had served the public in numerous other ways.

Mr. Herchmer was born in Winnipeg in 1877, the son of L. W. Herchmer who in his day was prominent in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He was educated at St. John's School and College in Winnipeg. Called to the Northwest Territories bar in 1899, he came to Fernie in 1901, was called to the British Columbia bar and had practised here ever since. He served with the First Canadian Mounted Rifles in the South African War in 1902 and was in the engagements of Johannesburg, Sand River and Diamond Hill, winning a bar and four clasps. In 1909 and 1910 Mr. Herchmer was mayor of Fernie. He married Edith Catherine McDonald in 1905 and they had one son. His recreations were curling and tennis. He was a Conservative and an Anglican.

The people have always loved "the little Duchess" because she is so sweet and friendly and wholly unassuming—as unspoiled and lovely as the heather blossoms from her own home highlands of Scotland. They sometimes called her "the smiling Duchess," too, for she has a winsome smile—a real smile of warmth that comes from the heart—for everybody, whether they be humble folk or great personages.

Elizabeth comes from a long line of aristocracy herself, but her attitude towards life has given the impression that she had stowed away in her pretty head the thought that if a member of the nobility cut his finger he would bleed red blood, just like any ordinary mortal, and not the blue blood one might expect from delving into books about the peerage. She never has put on any airs, and that gets her a long way with the people.

Her husband, now the King, always has been like that, too. One of the achievements he is proud of is his sponsorship of a boys' camp, in which boys of all classes are thrown together and made to like it. As Duke he never was happier than when in a camp outfit, mixing with these youngsters.

Throughout their married life of 13 years the Duchess has worked with her husband among the poor in such labors of love. They have made a great pair and have devoted much time to such altruistic enterprises.

Charming and Sensible

In her private home life Elizabeth, who is a charming and gracious figure in a drawing room, has presented a picture of a good Scottish housewife, with all the common sense of her race. Five Regional Control Centres Are to be Set Up; To Improve Service

"Religious Wars" to be Banned—Programs to be Distinctively Canadian—General Manager Speaks Tonight

OTTAWA, Dec. 22: (CP)—Establishment of five regional control centres for Canadian broadcasting services, initiation of an engineering program to complete and improve coverage and a ban on "religious wars" on the air were announced by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation after a meeting of the board of governors today.

Regional areas will be set up in the Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario, the prairies and British Columbia and the Corporation will embark upon a distinctively Canadian program scheme. Co-operative relations with commercial broadcasting will be established and intimate contact will be maintained with listeners. It will also be endeavored to lengthen the daily time on the air.

A plan will be worked out for the improving and extending of coverage during the next three to five years.

The general manager, Major W. E. Gladstone Murray, will speak over Corporation stations at 10:30 p.m. (7:30 p.m. Pacific Standard Time) today, outlining progress made to date and the decisions of the committee.

DEADLOCK IN STRIFE

War Continues in Spain Despite Cold Weather—Christians Exchange of Prisoners

MADRID, Dec. 22:—Despite wintry weather, fighting continues in the Spanish civil war with both sides claiming victories although neutral observers express the opinion that the situation is pretty well deadlocked.

An exchange of prisoners between the government and insurgents at Christmas is being discussed.

First Legal Step Towards Marriage Of Juliana Taken

THE HAGUE, Netherlands, Dec. 22:—The first official step preparatory to the marriage of Princess Juliana to Prince Bernard of Lippe-Biesterfeld took place here on Sunday when the royal couple signed the marriage register. The wedding takes place January 7.

RUSSIA ON WAR BASIS

Industry Speeded up With Working Hours Doubled—Warships To Protect Shipping

MOSCOW, Dec. 22:—In view of the situation both in Europe and the Far East, Soviet industry has been placed on a war basis with twelve to fifteen hour working days replacing the prescribed seven-hour day.

To protect Russian shipping against possible attack, a fleet of thirteen warships—eight submarines, three torpedo boats and two destroyers—was rushing through the Black Sea yesterday towards the Bosphorus.

President Gomez Of Cuba Vetoes 9-cent Sugar Tax

Impeachment of Head of Government is Voted by House of Representatives

HAVANA, Cuba, Dec. 22:—President Gomez officially vetoed the 9-cent sugar tax yesterday. The political crisis has, therefore, become the more intense with opponents of Gomez, led by Colonel Batista, succeeding in bringing impeachment proceedings against him on intimidation charges.

The House of Representatives today by a margin of three voted to impeach President Gomez. The ouster vote came at the close of an all night session, the House, by its action, showing support of Cuba's "strong man," Col. Batista, who sponsored the bill.

The sugar tax bill would have raised \$1,500,000 to provide funds for army taught rural schools.

Germany and Russia

Commenting on the anti-Communist agreement between Germany and Japan, the "Stock Exchange Gazette," London, says: "The most powerful argument against the probability of Germany or Japan attacking the Soviet Union is provided by a glance on the map. In the first instance Germany and Russia have no common frontier. For German troops to reach Soviet soil they will either have to pass through Lithuania and Latvia, or Poland, or Czechoslovakia and Rumania. Two further possibilities are a naval landing at Leningrad or in the Crimea. An attack through the Baltic and East European states, however, would certainly be resisted to the utmost by those countries, and would give the Russians ample time to organize their counter-offensive. Neither the Baltic nor the Black Sea coast of the Soviet Union offers any major military possibilities as a starting point for an attacker. Moreover, any definite military objective is protected by many miles of barren territory.

"Then there is the air force. Berlin and many of the German big towns and industrial centres are within Soviet bombing range. Thus, while a German army would have to fight its way through one or two of the countries separating Germany from Russia, the Soviet air force would play havoc with the German rear. The Germans, however, would be able to retaliate only to a very limited extent. Eighty percent of Soviet territory is outside the German bombing range, including the districts in which is situated the Soviet war industry.

"What is true of Germany in this connection is also true of Japan, which is also at the mercy of the Soviet air arm, without being able to retaliate accordingly.

"If we look at the Far East we find exactly the same position. All the time that Japan has been growling at Soviet Russia she has expanded into China at the expense of British and American interests. Thus both countries have been, and still are, using their anti-Soviet attitude as a shield behind which aims of an entirely different nature are pursued.

"Those who are still somewhat sceptical as to the correctness of this interpretation of German-Soviet and Japanese-Soviet relations, are invited to a glance at the state of German-Soviet trade. In 1934 German exports to Russia amounted to 28,000,000 roubles and during the first nine months of 1935 this figure was 14,300,000 roubles; but during the corresponding period this year German exports have amounted to as much as 202,000,000 roubles to Russia and the larger part of this consisted of machine tools for armament factories.

"This enormous increase in German exports to Russia is the direct consequence of the Rm. 200,000,000 credit granted by Germany in April, 1935. The credit is now exhausted and negotiations are in progress for a further German credit of Rm. 300,000,000. It is scarcely probable that Herr Hitler would supply M. Stalin with Rm. 500,000,000 worth of essential machinery, if he were contemplating war."

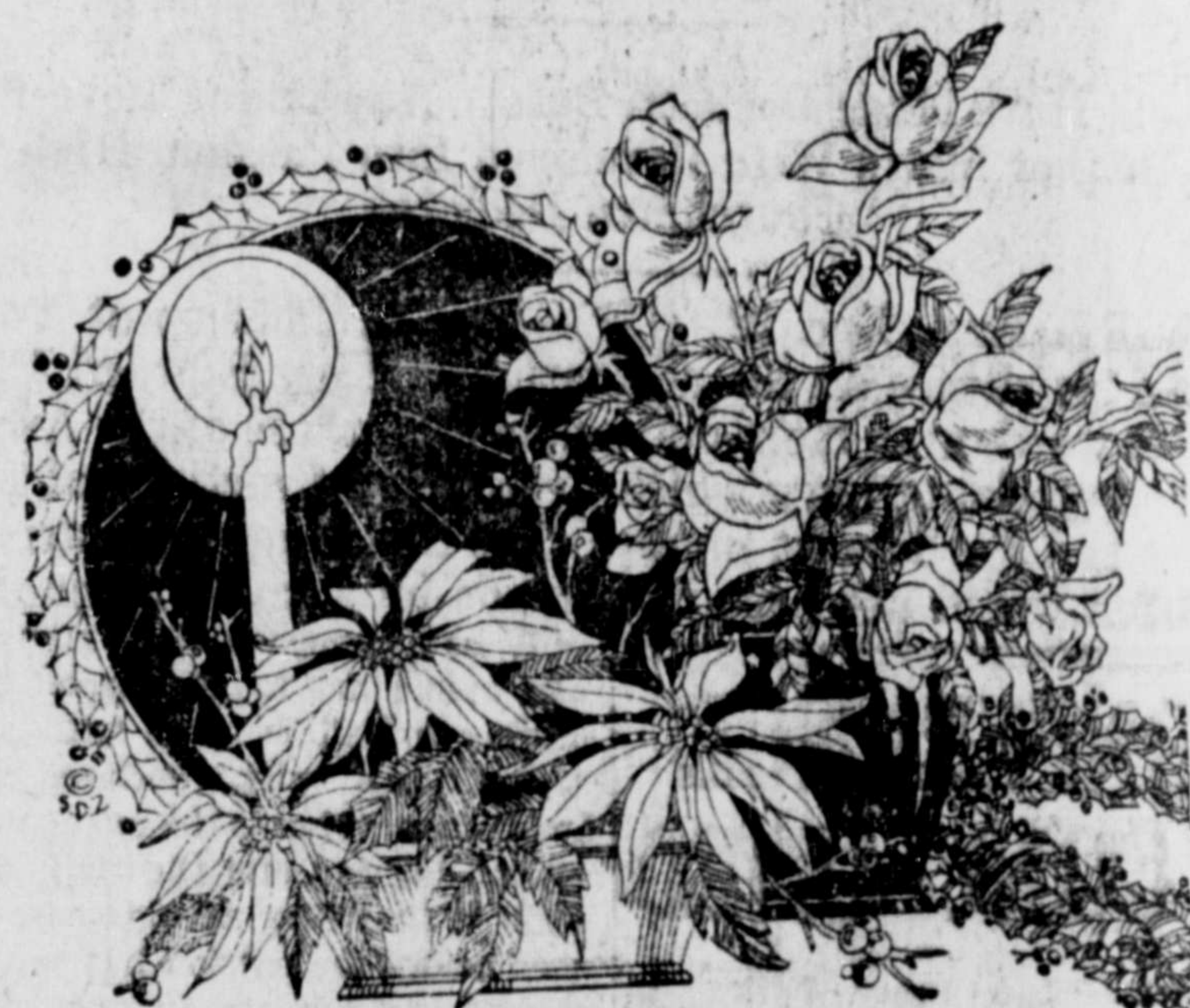



Official batting records of the National League for 1936 show that 245 players took part in championship games. Of this number, 82 engaged in 75 games or more, 111 took part in 10 to 74 games, and 52 appeared in fewer than 10 games. Paul G. Waner, Pittsburg, for the third time in his career led the batters with a percentage of 373. This is the third consecutive year a Pittsburg player has topped the league. Forrest Jensen, Pittsburg, by going to bat 696 times, established a new league record, displacing the mark of 681 held jointly by Joseph G. Moore, New York, made in 1935, and Lloyd J. Waner, Pittsburg, made in 1931. Floyd Vaughan, Pittsburg, scored most runs, 122.

Joseph M. Medwick, St. Louis, accumulated most base hits, 223; most total bases, 367, and established a new league record for two-base hits, with 64. The previous record was 62, made by Paul G. Waner of Pittsburg in 1932. Iral R. Goodman, Cincinnati, for the second consecutive year made most three-base hits, 14. Melvin T. Ott, New York, for the first time in his career had a clear title to home run honors, with 33. Twice before he had tied for the lead in this department, in 1932 and 1934. Leo J. Norris, Philadelphia, made most sacrifice hits, 21. John L. Martin, St. Louis, scored most bases, 23. Joseph G. Moore, New York, produced most one-base hits, 160.

OLD-TIME CRICKETER RESIGNS LONDON, Dec. 22: (CP)—On the Marylebone Cricket Club staff since 1910, Jack Hearne, 46, is resigning to enter the building trade. He played in the 1911-1912 tests with Australia and for years assisted Middlesex in the county championship.

Seven players took part in all their club's games: Joseph M. Medwick, St. Louis, 155 games; Frank J. Demaree, Chicago, 154; John A. Hassett, Brooklyn, 156; Burgess Whitehead, New York, 154; Leo J. Norris, Philadelphia, 154; August R. Suhr and Floyd Vaughan, Pittsburg, 156. By playing in all his club's games in 1936, Suhr increased his unbroken string of consecutive games to 784. He began his streak on September 11, 1931. Three Boston players—Eugene Moore, Baxter B. Jordan and Anthony F. Cuccinello—by hitting two doubles each in the first inning of the first game against St. Louis, August 25, set a new record, displacing the mark of two apiece made by Thomas Burns and Fred Goldsmith, Chicago, September 6, 1933, seventh inning.

Charles H. Klein, Philadelphia, hit 4 home runs on July 10, against Pittsburg, setting a modern National League mark. His achievement equalled the best previous mark, set by Robert Lowe, Boston, May 30, 1894, and duplicated by Edward Delehanty, Philadelphia, July 13, 1896. Klein also tied the extra-base record for one game held by these two players. Joseph M. Medwick, St. Louis, by making 10 consecutive hits in 10 times at bat, tied a record held by three players. He made seven of the hits in a double-header, July 19, and three hits in his first three times up on July 21.

John R. Mize, St. Louis, had the longest consecutive streak, batting safely in 22 games. During this run he went to bat 82 times and made 32 hits for a percentage of 390. His record began in the first game of August 2, against Philadelphia, and was stopped on August 25, first game by Boston. John L. Martin, St. Louis, by scoring 19 runs in 13 consecutive games, acquired the longest run-scoring streak. He began it May 7, against Philadelphia and was stopped May 23, by Chicago. Chicago and New York tied for the longest winning streak, with 15 consecutive victories each, while Philadelphia had the longest losing streak, 14 defeats in a row. By winning the pennant last season New York tied Chicago for most league championships won, with 14.

The club batting records show Pittsburg leading, with a percentage of 2857, which includes going to bat most times, 5586; scoring most runs, 804; making most hits, 1596, and most three-base hits, 80. Philadelphia, for the second consecutive year, allowed most runs by opponents, 874, and made most home runs, 103. St. Louis accumulated the most total bases, 2270, most two-base hits, 332, and stole most bases, 69. Chicago totalled most sacrifice hits, 137. Brooklyn collected most one-base hits, 1179. Boston, by making 7 doubles in the first inning of the first game on August 25, against St. Louis, es-

NEWS OF THE MINES

Attention Again Focussed on Babines—Moving Mill Machinery to Big Missouri—Wellnund Closes For Winter

Highly satisfactory smelter returns on a recent ore shipment from the Silver Pick property near Smithers, reference to which was made in the Daily News last week, has again served to draw attention to the Babine district. This was the third shipment from that property to show eminently satisfactory values. The Silver Pick, formerly known as the Little Joe, was bonded from Tom King and Martin Cain in the early fall by H. H. Metzgar, A. Berg and J. J. Herman who went to work taking out ore for shipment. Returns from a shipment of ten and a half tons netted \$1280.74 after paying treatment charges of \$86.54 and freight charges totalling \$257.07.

The Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. has just about completed the construction of a private road from Joker Flats, where the present mine camp is situated, to Big Missouri, on completion of which heavy mill machinery now standing at Joker Flats will be taken to the mine for installation. The chamber on the mill level, 250 feet long by 12 feet wide, will be used for the storage of the mill machinery until the mill drift and cut-out are completed. The tunnel at Big Missouri is now being driven at a rate of fifteen feet per day to serve the underground mill. A large quantity of balls to be used in the Big Missouri mill recently was delivered at Stewart.

The Wellnund Mining & Milling Co. closed down operations for the season at the end of last week. The Wellnund Co. started operations the latter part of April and, with the exception of two shutdowns caused by flood conditions in Glacier Creek, operated the mine and mill continuously. The greater part of the ore milled this year was extracted in the old Dunwell workings from No. 3 level while a considerable amount of ore from the Ben Ali unit at the mine was also milled with good results. In addition to milling ore from its own operations, the Wellnund treated several shipments of custom ore from neighboring properties including the Lakeview, Kansas and Cantu. It is planned to resume operations at the mill in the spring.

Sister of Ocean Falls Man Passes

Miss Florence Johnson, who passed away in Vancouver last week, is survived by a brother, Henry Johnson, at Ocean Falls. She also leaves her mother, two sisters and another brother. Miss Johnson was 27 years of age.
