GERMANY NERVOUS

Mobile Guards Keep Order in Alsace-Lorraine Over Week-End

STRASBOURG, Oct. 13.—Mobile guards prevented serious trouble as a result of demonstrations among extremists in Alsace-Lorraine over the week-end after rightists endeavored to break up a Communist meeting.

Germany Protests
PARIS, Oct. 13: (CP)—The German embassy announced today that an official protest had been delivered to France concerning alleged statements made by Maurice Thorez, Secretary General of the French Communist party, during a speech at Strasbourg during party rallies in Alsace-Lorraine. A German embassy spokesman said that Berlin took a serious attitude toward the Communist campaign in Alsace-Lorraine and looked for a quick explanation from Premier Leon Blum's government.

TOLL OF TYPHOON

At Least 193 Dead in Philippines And Widespread Damage Is Done

MANILA, Oct. 13: (CP)—At least 193 lives are known by official tabulation to have been lost, an undetermined number are injured and 654 missing as a result of a week-end typhoon over Luzon Island. Rice and other crops were laid low and communication lines and roads were put out of commission. Suddenly swollen rivers swept away countless of native dwellings and thousands are homeless. Relief measures are being instituted. Entire communities were wiped out by the storm, the worst in the history of the region, which has been raging since Saturday.

Lloyd George Is Confined to Home

Great Britain's Wartime Prime Minister is Suffering From Severe Cold

LONDON, October 13.—Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, Great Britain's wartime Prime Minister, now 73 years of age, is confined to his home with a severe cold. Physicians, while stating that his condition is not serious, prescribe strict rest.

New International Monetary Stabilization Agreement Is In Effect For Three Nations

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 13.—A new international monetary agreement between United States, Great Britain and France designed to stabilize the currency of the three countries and provide for the orderly exchange of gold between the three nations in order to support paper currency without fluctuation goes into effect today. It is operative on a day to day basis subject to cancellation on twenty-four hours' notice by any of the parties concerned. So far, it is confined to the three nations but others may join.

One of the features of the agreement is that gold will be transferred between the governments and not by banks or private interests. Thus foreign exchange speculation is completely removed. The agreement is described by Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau as a "new kind of gold standard." Providing for free exchange of gold between the stabilization funds of the three nations, more normal trade relations is one of the important aims of the agreement by curbing currency speculation and putting a check rein on exchange fluctuations.

AFRAID OF JAPANESE

Alaska Fishermen See Invasion—Ask Abolition of Traps

SEWARD, Alaska, Oct. 13: (CP)—United Fishermen of Alaska, in convention here Saturday, urged federal and territorial authorities to head off what they termed threatened invasion by Japanese red salmon fishermen. Numerous complaints have been received recently that Japanese, with floating canneries, have been fishing for Alaska-spawned and British Columbia-spawned salmon just outside the three-mile limit. The fishermen also unanimously adopted a resolution asking for the abolition of fish traps in Alaska.

Dr. Patterson Is Heard at Terrace

Small but Attentive Gathering Hears British Columbia Leader

TERRACE, Oct. 13.—Dr. F. P. Patterson, Conservative leader for British Columbia, spoke in the Oddfellows' Hall Thursday last. There was a small but attentive gathering. The doctor severely criticized the Pattullo government and he also did his best to destroy the C. C. F.'s. But it was noticeable that he was rather vague as to what the Conservatives intend to do about it.

Things Looking Better Declares Assistant Secretary

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—Edward F. McGready, assistant secretary of labor, back on the coast with a view to reaching a settlement of the dispute between marine workers and shipowners which threatens a general strike and shipping tie-up on the expiry of the fifteen day truce this Thursday, stated last night that the situation looked better now than it had for two weeks.

FASCISTS GOING ON

Key to Madrid's Power Supply Is Taken—Biggest Single Battle Since Great War Is Expected

SAN MARTIN DE VALDEIGLESIAS, Spain, Oct. 13: (CP)—The Fascist insurgents continued to make headway in their drive towards Madrid over the week-end, the most important development being their capture, on Sunday, among other points, of the town of Cebreros, key to Madrid's power supply. Yesterday government forces launched fierce counter-attacks and claimed to have made the rebels retreat, leaving 300 dead on the field at at least two points. Government planes bombed insurgent troops today in a concerted drive in the attempt to halt the Fascist drive on Madrid.

With 200,000 soldiers being massed and preparations being made for every type of modern warfare, military observers expect that the impending siege of Madrid may prove the largest and most sanguine single military engagement since the Great War. In defence of Madrid hundreds of women were preparing to stand by their husbands. Supplies and arms were being moved into the mountains north of Madrid by the government.

Brother Pierre, who was the lover of Mata Hari, noted spy during the Great War and who became a monk after her execution, was reported killed in an attack on a monastery yesterday.

CANDIDATES ARE HEARD

Roosevelt Speaks in Denver Yesterday and Landon in Cleveland

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 13.—Speaking from the steps of the Capitol building here yesterday, President Franklin D. Roosevelt was cheered wildly by a gathering of sixty thousand persons. He was given an enthusiastic and spontaneous reception. His address was of only fifteen minutes duration but he responded sharply to the criticisms of his political opponents, whom he charged with shutting their eyes to the pressing problems of the past four years. This was the western extremity of the President's tour and he turned back eastward from here.

Landon Makes Charges
CLEVELAND, Oct. 13.—After making numerous stops in various parts of Ohio yesterday, Governor Alfred M. Landon, Republican, candidate for President of the United States, spoke in Cleveland last night. He advocated return to the "fundamental principles of free enterprise" and accused the administration of using relief funds for political purposes. He charged that citizens had been forced to sell their votes for bread.

ENGLISH DISORDER

Fascists and Communists Clash Both in London and Liverpool

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Fascist-Communist disorders broke out in both London and Liverpool on Sunday but were kept fully in control by the police. Nine arrests were made as a result of alleged breaking of windows in Jewish stores by Fascists.

Grain Ship Next Month

First grain ship to load at this port for over a year, the British steamer Swiftpool is coming the first week in November to load a full cargo from the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator for delivery to the United Kingdom or Continent, it was learned today.

PASSES AT SMITHERS

'Pete' Birnie, Pioneer Prince Rupert Boy, Dies in Interior

SMITHERS, Oct. 13.—The death occurred in the Bulkley Valley District Hospital at Smithers Saturday morning of A. E. (Pete) Birnie, son of Mrs. K. E. Birnie of Smithers. Mr. Birnie was taken seriously ill to the hospital less than a week ago and was not able to survive his sickness. Mr. Birnie and his mother have been residents of Smithers for many years but had formerly lived at Terrace and at Prince Rupert where they were well known to many people who will be grieved to hear of the passing of Mr. Birnie.

Being of a cheerful disposition Pete was very popular with everyone and he will be much missed about town, especially in musical circles where he had been very active. He also took a keen interest in baseball and other athletics although unable to participate actively himself. Only last month he made a trip to Prince Rupert with the Smithers baseball club, acting as official scorekeeper. Mrs. G. W. Mackay of Dawson is a sister.

Friction Between Lemke-Townsend Is Being Developed

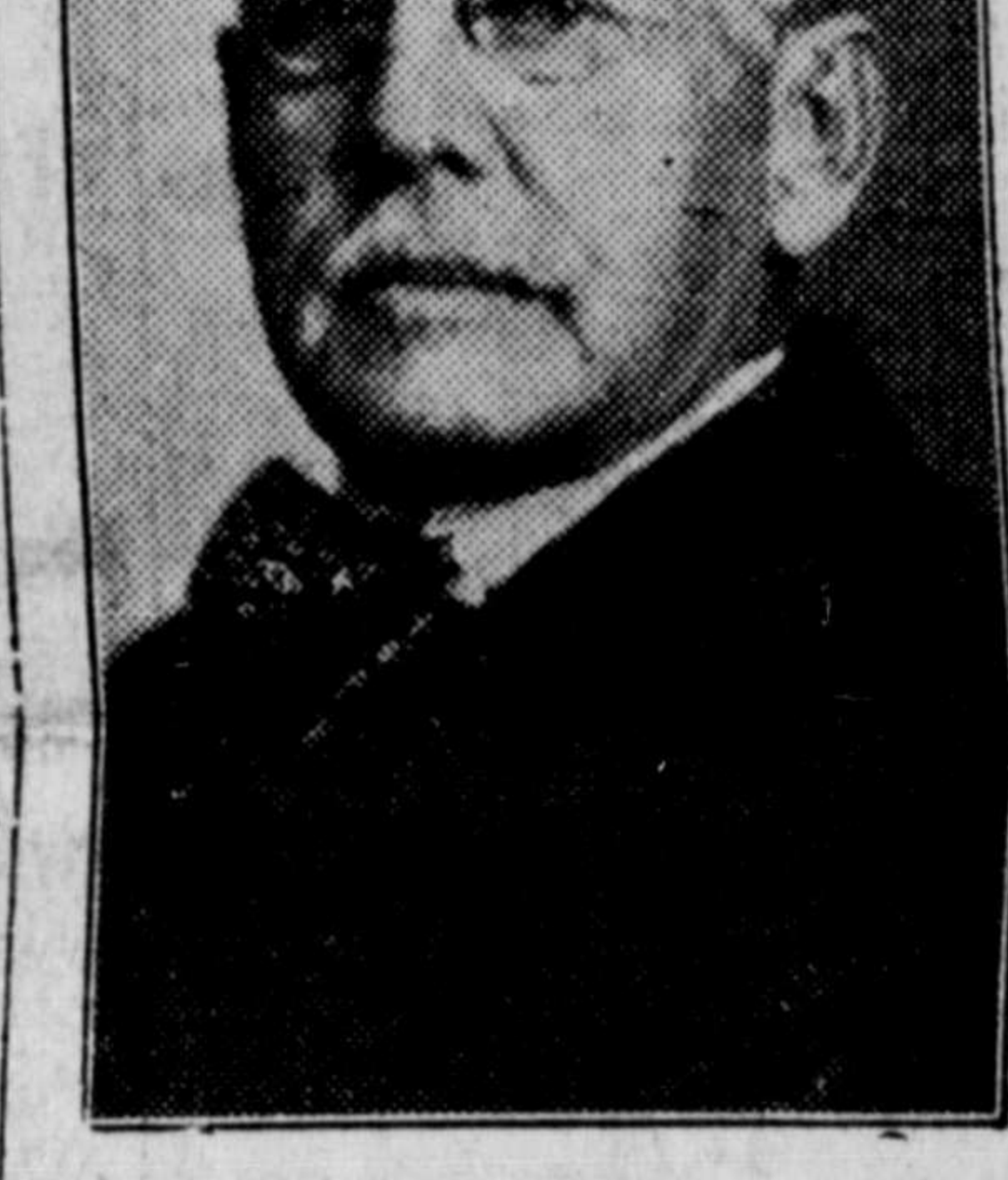

Tear Gas is Used By Police to Break Up Demonstrating Mob

Three Hundred Men Forced Their Way Into Hamilton Hall, Knocking Over Police Officer in Doing So

VANCOUVER, Oct. 13: (CP)—Tear gas was used by police this forenoon to disperse some three hundred men who forced their way into Hamilton Hall, provincial relief depot on Hamilton Street. Demonstrators, single unemployed transients, who had been seeking relief in Vancouver, knocked over a police officer to gain entrance. They were dispersed by police reinforcements after about a dozen had been taken into custody. Three police officers were cut about the head and a number of demonstrators suffered bruises.

WOULD MEND DIFFERENCES

American Federation of Labor Holding Olive Branch To Insurgents Under Lewis

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—The executive of the American Federation of Labor moved yesterday towards making peace with the ten rebel unions led by John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America. A sub-committee of three is to be named today by William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, to confer with the insurrectionist groups and, if possible, iron out their difficulties with a view to reconciliation. It was not known, however, if the latter would accept the olive branch. Lewis has been demanding complete reinstatement for his groups in the American Federation of Labor.

Hindenburg To South America

Will Augment Southern Transatlantic Service Carried Out By Graf Zeppelin

FRANKFORT, Germany, Oct. 13.—The great new German dirigible Hindenburg is to go on the regular run between Germany and South America this winter, augmenting the service carried out by the older and smaller Graf Zeppelin.

Discover Fish With Pyorrhea

Rex Beach Tells of Infected Teeth Is Now in Alaska

VANCOUVER, Oct. 13: (CP)—Rex Beach, well known writer, now in Alaska on a search for mountain leather deposits, while passing through Vancouver said he had discovered fish with pyorrhea in Western Ontario.

The discovery was made near Hudson, Ont., where he had stopped to do a bit of muskalonge fishing. There, he said, he found fish with infected teeth.

"Yes sir," he exclaimed, "at certain times of the year their teeth start to loosen up and they certainly have a mouthful of them."

His search for mountain leather he believed would take him as far north as Juneau, Alaska. "It's called mountain cork," he explained, "a sort of insulation material similar to asbestos."

"They have not found it in commercial quantities before now. I learned of this deposit and intend to make a thorough investigation."

Capella is Year's Heaviest Halibut Producer Here—Light Week At Seattle For Landings.

Up to the end of last week the Capella, Capt. Dan Larsen, had landed the most halibut of any individual boat at Prince Rupert during the 1936 season. It had also brought in the greatest number of catches—namely thirteen for a total poundage of 202,500 pounds. The next greatest producer was the Dovre B., Capt. Tony Martinusen, with 198,000 pounds in eleven trips. The Cape Beale, Capt. Edgar Arnett, had brought in a total of 193,000 pounds in six trips to rank third in volume of fish landed. The Atlas was second with 141,000 pounds in five trips and the Betty third with 134,500 pounds in nine trips. The Visitor had landed the greatest number of trips for the American fleet—eleven for a total of 73,500 pounds. The Betty and Frisco had each landed nine catches for totals of 134,500 pounds and 99,100 pounds respectively.

Halibut landings at Seattle last week were rather lighter than usual at a total of 412,000 pounds. Wednesday had the highest price average when three boats landed a total of 75,500 pounds at an average price of slightly less than 11 1/4c. Tuesday had the lowest daily price average of 10 1/2c on total landings of 70,000 pounds from three boats. San Juan, with 138,000 pounds, was the heaviest purchaser of the week, Sebastian-Stuart being second with 118,000 pounds. Washington, Whiz and Booth followed in the order mentioned. On Saturday three boats sold a total of 101,000 pounds of halibut at Seattle as follows: Seymour, 40,000, Sebastian, 10,000 and 10c; Grant, 40,000, Washington, 10,000 and 10c; Freya, 21,800, Booth, 11,300 and 10c. Yesterday, five boats landed 141,000 pounds of halibut at Seattle at prices ranging from 10 1/2c and 10c to 11 1/4c and 10 1/2c.

On a regularly scheduled voyage to Alaska, C. P. R. steamer Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 8 o'clock yesterday morning from

Synopsis of Land Act

PRE-EMPTIONS

VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning Pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 2,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre west of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emption carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

PURCHASE OR LEASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$3 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

As a partial relief measure, reverted lands may be acquired by purchase in ten equal instalments, with the first payment suspended for two years, provided taxes are paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 660 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations amended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
