FOUL PLAY IS SUSPECTED IN ATLIN CASE

Teslin Lake Indian Woman is Victim Of Small Rifle Bullet

Provincial Constable Ronald M. Stewart and Coroner H. F. Glassey Going From Atlin to Investigate Death Of Mrs. George Johnson

Mrs. George Johnson, an Indian woman, is dead as a result of being shot with a twenty-two calibre rifle at Portage on Teslin Lake, six miles south of the Yukon boundary in Northern British Columbia, and Provincial Constable Ronald M. Stewart and Coroner H. F. Glassey are going from Atlin, a distance of sixty-three miles, by dog team to investigate, according to word received here today by divisional headquarters of the provincial police. Foul play is suspected. No other particulars are available.

ARE GUILTY AT ASSIZES

James Lawler and David Anderson Convicted of Robbing Bank At Vancouver Last Year

VANCOUVER, April 15: (CP)—James Lawler, aged 26, and David Anderson, 22, were convicted at the Supreme Court Assizes here yesterday on charges of robbery with violence in connection with the hold-up last December of the Commercial Drive branch of the Royal Bank of Canada when three gunmen escaped with \$3,047. The convicted men, who had been brought back from Chicago a month after the hold-up, were remanded to the end of the Assizes for sentence.

KNOX LEADS OVER BORAH

But Idaho Senator Still Has Chance to Draw up in Illinois Primary

CHICAGO, April 15:—Col. Frank Knox was leading Senator William E. Borah of Idaho up to late last night in the count of Illinois Republican presidential primary available to that time but Borah strongholds in the country areas were yet to be heard from and there was a possibility he might overcome the Knox lead. Cook County, which includes the city of Chicago, gave Knox a majority of 65,000 over Borah. In Nebraska Borah, on the Republican, and Roosevelt, on the Democrat ballots were unopposed. Senator Norris received many complimentary votes which some thought might influence him to reconsider his decision to withdraw from public life.

APPROVAL OF BRIDGE

McGeer Says Ottawa Will O.K. First Narrows Span—Budget For Year Adopted

VANCOUVER, April 15:—Returning to the city from Ottawa, Mayor G. G. McGeer states that federal authorities are about to approve of the plans for the building of the projected bridge across First Narrows by wealthy British interests. Yesterday the city council approved the 1936 civic budget presented by Mayor McGeer. It provides for the opening of immediate negotiations with a view to bringing about a reduction in the civic interest rate.

Tenders are being called by the federal department of public works for dredging work and the construction of floating breakwaters at the fishermen's floats here. It is work that has been under contemplation for some time. The tenders are to close on May 7.

JUDGE IS ON TRIAL

Florida Member of Bench Defends Himself Before Senate

WASHINGTON, April 15: (CP)—The United States Senate has turned from its familiar role to become for the twelfth time in history a solemn court of justice. Judge Halsted L. Ritter of the South Florida district is answering impeachment proceedings voted against him by the House of Representatives charging that he allowed excessive receivership fees to a former law partner. A vote of two-thirds of the Senators present is necessary for conviction and removal from office.

The dignified Senate chamber has been transformed for the trial of Judge Ritter into a strange sort of a court room. Vice-President Garner as the presiding judge occupies a position relative to that of trial judge.

A soft-spoken, mild-mannered veteran of the House, one of the foremost authorities in Congress on constitutional law, has charge of the prosecution. He is Representative Hatton Summers of Texas, chairman of the House Judiciary committee and a participant in two previous impeachment trials. Judge Ritter is represented by Frank P. Walsh of New York, whose robust physique is matched by his booming voice.

Ritter is the ninth member of the federal judiciary to face the Senate on impeachment charges. Of the preceding eight, four were acquitted, three were removed from office and one resigned before a verdict was rendered. The hearing is proceeding. The charge virtually amounts to Ritter sharing in the proceeds of law practice while acting as a judge.

Vancouver and Victoria newspapers are giving considerable publicity to Dr. C. A. Schenck and Dr. H. Muller-Clemm of Germany, who recently visited here in the course of a tour of the coast in connection with the project of establishing a pulp plant and the export of squared hemlock pulp logs. Neither have, however, made any significant statement.

National Mining Policy Urged By Mr. Justice Manson; Could Absorb All Workless in Land

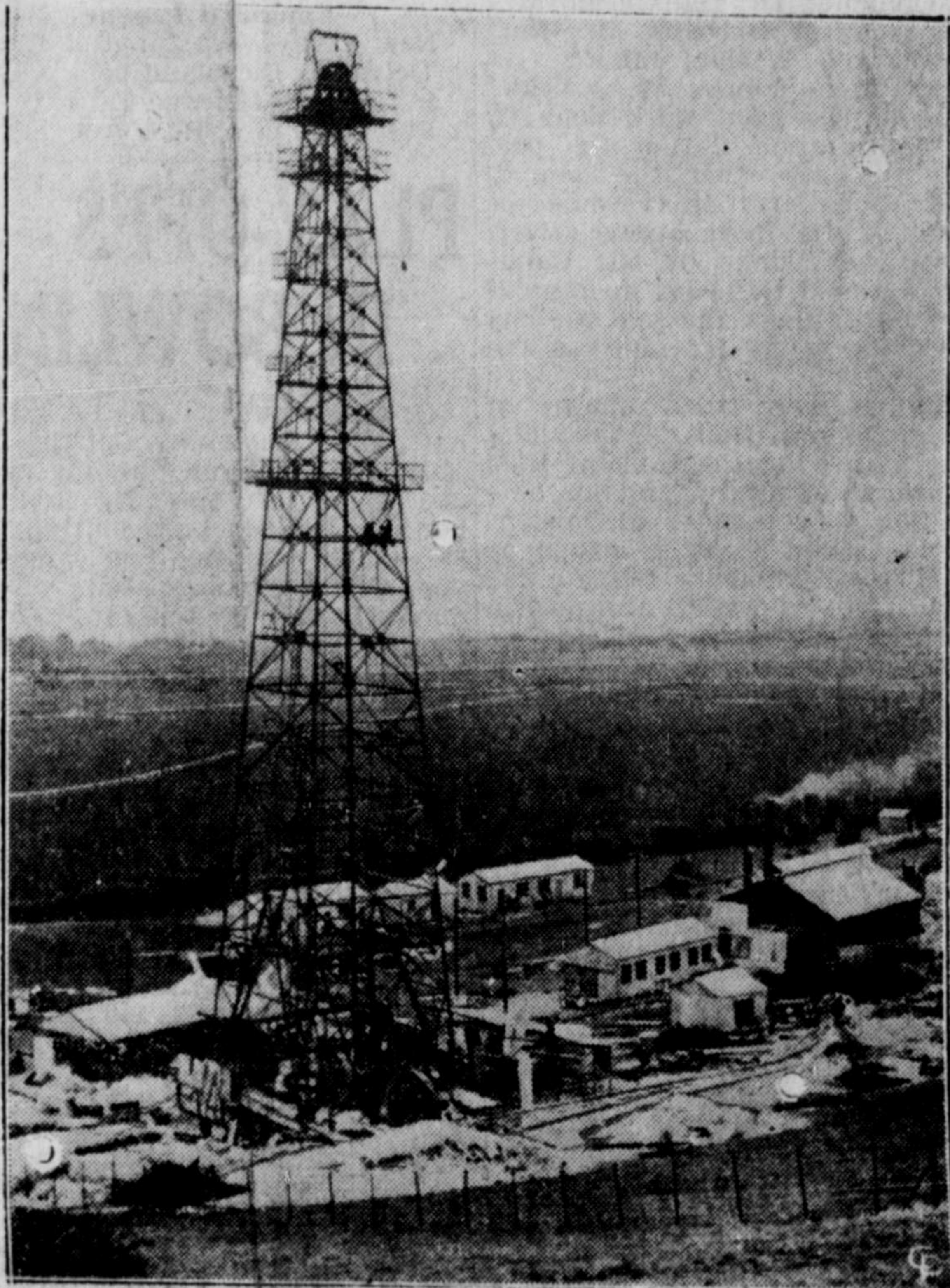
VANCOUVER, April 15: (CP)—Mining, directly and indirectly, could take every able-bodied man at present unemployed out of unemployment, Mr. Justice A. M. Manson declared in addressing the annual meeting of the British Columbia Division of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association last night.

His Lordship advocated a Canadian national mining policy—a conjoint policy between the Dominion and mining provinces—"a policy that will give those who hazard their money in the development of our natural wealth, and so often lose it a chance to get their capital back—no taxes for the first year of production."

It should be a policy that would stabilize mining taxation for years.

W. J. West was re-elected chairman of the Division.

Kitkatla is Centre of Interest As \$10,000 Church is Dedicated; Two Hundred Visitors Present

Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix D.D., Bishop of Caledonia, returned to the city yesterday afternoon aboard one of the New Metlakatla, Alaska, boats from Kitkatla where he officiated at the dedication on Sunday of the fine new church there. The opening of the new church was an outstanding event among the native people of the north coast of British Columbia, drawing delegations from all parts of the district and as far away as southeastern Alaska. Many of these were in the city yesterday afternoon and last evening on their way back to their various villages from Kitkatla.

Graf Zeppelin Is Refused Right To Fly Over France

BERLIN, April 15:—Permission for the Graf Zeppelin to make a light over France has been refused by the French government. It was announced here yesterday.

For some years the Kitkatla people had been preparing for this event by building up a fund which would enable them to attain their ambition to have a church building which would be an honor to both themselves and the Christian faith. About two years ago they came to the conclusion that it was time to begin the work and the cornerstone was laid with solemn ceremony by the Bishop of Caledonia. Since then the building has proceeded apace and on Easter Sunday unusual ceremonies and great thanksgiving marked the official opening and dedication.

The preliminary part of the program was a procession around the village with three brass bands present as well as the choirs. At the door of the church the procession (Continued on Page Four)

PORT ORCHARD, Wash., April 15:—Conviction and death sentence of Leo Hall on a robbery and murder charge was upheld yesterday when the higher court rejected his appeal. He will come up for re-sentence at once, the expectation being that his execution will be fixed for about June 11 at Walla Walla penitentiary.

Steamer Hartington Coming Here May 25; Second Ship as Well

Portland Man Makes Arrangements For Considerable Activity in the Way of Export of Aspen, Cottonwood and Hemlock to Orient

The British steamer Hartington is under charter to come to Prince Rupert on May 25 to load 1,900,000 feet of aspen, cottonwood and hemlock timber for the Orient, it is announced by Stanley Bishopric jr. of Portland, Ore., who arrived this morning from the south. Another ship will be coming towards the end of June or early in July for a similar cargo. It is as yet unnamed.

URGED TO EVACUATE

Mussolini Gives Notice He Is Ready to Take Addis Ababa—Drop Pamphlets on City

ROME, April 15: (CP)—Premier Benito Mussolini gave notice yesterday that advancing Italian forces would enter Addis Ababa, capital of Ethiopia, within a few days. Twenty-one airplanes yesterday showered the Ethiopian capital city with pamphlets pointing out the hopelessness of the position of the defenders and urging them to evacuate without resistance.

Marshal Badoglio's northern and southern armies will enter Addis Ababa through motorized thrusts. This was indicated today in reports from Africa shortly after the war office announced occupation of Dessye, 150 miles from Addis Ababa and the nearest point yet obtained by the conquerors. There is no obstruction between the black shirts and the capital, an aerial survey shows.

STRONG BRITISH STAND
LONDON, April 15:—The British government yesterday instructed Captain Anthony Eden, Foreign Secretary, to take a strong stand with a view to bringing about peace in East Africa without further delay.

It is made of native wood and there is depicted on the staff the various crests of the people of Kincolith and the lamb and cross representative of Christianity. The carving was done by Arthur Nelson and the Kincolith Senior Society and the Royal Purple Society were responsible for the cost involved. The staff was encased in a beautifully made case decorated with Indian emblems.

The Bishop was greatly surprised by the valuable gift and expressed his great appreciation of the kindness of the donors.

TIE-UP OF SHIPPING

Shippers' Association Breaks Off With Longshoremen at San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15:—The possibility of a complete tie-up of Pacific Coast shipping again loomed yesterday as the San Francisco Shippers' Association completely severed relations with the International Longshoremen's Association. Matters came to a head following arrival of the steamer Santa Rosa from New York. Mail and passengers' effects were handled but pickets prevented further unloading.

NO PLANS FOR BANK

British Columbia Government Not Going Into This Business Declares Premier Pattullo

VICTORIA, April 15: (CP)—British Columbia had not for one minute considered embarking on the establishment of a provincial bank, said Premier T. D. Pattullo on his return to Victoria last night from the East. So far nothing has been heard from the Alberta government which it had been reported, would ask B. C. co-operation in such a move which was contemplated in the prairie province. He had made a speedy return across the continent from New York by airplane and is back for a brief visit before returning to Ottawa to continue negotiations with the federal government interrupted by the Easter holidays.

Premier Pattullo stated that he had discussed general policies including relief, finance, etc., with the federal government at Ottawa. The question of meeting forthcoming maturities of British Columbia bonded indebtedness including federal aid for the bond issue of \$3,500,000 maturing May 15 had not been the only important matter to come up. He predicted that a large public works program would be instituted by the federal government this year.

German Jews May Move to America

Negotiations for Large Parcels of Land to be Instituted by Party Leaving the Fatherland Today

BERLIN, April 15:—A group of prominent Jews is leaving Germany today for Central and South America with a view to negotiating for the purchase of large parcels of land upon which young Jews from Germany may settle.

PLAIN SPEAKING

Rev. Robert Connell, leader of the C. C. F. political party in the provincial legislature, has been doing some straight talking of late. He has been defining the position of the party with a view to being honest with the electors in face of a general election within the next few years.

In a speech in the legislature and again in a gathering at the King Edward High School in Vancouver he spoke clearly and without any trace of equivocation in stating that the C. C. F. had neither part nor lot with the Marxian Socialists and their theories, including the dictatorship of the proletariat. These statements became necessary because prominent members of the party in the legislature had declared for Marxian Socialism as the only way, this including dictatorship by members of the Socialistic party usually known as proletarian dictatorship such as they have in Russia today.

While the effect of the pronouncement of the leader on this important question may be to alienate a good many of his most enthusiastic supporters, it will also have the effect of reassuring those supporters who were not prepared to follow the Winches but at the same time were dissatisfied with the old political parties. The question now arises as to whether Mr. Connell can hold his position as leader in the face of the opposition which is bound to arise from the left section of the party. Most of the vocal members of the party are Marxian Socialists and they will continue to be heard, either within the C. C. F. party or without.

GARDENING IN RUPERT

Nearly Eighty People Show Interest by Attending Annual Meeting of Horticultural Society

FINE PICTURES SHOWN

Report of President Shows Work Done During Year and Urges Co-operation in Beautifying City

There was a large turnout last night to the annual dinner meeting of the Prince Rupert Horticultural Society in the Commodore Cafe, almost eighty people being present including a good many of the most prominent people of the city. Table decorations were daffodils, geraniums, primulas, and schizanthus grown in the city by members.

Following the meal officers were elected as follows:

Hon. President, Hon. T. D. Pattullo; President, Theo. Colliart; First Vice-president, Jack Frew; Second Vice-president, Dave Borland; Executive—C. V. Eviatt, Horace Duhamel, Dr. Hankinson, Mrs. Winslow, M. A. Burbank, Mrs. Norrington and William Millar.

City Commissioner W. J. Alder spoke of the good work done by the organization during the past year and expressed the general expectation that this would be continued. He spoke appreciatively of the work done by the Canadian National Railways in improving their gardens and said the city was doing what it could to cooperate.

Pictures were then shown of bulb growing in Holland, the slides being loaned by the Holland Bulb Gardens at Toronto, and an outstanding set of slides of gardens in and around Victoria, loaned by the Victoria Publicity Bureau was shown, also views of a beautiful garden at Whitehorse, Yukon Territory. Votes of thanks to the people who loaned the slides were passed.

The statement of the Secretary-treasurer, Frank Dibb, showed a small balance on hand. The report of President H. F. Pullen was as follows:

"This is our second annual meeting and we have gathered after a long and hard winter to elect a slate of officers who will make plans for the coming year. During the past year we held a very successful rose show in July and carried out a garden competition in August that aroused considerable interest. Also we supported to the fullest extent possible the exhibition of flowers put on under the management of one of our members, Charles Balagno, at the fall carnival, Mr. Balagno, at that show, and Mr. Dibb, at the Rose Show, deserve the thanks of the society for the excellent work they did."

"The executive recommends to the incoming executive that there be a rose show again this year and also a garden competition. I suggest, however, that the show, so far as possible, be made not only self-supporting, but also help to pay the cost of the garden competition. The competition last year made rather serious inroads into our cash reserve.

"Steps are again being taken to secure medals for presentation at the rose show. These are donated by publishers of Home Gardening and come all the way from England. Possibly local people interested in the work of the society may like to offer special cups, vases or medals in choosing prize last year, we decided on rose bowls or vases that would be particularly interesting to those raising flowers. Arthur Baynes, who took over the Glennie seed store at Christmas, has offered a special prize for sweet peas at the next show.

"The society did not import roses this year but suggested to members that they get them through the local florist at the special price of 25c each. Many took advantage of this.

"The thanks of the society is due to Col. Nicholls and Mrs. T. H. Johnson, both of whom returned their prizes to the society, the former suggesting that the money be used as a prize for a lawn competition.

"As a result of the visit of Mr. Phillips to the city last August the Department of Agriculture at Victoria has forwarded a number of leaflets including "Gardening on a City lot," "Soil Fertility" and "Peat Muck Soils." The secretary has a supply of these. He also has copies of "Field and Garden Crop Spray calendar."

Horticultural Fraternity

"When writing in my garden column in the Daily News recently I mentioned the wonderful fraternity to which we, as gardeners, belong. Most of us like to look over our neighbors gardens and discuss our mutual problems. Those who have gardens can give a great deal of enjoyment to neighbors and visitors by showing them around and explaining how and why things are done. Visitors from out of town are often keen to get information and to see the gardens in greater detail than can be done through the windows of a taxi.

"I take it that the great aim of this society and its members individually as well as collectively, is to make Prince Rupert a more beautiful city and to encourage local people to find health and enjoyment in stirring the soil and growing things. In closing my second term as president I wish to thank you all for the support given me during those two years and to ask the same loyal support to my successor in office."



Six boats sold halibut catches totalling 121,000 pounds in Seattle yesterday. Prices for the catches of two western boats with 70,000 pounds were up one cent at 8 1/2c and 8 3/4c. Prices for local fish were off 1/2c to 1c at 8 1/2c to 8 3/4c. Cod price was 3c.

With a fair sized list of passengers, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port on time at 10 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart.

Halibut boats leaving for the banks today were Teeny Milly and Margalice and the Vancouver boat Twinkle I.

The steamer Prince George, which is undergoing annual overhaul at the local dry dock, was taken on the pontoons late yesterday afternoon and will be out of the water for a week or ten days for hull work.

Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship liner Northland, Capt. Len Williams, arrived in port at 7:45 this morning from Ketchikan and, after discharging one carload of frozen halibut and one car of fresh for trans-shipment east over the Canadian National Railways, sailed in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.

During a week-end cruise out of Vancouver, death visited the steamer Prince Rupert which arrived from the south this morning. A woman excursionist died at 3:30 in the morning of heart failure. The remains were put ashore at Powell River.

was met by the Bishop, the incumbent, Rev. M. H. Lawrence, and church officials. After presentations had been made on behalf of the various villages represented, the hymn "The Church's One Foundation is Jesus Christ Our Lord" was sung. The Bishop, the church officials and members of the Kitkatla band encircled the church and the New Metlakatla choir led the singing.

Followed the presentation of the petition from the Kitkatla congregation asking the Bishop to consecrate the church "to be used forever for the worship of God according to the rites and ceremonies of the Church of England." The consecration of the church and the dedication of the various gifts then took place. The Bishop preached from I Kings 9:3, taking as his text: "I have hallowed this House which thou hast built to put My name there forever and Mine Eyes and Mine Heart shall be there perpetually." There was a large congregation present and the musical part of the service was splendidly taken charge of by the Greenville choir under the very able leadership of Joshua McKay. At the close of the service the Sacrament

of the Lord's Supper was administered with over one hundred persons partaking.

In the afternoon another large attended service was held. The music was led by a large choir under the leadership of Charles McNeill of Kincolith. Members of the choir were robed in surplices and college mortar board caps. Their work reflected careful training and was much appreciated.

For the evening service the church was crowded. The service consisted of a brief prayer period and a sacred concert by the New Metlakatla choir and orchestra.
