Ernest Bakewell, as Member, Refuses to be Dictated to By Central Executive—Quits

VANCOUVER, Sept. 22: (CP)-Ernest Bakewell, member of the legislature for Mackenzie, today handed in his resignation from membership in the Co-operative Commonwealth of British Columbia. At the same time, Mr. Bakewell said he would continue to support Rev. Robert Connell as Leader of the Opposition following Mr. Connell's break with the provincial party executive after the last convention.

In his letter of resignation, Mr. Bakewell said: "As member of the legislature my first duty is to the people of Mackenzie district, irrespective of political views. Hence, I cannot follow the dictates of your central executive which was elected by only a small portion of the people of the province."

Bakewell's resignation leaves three members supporting the executive group in the legislature and four in the Connell



SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 22: (CP) -Thirsty Californians are downing "heep" and "putfets" wh.le the state prepares to go to the polls to decide what to do about the drinking situation. Those who wish to put their foot on the rail as they wet their palates, must look not only for signs of "beep" but also for "b--r" or "bees on draught," for it's against the law to advertise beer in letters more than six inches high.

Moreover, the word "saloon," according to state statute, does not exist and you can camouflage drinking places but not with such everyday euphemisms as tavern, inn or buffet.

California, characterized by its Anti-Saloon League as the "wettest state in the union," will have three choices at the polls in November.

One is a proposal by the United Dry Forces of California to write local option into the state constitution. An opposing body of opinion, operating chiefly through the Southern California Businessmen's Association, is submitting an amendment tightening up liquor New Work at Cold Storage Plant regulation but not permitting local option.
