Three Men-Two Bandits And One Police Officer-Killed During Hold-up in Ontario

SARNIA, Ont., May 26: (CP)-Norman F. (Red) Ryan and Harry Checkley were fatally wounded after Ryan shot to death Constable John Lewis during a hold-up of the Ontario government liquor store here Saturday night.

Ryan was paroled from Kingston Penitentiary ten months ago after the then Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and other public officials interested themselves in his behalf and he was pointed to as an example of a reformed criminal.

Sergeant George Smith and Detective Frank Mc-Girr, who followed Lewis into the store, shot down both robbers after they had killed Lewis. Ryan had taken \$394 from the till while Checkley held up 25 customers and employees. They were about to leave when the officers, informed of the hold-up, appeared on the scene.
