CHURCH HEAD REBUKES FORMER KING

CHIANG KAI SHEK NOW REPORTED DEAD

Edward's Love Affair "Sad and Strange" Declares Canterbury

Serious Implications Are Seen in Latest Crisis in Far East

The Present Situation is Very Tense and Bears All The Portent of Civil War Which May Involve Both Japan and Russia

HANKING, Dec. 14.—Despite earlier denials, the Chinese Nationalist government now admits that General Chiang Kai Shek, Premier and war lord, is being held by mutinous communist-inclined forces under Marshal Chang Hsiao Liang at Sianfu. Unless the demand for declaration of war against Japan is acceded to, captors of Chiang Kai Shek refuse to guarantee his safety. A report from Peiping last night said he had already been slain. The present situation is very tense and bears all the portents of civil war which may involve both Russia and Japan.

Regrettable That Former Monarch Should Have Sought Happiness in Manner So Inconsistent With Christian Principles

LONDON, Dec. 14: (CP)—The Archbishop of Canterbury, speaking in London yesterday, called upon the nation to re-consecrate itself. He said that it was sad and strange that the former King Edward VIII could have sought happiness in a manner so inconsistent with Christian principles of marriage and within a social circle whose standards and ways of life were alien to all the best instincts.

DAMAGE IS EXTENSIVE

Mass Mackay House on Tenth Avenue East Visited by Flames Last Night

Damage which may run up to \$2000 or so was done by fire last night at 10:10 at the residence of D. R. Barclay, 1160 Tenth Avenue East. There is insurance. The fire is believed to have been caused by a defective chimney. The house is located several blocks from the nearest hydrant and this handicapped the fire department and willing volunteer assistants in getting to work on the flames. However, once the hose lines were laid a good job was done of dealing with the conflagration. The upstairs portion of the house, in which furniture had been placed temporarily while floors and stairs were being repaired, was pretty well gutted. Water also did damage downstairs. The house was built by the late Ross Mackay.

BOARD FOR MARKETING

Business Carries On Despite King's Birthday Today

LONDON, Dec. 14.—At the request of His Majesty, no general holiday was observed in England today on the occasion of the birthday of King George VI. Business was carried on as usual. Vancouver Stores Open. VANCOUVER, Dec. 14.—Vancouver stores are not closed for the King's birthday today despite the declaration of a statutory holiday by the Dominion and provincial governments. Prince Rupert stores are open for business as usual today.

Make Last Appeal For King's Fund

George V Cancer Campaign To Close January 20

LONDON, Dec. 14: (CP)—The week before the King George National Memorial Fund closes January 20 (anniversary of King George's death) will be set aside as "Memorial Week." On January 20 all depositors in the joint stock banks and in provident, savings, building and other societies will be invited to transfer the odd shillings and pence pending to their account to the Memorial Fund. Announcing this in a broadcast, the Lord Mayor of London, Sir George Broadbridge, said the attraction of the plan lay in the fact that it was not an appeal to the wealthy only.

Are Saved From Drifting Barge

Tree Men and Women Were Removed Safely on West Coast Of Vancouver Island

VICTORIA, Dec. 14: (CP)—Three men and a woman were safe on the steamer Salvage Queen Saturday after they had been removed the night previous from the drifting fuel barge Island Gatherer in a heavy gale off the West Coast of Vancouver Island. They were Capt. and Mrs. J. C. Poulsen and two men whose names have not yet been learned. The towline of the Island Gatherer with the tug St. Faith had parted.

VOTE WITH DE VALERA

Laborites in Irish Free State Support Government on Abdication Bill

DUBLIN, Dec. 14: (CP)—It was late Saturday that the Dail Eireann finally passed the bill of the De Valera government providing for the recognition by the Irish Free State of the abdication of King Edward VIII and the acknowledging of his brother George VI, as successor. The vote was 81 to 5. The Labor Party, which in general opposes the government, gave its support to the bill on final reading.

TWO MEN RE-TAKEN

Couple Who Made Their Getaway From Prince George Jail Back In Custody

Divisional headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised of the recapture of Arthur Blondeau and Robert Blangey, who made their getaway last Friday night from the Prince George jail where they were awaiting trial on charges of breaking and entering and theft. A message received by Inspector J. A. Fraser from Sergeant E. Gammon of Prince George announced the recapture.

Pound Sterling And Canadian Dollar On New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The British pound sterling closed at \$4.90 3/4, up 3-16c, on the New York foreign exchange market Saturday. The Canadian dollar was quoted at \$1.00 3-32.

OFFERED TO PAY DEBTS

But Premier Baldwin Refused Terms of Indian Potentates

WASHINGTON D.C., Dec. 14.—All nations except little Finland will again default in their war debts due the United States tomorrow, December 15, the Department of State is advised. This will make a total of \$12,500,000,000 which has fallen due without being paid.

Indian Potentates Offer
SAN DIEGO, Dec. 14.—Speaking here at the end of the week, Capt. Basil Webb declared that three Indian potentates had offered to pay off Great Britain's entire war debt to United States in return for complete home rule for India but Premier Baldwin had refused the offer.

PIONEER IS DEAD

Henry Leaper Passes Away This Morning in Prince Rupert General Hospital

A well known pioneer resident of Prince Rupert passed away shortly before 6 o'clock this morning at the Prince Rupert General Hospital in the person of Henry Leaper, car inspector for the Canadian National Railways. The late Mr. Leaper had been ill only a few days and news of his death will be received with general regret by numerous friends. Deceased was born in England sixty years ago and is survived by his widow at 338 Eighth Avenue East and a son, Albert Leaper, at Trail. Mr. Leaper had resided in Prince Rupert for twenty-four years. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

IS LIVING IN TERROR

Mrs. Wallis Simpson Fearful For Her Life—Is Being Heavily Guarded—Many Threats

CANNES, France, Dec. 14: (CP)—Extra guards have been placed around the chateau here where Mrs. Wallis Warfield Simpson is living in seclusion following the constitutional crisis in England of which she was the cause and which led to the abdication of King Edward VIII.

Mrs. Simpson is guarded every hour of the day and night by men provided by the French government at her request. She never goes out unless heavily guarded. The American divorcee is fearful of her life as threatening letters dealing with her relations with Edward continue to pour in.

OBJECTS TO RUSS SUBS

General Franco Complains—Insurgents Resume Siege of Madrid

BURGOS, Spain, Dec. 14.—General Francisco Franco, chief of the Spanish insurgents, protested Saturday that Russian submarines flying the Spanish flag were operating in Spanish waters in the interests of the Socialist campaign. The insurgent siege of Madrid was resumed Saturday. Ten persons were reported killed and scores wounded as round after round of shells were poured into the harried capital.

BELGIUM'S MINISTER

Consulate-General at Ottawa Is Now Transformed Into Legation

BRUSSELS, Dec. 14: (CP)—Robert Silvercrucy, Secretary of the Belgian embassy at London, Saturday was named Belgium's first minister to Canada. The Belgian consulate-general at Ottawa has been transformed into a legation.

Former King Of England Arrives In Austria Town

BASLE, Switzerland, Dec. 14: (CP)—Former King Edward VIII arrived at Basle Sunday night from Boulogne, France, where he had disembarked at 8:10 p.m. from the British destroyer Fury. He transferred to car and proceeded to Vienna by way of Innesbruck. From Vienna he went to Voelau last night and started life there as a private citizen in a guarded chateau. Today he was expected to see Dr. Heinrich Neumann, Viennese specialist, about a long-standing ear affliction which is not considered serious. After a stay in Austria during which it is understood Edward will attend winter sports, the self-exiled former monarch is expected to proceed to the Adriatic coast.

PASSED AT TRANQUILLE

Harold Holkestad, well known local halibut fisherman, passed away this morning at Tranquille Sanitarium where he had been a patient for the past six months. He is survived by a widow and two children, Harold and Sylvia, who reside on Ninth Avenue East. The funeral will take place at Kamloops.

Deceased was 42 years of age and was a native of Norway. He had been a resident of Prince Rupert for the past twelve years. Maurelius Holkestad, another local halibut fisherman, is a brother.

The King's Birthday

This year we have celebrated the birthdays of two kings owing to the sudden yet democratic removal of one and the quiet accession of the other.

It is not to be expected that we shall wax eloquent or become enthusiastic about our new king. We do not know much about him. So far we have had no opportunity to build up that halo which was so great a factor in the relations between the former king and his people. All we know about George VI is that he has the reputation of being a good father and a decent citizen, that his wife, who is to be crowned queen in May, is a particularly estimable lady with a good looking family.

We wish the King success on this his first birthday since his accession at the week-end. We are all so confused by the rapidly moving events that we do not quite realize what it is all about but we hope there will not be any more changes for a little while. For British people, noted as being slow moving, considering every step carefully and well, it has been tremendously sudden to find ourselves with a King deposed by Parliament, another proclaimed and his birthday being celebrated all within about two weeks. However, it has all been a means of showing the power of parliament backed by public opinion.

Our King is today a victim of circumstance. He is King not because he wanted to be but simply because of his brother's decision to retire in his favor.

Chinese Situation

What a pity it is that China cannot settle her difficulties as easily as the British Empire and as quickly. The difficulty is that they have lost the habit of settling difficulties in a peaceable manner. War and banditry have become a habit with them. The first impulse is to fight when they disagree and there is no central power strong enough to prevent it.

And yet the Chinese are naturally a peaceful people, too peaceful for their own good. A few war lords have been able to force obedience and bandits have preyed upon the people. Floods have also inundated their fields and famine has carried away many thousands and yet they carry on doing the best they know under adverse conditions.

FORCES OF RECOVERY IN ASCENDANT SAYS BANKER

BANK OF MONTREAL ANNUAL MEETING

Sir Charles Gordon Optimistic on Canada's Economic Outlook But Warns Against Policies That Would Bring Credit of Country Into Disrepute

W. A. Bog, General Manager, Discusses Commercial Loan Situation—Explains Falling Tendency of Loans and Necessity For Increased Investment in Government Securities

Strong expressions of confidence in the outlook in Canada were the keynote of the proceedings at the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of Montreal, held at the head office of the bank in Montreal on December 7. The meeting was also informed that the bank is in an extremely strong position, and that deposits had been further protected by another substantial addition to the reserve account.

Sir Charles Gordon, G.B.E., president, in his address, named as the five fundamental features outstanding in Canada's progress during the past year:

The recovery in agriculture, the extraordinary activity in mining, the all-time record in newspaper production, the gratifying increase in the tourist trade, and the striking expansion in our export trade. He made particular reference also to the uplift which he said had been given to the whole west by the best wheat price level in years, remarking that the value of this year's wheat crop was estimated at \$197,000,000 as compared with \$156,000,000 last year, and saying that an added factor in the uplift was an export demand which was rapidly dissipating the depressing cloud that had overshadowed the market in the form of a large carry-over from previous years.

A New Major Development

In the mining industry, he said, Canada was now well launched upon what was undoubtedly another major movement in the history of her development. It had been estimated, he said, that a total of more than \$200,000,000 annually was being placed in circulation by the mining industry, of which in excess of \$100,000,000 went to payrolls of mining employees and upwards of \$75,000,000 for supplies and equipment. This did not take into account dividends and many capital expenditures, nor did it include taxes paid to governments or the industry's large payments for transportation service, with resulting benefits to the railways. He added that a recent survey which the Bank had made suggested that of all Canadian industries that of mining, with its collateral activities, was the greatest contributor to the federal income tax.

He dwelt at some length on the measures which the Dominion government was taking, on the recommendation of the National Employment Commission, for providing employment in the building trades, and the co-operation which the banks were giving in the Home Improvement Plan, saying a broad policy of this nature should without question have considerable effect in putting to work men whom the depression had hit more severely than almost any other type of Canadian citizen.

Balanced Budget in Sight at Ottawa

The change which had recently come over business and other conditions, he said, was reflected in the state of the government finances. "When we consider," he remarked, "that during the past six years these deficits have averaged over \$138,000,000 per year, it is gratifying to note that at last there is in sight a balanced budget—the goal of every finance minister and the cornerstone of any programme for restoring business confidence and the free functioning of private enterprise."

The Railway Situation

Referring to the legislation altering the management of the Canadian National Railways, Sir Charles said it was confidently expected that the new directors would take it as their duty to exercise every effort to reduce the recurring annual deficit of the system. To some extent this might possibly be done by measures of internal economy and to some extent by measures of further co-operation with the Canadian Pacific Railway, which, presumably, would be ready to assist in every proper fashion.

Forces of Recovery in Ascendant He had a word of warning re-

garding provincial legislation in relation to debts, saying in respect to talk of repudiation that he could not see how this line of thought could be pursued without the credit of the whole Dominion coming into disrepute. He also expressed the hope that the rise in the stock market would not lead to a recurrence of the disastrous experiences that preceded the depression from which we were now emerging.

"But I would not wish to close my remarks on a discouraging note," he said. "While, as I have intimated, there are domestic political factors carrying implied threats to our future well-being, and while we must all be deeply conscious of the foreign developments affecting the general outlook, it must be clear to all of us, from our own observation, that the forces of recovery are once more in the ascendant. A wide variety of factors is combining to give full play to the enterprise of our people and among these factors is the growing conviction that there are no short-cuts to better times and that the observance of age-old economic laws must be the basis of sound progress. We still have problems to face but, as regards these problems, I stand squarely on the opposite side of the fence from the pessimists and I believe that, with the experience gained in the past few years, we in Canada will steadily work our way toward better things."

Bank's Position Extremely Strong

Presenting the 19th annual balance sheet of the Bank, W. A. Bog, on behalf of himself and Jackson Dodds, his fellow general manager, drew attention to the fact that the total assets of the bank had increased from \$792,800,000 a year ago to \$805,100,000 at the present time, and pointed out that the extremely strong position of the bank was reflected in quick assets totalling \$606,500,000, representing 83.27% of all liabilities to the public. He also remarked that by the transfer of \$1,000,000 from profit and loss account the reserve account had been increased to \$39,000,000, a total which had been accumulated from profits over the past 119 years and from premiums on new stock issued. This sum, he said, was held as a protection for the bank's depositors. "That is to say," he remarked, "as protection

for deposit liabilities we have not only 100% in conservatively valued assets, but in addition we have assets representing \$36,000,000 of capital and \$39,000,000 in reserve account."

Savings Accounts Particularly Valued

Mr. Bog expressed regret that it had been found necessary to reduce to 1½% per annum the rate of interest paid on savings deposits, saying the reduction had been made with reluctance, and it was only the continued decline in the yield on securities and the low level of commercial loans that had compelled the banks to take the step.

"The two greatest depositories for the savings of Canadians in all walks of life are the banks and the insurance companies," he said. "A great part of the funds belonging to depositors and policy-holders is invested in securities. The protection of the savings of Canadians, built up so laboriously and with such self-denial over the course of years to ensure a measure of security in old age or to provide for dependents after death is and always has been the first consideration of this Bank and should also be that of all government authorities. In most instances, these savings are not large and a loss of only a small portion of the principal is sufficient in many cases to bring want and anxiety.

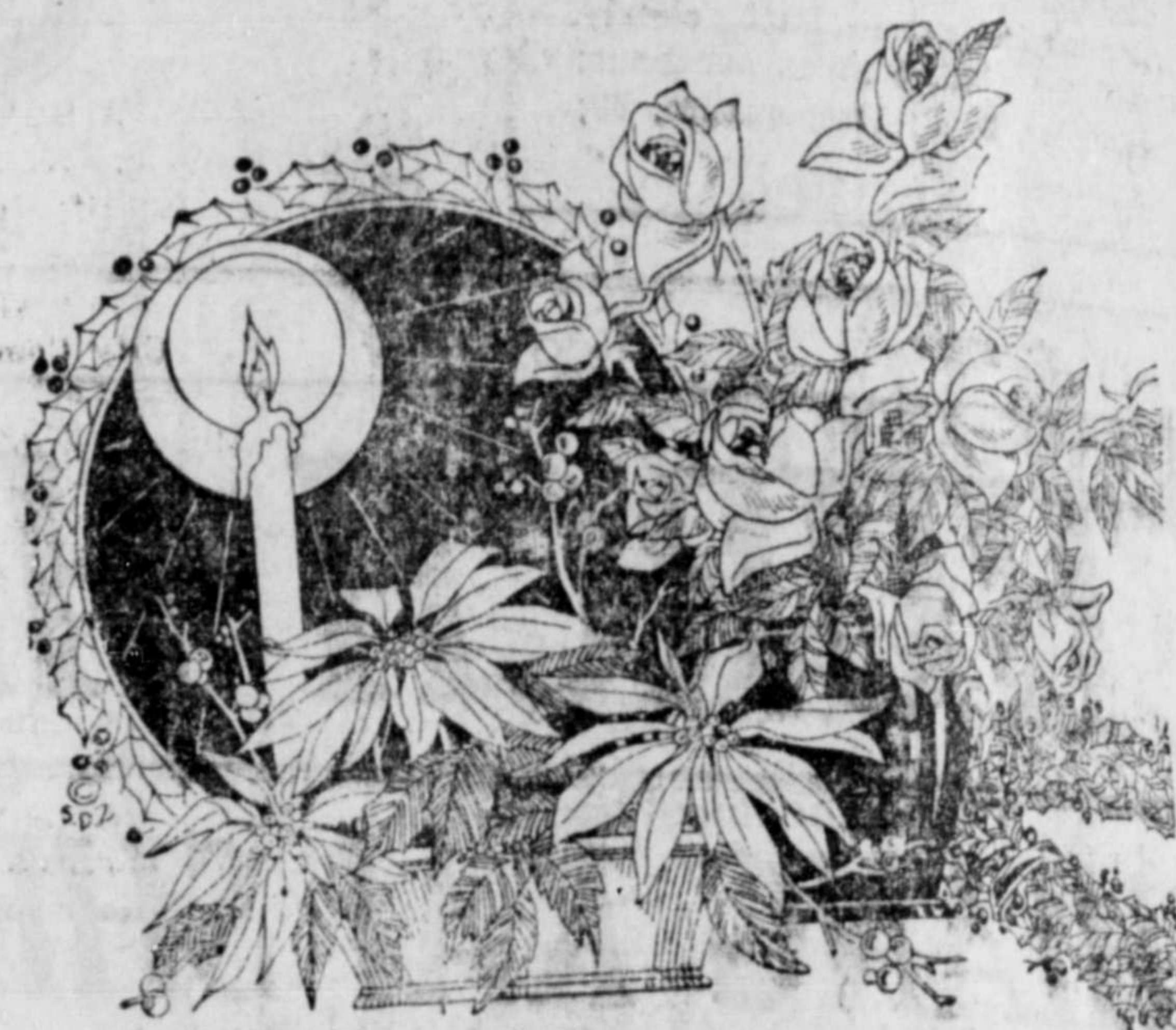
"Any policy which would tend to weaken the sanctity of contracts is to be deprecated as, in addition to harming those who can least afford to bear losses, such a policy would strike at the very core of our economic order, for when there is lack of confidence, a slackening of business activity takes place, bringing unemployment in its train."

Paying tribute to the loyal co-operation of the staff, he said the high morale of those in the service might be attributed in part to security of employment and an assured income on retirement. These factors, from a national standpoint, had been a contribution to the employment situation in Canada during the past few years when the bank had carried a surplus of staff.

LOUIS BOUT RULED OUT

Madison Square Deal For Braddock Meeting Schmeling Bars Fight With Negro in Meantime

NEW YORK, Dec. 14: (CP)—A clause prohibiting a bout with Joe Louis prior to June 3 was included in the contract by which James J. Braddock on Saturday signed up to defend his heavyweight boxing championship against Max Schmeling of Germany on June 3 in Madison Square Garden Long Island City Bowl.

The signing up of the agreement followed an order of the New York Boxing Commission that Braddock should defend his title without undue delay against Schmeling. The Boxing Commission had no objection to Braddock meeting Louis before the fight with Schmeling.

Braddock and Louis were to have met in a twelve-round no-decision bout at Atlantic City on February 23. This is now definitely ruled out. Terms of the June title bout provide for \$25,000 of Schmeling's share being placed in escrow as a guarantee that he shall defend the title within six months, providing he wins it from Braddock.

Drillon evened up the count for the Maple Leafs in the second and Dillon put the Rangers ahead again in the third Harvey Jackson brought the Leafs up to even terms again. Keeling gave the Rangers their third and once more the Maple Leafs tied it up through Fowler.

Overtime failed to break a two-all deadlock of the Canadiens and Maroons at Montreal. The Canadiens, as a result, went into exclusive possession of first place in the International Section.

Synopsis of Land Act

PRE-EMPTIONS

VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning Pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 3,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre west of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner. Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emption carrying part-time conditions of occupation are also granted.

PURCHASE OR LEASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

As a partial relief measure, reverted lands may be acquired by purchase in ten equal instalments, with the first payment suspended for two years, provided taxes are paid when due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act, the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations amended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

In response to public request, the Canadian National Railways have placed in operation a simple and effective plan whereby tickets may be purchased and sent as Christmas or New Year gifts to relatives and friends, according to G. A. McNicholl, general passenger agent, Vancouver. While arrangements for such prepaid tickets are in effect throughout the year, they are particularly timely at the approach of the festive season, stated Mr. McNicholl. Tickets purchased in this way are good between any points in Canada and also between points in Canada and the United States.

After having become stranded in their gasboat in the Skeena River following which they had an eighteen hour battle with an open boat in the storm-swept water, all hands having continually to man the pumps in order to keep afloat, 22-year old Richard Wilson and his young bride-to-be, Lola Duncan, arrived here Friday night from Kitimaat. The particular object of their trip to town was to secure a special marriage licence, armed with which they are leaving today on their return to Kitimaat where the marriage will take place.

Germany Finding Many Sources Of Substitutes For Foreign Goods

BERLIN, Dec. 14. (CP)—Germany's economic independence in pharmaceutical products, contemplated in Chancellor Hitler's four-year plan, is discussed in an article in the Voelkischer Beobachter, in which the pharmaceutical "Feuhrer," Dr. Schmierer, shows that many products now imported can be made in Germany.

Foremost among the products is raw lanoline, the fatty substance obtained from sheared lambs' wool. "It will be possible to avoid importing hundreds of thousands of pounds of lanoline fat, extracted from wool, if we obtain all the fat from the fibres and do not lose it all in the washing process," he writes.

Dr. Schmierer says German laboratories now have a substitute for ipecac, a medicinal product at present imported in large quantities from South America.

The pharmacist is also optimistic concerning the extraction of fibrous material from various experimental plants, which might take the place of cotton. This is particularly promising, he writes, in the production of German soya beans.

"The soya beans now cultivated in Germany," he says, "produce more leathine than foreign beans develop."

Medicinal fruits and wines are already taking the place of imported products, especially the medicinal sherry obtained from Greece.

Horses Go Blind,
Veterans of War

Many Dumb Heroes Spend Last Days Toiling in Belgium

LONDON, Dec. 14. (CP)—Eighteen years have passed since the "Cease Fire" was ordered in Europe but many British horses, dumb heroes of the war, are scattered about Belgium working on farms and in cities.

Many of these veterans are spending their last days in misery, it was discovered by investigators of Our Dumb Friends League who have returned from Belgium after spending some weeks tracing the horses.

After the war the animals were left in Belgium and sold. All of them are considered too old for work.

"We bought four horses and four mules," one of the investigators stated. "They were urgent cases and were destroyed immediately. One of the mules was at least 40, blind and half-starved."

"Another terrible case was that of a white gelding, 30 years old, believed to have been with the British Expeditionary Force. He was blind and bore traces of war wounds. He was still pulling a cart. We had to pay about \$40 for him."

"As soon as we have collected a little money we are going back to rescue about a dozen urgent cases. I know of. If we cannot give them a merciful death they will certainly die in misery in the winter cold."

SOLEMNITY AND ANCIENT FORMS MARK ACCESSION OF BRITAIN'S NEW KING

Prime Minister King Read Momentous Document At Ottawa—Vast Crowds Attend Public Proclamation Formalities in London

OTTAWA, Dec. 14: (CP)—While the thunder of a twenty-one gun salute echoed over the sunlit slope of Parliament Hill and the strains of the National Anthem sounded out from the carillon in the Peace Tower, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King Saturday read to listeners throughout the Dominion the solemn proclamation of King Edward VIII's abdication and the accession of King George VI.

London Ceremonies
LONDON, Dec. 14: (CP)—A vast and orderly crowd listened raptly on Saturday while the sonorous tones of the Garter Principal King of Arms, Sir Gerald Wellesley, rolled from the banks of loud speakers as he read from the balcony of the royal palace of St. James, with its old and turreted battlements, the proclamation of George VI as Liege Lord of the British Empire. A spotlight, made necessary by dull skies and light rain, illuminated the scroll from which Sir Gerald read.

The proclamation was subsequently read at Charing Cross Temple Bar and the Royal Exchange.

It was the second time within a year that crowds, massing outside of St. James, had watched the ceremonial procedure of proclaiming a new King. The day's events, invested with the splendor of medieval pageantry, began with the meeting of the accession council to draw up the official document announcing George VI as the new British ruler.

Slowly the new King, who had left Piccadilly three minutes earlier, walked to his place before the great crimson and gold throne.

In a firm voice, an official announced that the councillors were assembled to "publish and proclaim with one voice and consent of the tongue and heart that High and Mighty Prince Albert Frederick Arthur George is now, by the Grace of God, become our only and lawful Liege Lord as King George VI to whom we do acknowledge all faith and constant obedience with all hearty and humble affection."

The King's first official act, after the proclamation of his accession, was to receive greetings and expressions of loyalty from representatives of the Dominions.

In his personal messages to the three fighting services, King George pointed out to the Navy that he had seen service with naval units during the Great War. His message to the Royal Air Force recalled that he had served with the Independent squadrons in France in 1918.

After the Proclamation ceremonies, King George received Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner, and representatives of other Dominions.

New King's Pledge
George VI pledged to Parliament today "my constant endeavor, with God's help and supported by my dear wife, to uphold the honor of the realm and promote the happiness of the people."
