

Montreal Price Takes Sharp Drop as Bombay Ceases Importations

Change of United States Policy Believed One Reason For Move-New York, However, Sees Other Causes Of Action Being Taken

MONTREAL, Jan. 3: (CP)—Silver prices tumbled here today with traders offering from one to two cents less for futures. Officials were unable to explain the sudden decline until they heard of a ban being imposed in Bombay on importation of the white metal. The highest bid today was 59c for January futures. At New York the price was unchanged at 4934c per ounce while in London it was 7/8 pence lower at






