# HINDENBURG LANDS AT LAKEHURST

## CANZONERI EASILY DECISIONS McLARNIN

## New Speed Record For Lighter-Than-Air Set By Great German Ship

Spanned Atlantic in Sixty-One Hours and Fifty-Three Minutes With Average of Seventy-One and Three-Tenth Miles Per Hour For Whole Trip

LAKEHURST, N.J., May 9: (CP)—The Hindenburg, newest and largest of the Zeppelins, completed her first flight across the North Atlantic Ocean today in record time for a lighter-than-air craft. The giant ship moored at the naval base here at 6:23 this morning (Eastern Daylight Time), sixty-one hours and fifty-three minutes after she had left her home port of Friedrichshafen. She carried fifty-one passengers and a crew of fifty-six.

## PASSES IN HIS SLEEP

Louis Gosnell, Aged 83, Died Yesterday at Home of Daughter, Mrs. Fanny White

Louis Gosnell, for many years a well known resident of Port Simpson where for a long time he conducted a store, one time operator of old Alexander cannery on the Skeena River, and an early Methodist Church missionary among the natives of Port Simpson as well as in Southeastern Alaska, is dead here at the age of 83 years. He succumbed some time during the night before last in his bed at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Fanny White, 815 Fraser Street, with whom he had made his home here for fifteen years. He had not been feeling well for some time and, shortly before noon yesterday, when members of the family went to rouse him, it was found that he had died.

## Work on Park Is Proceeding

Eight Totem Poles to be Erected on Fraser Street—Mr. Prudhomme Co-operates

The totem pole erected this week on the top of the hill in the police gardens overlooking the City Hall will be the last to be placed there, it being the third that has been put up in the police gardens. The remaining eight poles from the Queen Charlotte Islands will go in the new Central Park on Fraser Street which is now in process of preparation.

Ex-Ald. A. J. Prudhomme showed his co-operation with the city in the Fraser Street park project by having removed his small garage which stood at what has been made the eastern entrance of the new park. The garage has now been placed in the lane to the rear of the Savoy Hotel.

Indian Agent James Gillett, late of Massett, speaking of the poles here, says they constitute one of the most outstanding collections in the country.

## New Hospital Is Being Discussed

Conference With Medical Officer of Indian Department Reported Upon to Board

S. D. Macdonald reported to the hospital board last night on a recent conference with Dr. A. L. McQuarrie, medical officer of the Department of Indian Affairs for British Columbia, in regard to the new hospital project here. The conference with Dr. McQuarrie had been held by the special committee on the new hospital, consisting of Mr. Macdonald, W. M. Brown and Dr. J. H. Carson and Indian Agent W. E. Collison and Dr. J. P. Cade had also been present. While Dr. McQuarrie had been unable to give any definite assurances, he, however, had appeared to be quite sympathetic to the project.

## After Weathering Hard First Round Attack, It Was Easy Win For Tony

Vancouver Boy Only Able to Take Three Rounds and Was All But Out on His Feet in Ninth and Tenth Rounds

NEW YORK, May 9: (CP)—Tony Canzoneri, lightweight champion, won an easy ten round decision from Jimmy McLarnin of Vancouver, former world's welterweight champion, in a non-title bout at Madison Square Garden last night. McLarnin won the first, fourth and eighth rounds, Canzoneri taking the other seven. McLarnin almost won the fight with a terrific opening barrage in the first round. Nearly knocked out, Canzoneri, however, survived the withering attack and made a stirring comeback. Having succeeded in weathering through that assault, he then took complete command. McLarnin was knocked to one knee without a count in the second round and was almost out on his feet in the ninth and tenth. Canzoneri obviously sensed the possibility of a kill in the last round but he was too tired himself to finish his opponent.

## Assize Cases To Be Transferred

Some of Actions Will be Heard at Smithers Including Those Emanating in Bulkley Valley

Civil cases emanating in the Bulkley Valley and listed for hearing at the forthcoming session of the Supreme Court Assizes at Prince Rupert may be transferred to Smithers for hearing, it is understood. Criminal cases, however, will be heard in Prince Rupert as there is not sufficient accommodation in the court room at Smithers to handle jury trials. The Assize Court opens here next week with Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald as presiding judge.

## Arrangements For Payment of Grants

Difficulties in Regard to Collecting For Patients Outside Province Being Ironed Out

Arrangements are being made between the provinces whereby hospitals in future will be assured of receiving their per diem grant from the provincial government covering patients coming from other provinces. In the past there had been some difficulty in regard to this. The plan now is that the provinces shall collect one from the other in the matter of such grants.

This came up at last night's hospital board meeting in connection with notice of new legislation in respect to payment of government grants to hospitals. In connection with such aid, there were certain new requirements of hospitals in regard to bookkeeping and administration.

The suggestion was raised in discussion that followed that some arrangements might be made for care otherwise than in hospital of certain indigents who did not actually require hospital treatment.

## LONG TERM FOR MAHAN

Sentence of Sixty Years Imprisonment Imposed Upon George Weyerhaeuser's Kidnapper

TACOMA, Wash., May 9: (CP)—William Mahan pleaded guilty today to two kidnapping counts brought in connection with the \$200,000 abduction last summer of George Weyerhaeuser, nine-year old lumber family scion. Federal Judge E. E. Cushman sentenced him to sixty years' imprisonment on each count to run concurrently.

Mahan was taken immediately to McNeil Island Penitentiary. He will be eligible for parole after twenty years with good behavior.

## Hospitalizing Of Indian Patients

Co-operation of Doctors Sought With View to Ensuring Per Capita Grants

Treatment of Indian patients in the Prince Rupert General Hospital came in for considerable discussion at last night's board meeting after report was made by S. D. Macdonald on a conference held with Dr. A. L. McQuarrie, medical officer of the Department of Indian Affairs from Vancouver, who is at present a visitor in this district on official business.

After some talk regarding the difficulty of collecting per capita grants from the departments covering natives in some cases, it was decided to seek the co-operation of the Prince Rupert Medical Association with a view to preventing the admission of native patients unless the admission is confirmed by the medical officer of the reserve concerned and Indian Agent W. E. Collison.

## INTEREST IN MINES

Haida Gold, Cumshewa and Skidegate Sunrise Properties Are Attracting Attention

SKIDEGATE, May 9:—Col. J. B. Harstone D.S.O.B.E., Vancouver mining engineer, and Douglas B. Starrett, geologist of Washington D.C. and vice-president of the Viddette Mining Co., were here recently to visit the Haida Gold Mines. They were taken out in Capt. Jack Haan's seiner Ila and were accompanied by E. C. Stevend and his son, Edmund. From what can be gathered both Col. Harstone and Mr. Starrett were impressed with the large showing of the Haida gold and the quantity of free gold that is available in the two large tunnels. It is rumored that Haida Gold may be reopened on a fairly good scale in the near future.

Walter Hoover, mining engineer of San Francisco, who has taken over the Cumshewa mines, plans to re-open this mine and start shipping ore at once. This property's values run in gold and silver. There are particularly high values in gold with a fair silver content.

It is reported that splendid progress is being made in the Skidegate Sunrise gold mine and that good assays of gold have been taken in the lower levels.

## CONTEST IS RULED OUT

Sale of Vancouver Jubilee Tickets Has Been Banned in Edmonton

EDMONTON, May 9 (Canadian Press)—Sale of Vancouver Jubilee Queen Contest tickets has been prohibited in Edmonton as a violation of the Criminal Code in connection with lotteries, Police Chief A. G. Shute said last night.

## Not Prize Drawing

VANCOUVER, May 9 (Canadian Press)—J. K. Matheson, managing director of the Jubilee committee says that the Queen Contest is merely of a competitive nature with no prize drawing. All prizes are awarded on handwriting characteristics.

## House Committee Reports to Board On Many Matters

The house committee, of which G. V. Wilkinson is chairman, had a number of matters before the hospital board at its meeting last night.

It was reported that repairs had been made to the roof of the front porch by Tony Christian. Payment of an account from J. G. Steen for repairs to the operating room roof was also ordered.

Philpott & Eviit reported that they were unable to supply further slack coal as had been contracted for. It was decided to take the rest of the order in mixed washed pea and slack Island coal at \$8.50 per ton.

In regard to repairs to the elevator ordered by the factory inspector, it was decided to ask for an extension of time in view of the possibility of a new hospital being built.

At the request of Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent, it was decided to purchase two dozen new meal covers which are badly needed, the old ones being in bad shape. S. D. Macdonald insisted that local dealers be given a chance in supplying these dishes and it was so ordered by the board.

A recommendation of the committee that a large kitchen mixer, the original price of which was \$210 but which could be obtained for \$75 from the Northern British Columbia Power Co., be purchased was adopted.

The house committee informed the board that it would be necessary soon to purchase new blinds for the Nurses' Home and new tea and coffee serving pots. The hospital chimneys would also have to be swept soon.

## Amateur and Pro Movies Shown To Students Friday

Amateur movies taken by Roth Jordan of the activities of the King Edward High School Dramatic Club were shown yesterday afternoon. Every member of the casts of recently presented plays saw himself or herself in action. Skating scenes taken during the first week in April at Morse Creek proved highly amusing as the ice was somewhat thin and slushy. Professionally made films of "Wild Men and Beasts of Borneo," loaned by Nick Killas, were also shown and were much enjoyed. Projection was in charge of Vivian Wrathall.

## Hospital Deficit

The Prince Rupert General Hospital operated at a deficit of \$230.11 during the month of April, it was reported to the board at its meeting last night, by G. P. Tinker, chairman of the finance committee. Disbursements for the month were \$4,032.72. There were 1549 hospital days at a cost per hospital day of \$2.60.

The only student in the province to excel Miss Corbould was Miss H. S. Porritt of Royal Jubilee Hospital in Victoria. There were 103 candidates in all.

### MR. HART'S BRIGHT PICTURE

Here is what the Victoria Times thinks of British Columbia's finances:

"The financial picture presented by Mr. Hart in his statement last Saturday is the most satisfactory which British Columbia has seen for a long time—certainly since the beginning of the depression in 1929.

"It reflects two things—Mr. Hart's ability to seal up leaks in his treasury, to get his revenues in; and a growing income generally. A few years ago the government had begun to borrow annually millions of dollars to pay off deficits incurred on current operations. In the last two years Mr. Hart has reversed this position by piling up current surpluses of \$4,500,000. This has enabled him to pay off his \$3,500,000 bond maturity of May 15 out of cash on hand in the bank, to reduce the provincial debt by that amount without touching his sinking funds.

"But more important even than this immediate advantage is the fact, now clear, that British Columbia is well out of the pit of the depression and that its finances are being rebuilt on a sound foundation. Mr. Hart found a very sick patient when he took over the treasury. The patient is responding splendidly to his treatment.

"As the minister is careful to point out, however, we are by no means out of the woods yet. We are paying all our ordinary current expenditures out of revenue, even paying off some debt; but we are still borrowing for unemployment relief, like all the other provinces. We are not setting up all our sinking funds, and we have yet to replace large amounts borrowed from trust funds.

"Until we can cover all these charges out of income, says Mr. Hart, we should pursue a policy of strict economy. The government, in addition, must provide assistance for the municipalities at the autumn session of the Legislature, and this will involve a new drain on the treasury, perhaps more taxation. British Columbia has just passed through a banner year for provincial revenue, has collected more than ever before, but still more is required."

The American League race tightened up when both the leading Boston Red Sox and second place New York Yankees were defeated, the former by the Washington Senators in a heavy-hitting contest at the National Capital and the latter by the Philadelphia Athletics in a close game at Yankee Stadium. The Senators moved into the first division in place of the world champion Detroit Tigers.

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

### Halibut Landings Not Heavy This Week—Over Million and Half Pounds in April—Stewart Speedboat Re-engined

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1936 season up to and including yesterday had reached a total of 2,440,100 pounds of which 1,329,800 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 1,110,300 pounds from American. For the week ending yesterday landings totalled 288,500 pounds consisting of 88,500 pounds from Canadian boats and an even 200,000 pounds from American. There was little change during the week in the price range. The high price of the week for Canadian fish was 6.5c and 5.4c, which the Cape Spear received for 12,000 pounds and the low 6c and 5c, which the Bum and Ingrid H. were paid for catches of 8,500 and 9,000 pounds respectively. For American fish the high price was 7.5c and 6c which the Nordland received for 13,000 pounds and the low 5.5c and 5c, which the Nordby was paid for 32,000 pounds.

During the month of April a total of 1,682,000 pounds of halibut was landed at Prince Rupert as compared with 717,000 pounds during the same month last year. The American landings for this April were 782,000 pounds in comparison with 323,000 pounds last year while this April's Canadian landings amounted to 900,000 pounds against 394,000 pounds a year ago.

McNeil and Lewis of Stewart

have re-engined and repainted the well known northern speedboat Marjorie which they picked up on the bargain counter at Anyox last year and have a mighty trim and speedy craft. The vessel, 21 feet long with 5 foot beam, now has a 1919 Chevrolet engine with Frontenac head and can travel smoothly at a 20-mile clip. Extra fittings include windshield, double rudder and special visible filter in the gas line. All control equipment is mounted on a dashboard. The vessel will be entered in a regatta to be held at Stewart on Dominion Day.

The Principia is 96 feet long with 18-foot, 6-inch beam and is equipped with a 250 h.p. Atlas Imperial diesel engine. The vessel, built in Seattle in 1928, is outfitted with all the latest equipment including radiophone. She moored while here at the floats of the Armour Salvage Co.

The Frank Waterhouse freighter Southholm, Capt. R. B. Bennett, arrived in port at 8:45 this morning from Vancouver with local cargo.
