Appeals at Geneva Assembly

GENEVA, July 2: (CP)-Riotous scenes of cursing and fighting in the galleries shattered the dignity of the League of Nations Assembly Tuesday night when black-robed Emperor Haile Selassie charged: "You deserted us to Italy."

Police were called in to restore order after a chorus of heckling boos and curses greeted the Emperor when he rose to make a final dramatic plea for aid. He told how soldiers, women and children fell victims to gas attacks during the Italian campaign.

It was almost ten minutes before police restored order and then he was allowed to proceed and bitterly told the League members "God and history will remember your judgment."

Persons alleged to be Fascists started the tumult. The demonstrators were hustled off to jail.
