RUSSIANS AT NOME

Soviet Fliers Making Progress On Trip From San Pedro to Moscow

NOME, Aug. 14: (CP)—Sigmund Levanevsky and Victor Levenchenko, Soviet fliers, on a long distance flight from San Pedro to Moscow, landed on a lagoon 20 miles east of here yesterday afternoon at 5:37 Pacific Standard time after a 600 mile flight from Fairbanks and planned to leave almost immediately for the crossing of Bering Sea to Siberia. Flying conditions are excellent.

Swift Company Is Selling Up Packing Plants

CHICAGO, Aug. 14:—The Swift Company has disposed of its enormous meat packing plants here and elsewhere in the country. The Chicago plant was sold for \$6,000,000.

Four Year Old Boy is Killed

John Dicks of Edmonton Meets Instant Death When Street Grader Mangled Him

EDMONTON, Aug. 14:—Four year old John Dicks was instantly killed yesterday when struck by the blade of a city grader which backed up on him as he was playing on the street. The child's body was terribly mangled.

Conservatory Head Given Ovation By Vancouver Crowd

VANCOUVER, Aug. 14:—Sir Ernest MacMillan, head of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, was given an ovation on Wednesday night by an audience of 15,000 persons when he conducted the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra in a special jubilee concert at Malkin Shell in Stanley Park.

Railway Fireman Dead in Engine

Ernest A. Barnell Did Not Answer Signal, Having Been Stricken With Heart Attack

VANCOUVER, Aug. 14:—Ernest A. Barnell, fireman on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, failed to respond to a signal yesterday and was found to be sitting at his post in the cab—dead. He is believed to have been the victim of a heart attack. Barnell lived in Vancouver.

Hour's Rainfall Ends Kamloops' Long Dry Spell

KAMLOOPS, Aug. 14:—An hour's rain yesterday afternoon ended a thirty-eight day spell here without moisture. It had been July 6 since Kamloops had had its last rainfall and during that time there has been much hot weather.

TWO ARRESTS MADE IN SENSATIONAL PEACE R. THEFT

VICTORIA, Aug. 14:—Two men have been arrested in a shack in connection with the sensational \$32,000 fur robbery on July 11 from a lonely Hudson Bay Co. post at Fort Nelson in the Peace River Block. It was reported here last night. The two men are Bert Sheffield and Harry Cabouray. Robbery with violence is being charged. It is announced by Col. J. H. McMullen, commissioner of provincial police.

United States Has Easy Win Over Canada in Basketball; Huskies Win 8-Oared Rowing

BERLIN, Aug. 14: (CP)—The United States won its first Olympic basketball championship today by defeating Canada 19 to 8. The Americans led by a score of 15 to 4 at half time. Canada takes second place in the basketball competition. Charlie Campbell of Toronto won fourth place in single sculls as Gustav Schaefer of Germany shot into the first.

SEPTEMBER 2 IS SET AS DATE FOR BURRARD BY-ELECTION VOTING

VICTORIA, Aug. 14: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo announced today that the by-election in Burrard will be held on September 2.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14:—The Canadian dollar closed at par with the American dollar on the New York foreign exchange market yesterday.

Strike Stops Seattle P. I.

Was Unable to go to Press Last Night—Reinstatement of Union Men Asked

SEATTLE, Aug. 14:—Owing to a strike of gild printers, the Seattle Post-Intelligencer was unable to publish last night. The strike was called in demand for reinstatement for two gild men who had been dismissed for union activities. Strikbreaking operators and printers said they were unable to get to work through picket lines. The Post-Intelligencer is owned by William Randolph Hearst.

LOG SHIP ON SUNDAY

Uchida Maru, Big Jap Vessel, Coming Here on Way To Sedgewick Bay

On the way to Sedgewick Bay, Queen Charlotte Islands, to load a full cargo of hemlock timber for the Orient, the big Japanese freighter Uchida Maru is due in Prince Rupert this Sunday evening. She will be making no other calls on the British Columbia coast and the object of coming in here before going to Sedgewick Bay is to enter and clear the customs and take on supplies.

Announcement of the Uchida Maru's approach was made this morning by J. R. Morgan, head of the Morgan Logging Co., from whose camp at Sedgewick Bay the logs are to be loaded. Mr. Morgan arrived today on the Prince Rupert from Vancouver and will board the Uchida Maru here and proceed with her to the Islands.

Capt. Lewis, Vancouver pilot, is arriving here this evening on the Princess Adelaide from the south to meet the Uchida Maru on her arrival off Triple Island, where she is due at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon from the Orient, bring her in here and proceed with her to Sedgewick Bay and thence out to sea after she is loaded.

The Uchida Maru is a large vessel of 10,000 tons. The logs to be shipped are a surplus for which an outlet is being found by export.

Mr. Morgan negated a rumor that the Billmor Spruce Mill near here had been sold or leased.

AIRCRAFT TO SPAIN

Six Powerful Ships Leave Britain—Some For Spanish Government and Some For Rebels

Britons Held

Thousand Government Supporters Put to Death by Rebels in Mass Execution

LONDON, Aug. 14: (CP)—Six powerful air liners left here yesterday for Spain—four having been purchased by rebels in the civil war and two by the Madrid government in the desperate effort of both sides to reinforce their air equipment. It was learned here that Spaniards were offering British pilots \$600 to fly planes to Spain. There is nothing to prevent British aircraft manufacturers disposing of commercial planes anywhere.

The Evening Standard said that four of the planes were to be delivered to the Spanish government at Barcelona.

Rebel forces had reached to within eight miles of San Sebastian, it was reported last night.

Thirty-seven Britons and one American, employees of the Rio-tinto Mining Co. in Spain, apparently are being held hostages by labor syndicalists supporting the government, company headquarters announced today. The company said that notification of the detention had been received after arrangements had been made for the evacuation of the employees.

Mass Execution LISBON, Aug. 14: (CP)—More than one thousand militiamen, including one hundred women, died in a mass execution by rebel forces at Almendralejo, a correspondent of the newspaper Diario Noticias reported today. It also reported that the city of Dadaoz, held by government troops, was in flames.

BIG PLOT IN SOVIET RUSSIA IS BARED

MOSCOW, Aug. 14: (CP)—Sixteen persons were imprisoned today by the Soviet government in the biggest counter-revolutionary plot to be announced by the government in more than a decade. Directing the plot, said the secret police, was the exiled Leon Trotsky, now living in Norway.

Connell Indicates Intention Of Building Up New Party In Province Along Regina Lines

VANCOUVER, Aug. 14: (CP)—Rev. Robert Connell, Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly, who has been expelled from the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, in a statement today, said:

"I have taken up to the present no steps to form a new organization. Indeed, my inclination was to let matters be but, after certain speeches by C. C. F. spokesmen opposed to me, I have decided that, in the interests of the great body of supporters of C. C. F. principles and of my suggested plan of C. C. F. governmental activity in British Columbia, the provincial executive cannot be allowed to have things their own way. They have shown their hand and the people of this province can be in no doubt now as to their dictatorial plans and methods. I shall, therefore, be glad to hear from any who, approving of my stand, are willing to co-operate in building an organization loyal to the Regina manifesto's principles and pledged to carry out a provincial policy such as I suggested last spring. From many such I have already heard and I now wish others to declare themselves frankly and fearlessly."

Death is Due To Blood Clot; Foul Play Theory Out

VICTORIA, Aug. 14: (CP)—A coroner's jury at Friday Harbor, Washington, found that the death of John Beckett, whose body was found in San Juan Straits near Oreas Island Tuesday, was due to a blood clot on the brain. The theory of foul play has been dismissed. Beckett formerly lived at Anyox.

Southern Town May Evacuate

People of Natal in Crow's Nest Pass Country Prepare To Flee Before Forest Fires

NATAL, Aug. 14:—As two extensive forest fires appeared to be closing in on this Elk River Valley town near the Alberta border, people of Natal were prepared last night to evacuate their homes at short notice. One hundred and fifty men are engaged in fighting the flames.

BAN PUT ON SCRIP

Court Restrains City of Edmonton From Taking Alberta "Prosperity" Certificates

EDMONTON, Aug. 14: (CP)—Mr. Justice T. M. Tweedie in Alberta Supreme Court yesterday granted an interim injunction, on application of a group of Edmonton taxpayers, restraining the city from accepting the Alberta government's "prosperity" scrip in payment of relief allowance. The mayor, city clerk and attorney general were named as defendants.

Following a decision of the city council to accept \$185,000 instead of \$50,000 scrip, the court was asked to declare the transaction illegal.

Another Quint Movie Coming

Jean Herscholt and Cast of "The Country Doctor" are Going Back to Callander

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 14:—Jean Herscholt and the entire cast of "The Country Doctor" left here yesterday for Callander, Ontario, where a second picture will be filmed around the famous Dionne quintuplets.

Mary Astor and Dr. Thorpe Will Share Up Child

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14:—An agreement was reached with court approval yesterday in the case of Mary Astor, screen actress, and her former husband, Dr. Franklin Thorpe, over custody of their little daughter. While school is in session, Miss Astor and Thorpe shall share the child but, during vacations, the father shall have it.

Big Rayon Mill Tied by Strike

Cornwall Plant, Largest of Its Kind in Canada, in Third Day of Idleness

CORNWALL, Ont., Aug. 14:—The rayon silk mill here, largest plant of its kind in Canada, and employing one thousand men, is tied up for the third day today by strike. Higher wages, less hours and better working conditions are demanded.

Bob Davis Of New York On Visit to B. C.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 13:—Following a recent tour of the Orient, Robert H. Davis, well known correspondent of the New York Sun, arrived here by airplane yesterday from San Francisco. Accompanied by Mrs. Davis he will spend a week on Vancouver Island.

AGREEMENT REACHED FOR EGYPT TO HAVE FULL INDEPENDENCE

LONDON, Aug. 14:—Terms of an agreement whereby Great Britain grants Egypt her complete independence were reported last night to have been completed. Under the agreement Britain is to withdraw all military forces from Egypt and will assist Egypt to become a member of the League of Nations. Egypt will guarantee Britain the privilege of moving troops through her territory to the Suez Canal. Britain is also to be allowed to operate an air base at Alexandria.

THE BUSINESSMAN

It has become a habit with those who wish to curry favor with the populace for political or other reasons to revile those who are serving the public with their food or other necessities or luxuries, demanding in return therefor a fair profit in payment for their labors. And unfortunately there are cases of men who have not been playing the game but have been making extortionate profits by means of sweatshop and other unethical methods. Some of these were exposed a couple of years ago by a parliamentary committee appointed by Premier Bennett and presided over for a time by Hon. H. H. Stevens.

Very few newspapers or public men have come to the defence of the honest merchant or manufacturer who conducts a legitimate business, giving good values in merchandise at the lowest reasonable prices. He is the mainstay of the country. Often he is the leader of all forward movements in the community. He is so capable that he is frequently chosen to represent the community in parliament.

There is criticism often of the businessman, that he earns more than those who work for a salary. Sometimes that is true but it must be remembered that in business a man takes many chances and as a result many fail. There are lean and fat years and the merchant who is wise lays aside a few dollars from the fat years to carry him over the lean years.

Many a businessman has ruined his health in the struggle against adverse conditions in order to pay his way and keep his head above water. Many a man's hair has turned grey under the strain of keeping up his end against ruthless competition. He has to be ever watchful and keen, with one eye on his employees and the other on the variable public who refuse to purchase any but the most up-to-date goods. Such a man needs a car in which to drive home at night and a little recreation during the evening to take his mind off his business problems.

As we have said, it has become the fashion to berate businessmen, to play up cases of dishonesty but nothing is ever said about the customers who are dishonest enough not to pay their bills or sufficiently unethical to run bills with a local merchant and then, when they have some cash, to spend it with a mail order house.

'SPORT'

URGES SWIM POOL HERE

Playground Supervisor Tells Of Value of Playground Work In Address to Rotary Club

"A city like Prince Rupert should have a community swimming pool where everybody, children and grown-ups could learn to swim," declared David Bell, playground supervisor and instructor, in an address to the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday. Alex McRae presiding. Swimming, the speaker pointed out, was a healthful exercise and very necessary in a place like this where people go out in boats and picnic on the shore.

Mr. Bell spoke of the value of playground work and of the desirability of continuing and expanding it. To do this some equipment was necessary such as swimming pools at the playgrounds other than McClymont Park. He thought that Prince Rupert should not lag behind other places in these things which made for a good community spirit, fostering a complex which is helpful in after life. Encouragement by parents in the sports and amusements was a healthful tonic.

The speaker then told what was being done in Vancouver. For over twenty years they had had supervised playgrounds in that city and each year there had been improvements over the previous season. Today each playground had its own flag, its playground colors, its asphalt court for basketball and volleyball, its field house and its first aid kit. The standard of conduct expected was high and there was rarely any unpleasantness in connection with the games. Handicrafts were also being taken up in connection with the programs.

Mr. Bell extended an invitation to the members to attend the final display at the carnival on August 26 at the Exhibition Building. Games, acrobatics and pyramids would be featured on that occasion.
