Mystery Man and Gambling

Many people read with interest the two column article published in this paper Friday about Sir Basil Zaharoff, the "mystery man," who died at Monte Carlo, the world's richest man.

It is a curious fact that while Zaharoff was one of the owners of the most noted gambling house in the world, he never gambled there himself or at any place where the odds were loaded against him. He would not play a slot machine because he knew he would lose in the end. He did not buy and sell shares on the stock exchange because he could not play his own limited knowledge against the sharpers who gambled there. He did not play the races because he knew he was bound to lose. When he gambled, and he was an inveterate gambler, he did it in a game where his chance of winning was at least two to one. He was usually one of those who operated the machine and not among the fool public who played on the losing side. He is said to have lost two hundred thousand dollars before he learned that it is impossible to beat the gamblers at their own game. He had to make a game of his own and he did and won to such an extent that he became the world's richest man.

Deputy Minister Dies

The Province of British Columbia has lost a fine young man in the person of Robert Dunn, deputy minister of mines, son of Robert Dunn of the editorial staff of the Victoria Colonist.

Mr. Dunn was a newspaperman by profession, having had most of his experience on the two Victoria newspapers. He was taken from an editorial desk to become private secretary to the minister of mines, Hon. W. J. Sloan, father of the present attorney-general. Later he was promoted to the position of deputy minister of mines, a position which he held during the Tolmie administration and again under Mines Minister Pearson. Only last year he made a tour of the mining districts and spent several days in Prince Rupert. He was a capable official and took a keen interest in his work. His death is a distinct loss to the province and particularly to the mining industry.

Why Be Unpleasant

If there were no unpleasant people in the world, life might be so happy. Everywhere we find people saying unpleasant things about their neighbors and in some cases trying to injure them or at any rate trying to injure their good names. In sparsely settled districts conditions are even worse than in cities or towns. Neighbors are not speaking to each other just because they happen to disagree or because they feel the neighbor has not used them right.

If we could all look pleasant, say pleasant things and be pleasant in all our dealings, the world would be a pleasant place.

Naturally none of us can agree with our neighbors in everything. We hold divergent opinions but if we are to get along in the world we have to agree to differ. We may differ in a thousand ways and yet be good friends. Tolerance is what we all must learn if we are to do our part in making the world happy.

MISSION STARTED

Large Congregation in St. Andrew's Cathedral Yesterday to Hear Bishop of Cariboo

Religion Needed

Visiting Cleric Reflects Upon International, Economic and Moral Problems

Large congregations assembled yesterday in St. Andrew's Cathedral for the opening services of the five days Mission conducted by Rt. Rev. G. A. Wells, Bishop of Cariboo.

The morning service took the form of a thanksgiving service for the success of the Restoration Fund campaign whereby over one million dollars had been contributed for the restoration of the lost funds and the carrying on of the church's work in the ecclesiastical province of Rupert's Land.

The preacher prefaced his sermon with a brief reference to the causes for thankfulness. He was not going to preach services this week. His purpose was to have a talk on religion and life with the people who came—what religion means to the world, to Canada, to British Columbia and to the individual. His theme would be "The Kingdom Come."

He referred to what Christ meant by the petition and how it was accepted by His immediate followers. He changed it from that of a national idea to that of the individual—"The Kingdom of God is within you." The value of the season of Advent was to stir up the expectation of the coming of the Kingdom.

What will happen in Canada when the Kingdom comes? There would be change in governments and social life including school systems. There would be so many changes that people would not recognize them.

Bishop Wells referred to the great upheavals taking place in the world today and suggested that this might be part of God's plan for establishing the Kingdom. These upheavals were like a toothache and many better things would emerge from them. It was sometimes difficult for people to see but God saw the plan complete.

Success in life was to be measured by the phrase: "I tried to do the best I could under all circumstances. It should be our mission to do all we can to bring about the changes in the world in a quiet and peaceful manner."

The exact date of the coming of the Kingdom was not known although certain signs had been given. The job was to work, watch and pray.

The upheaval of the world would lead to the setting up of another civilization. What people should be in the next stage of life depended on what they were trying to do now. There would be more happiness and less unrest if all lived in accordance with the precept of Christ and did unto others as they would they should do unto themselves.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

On a regularly scheduled voyage to Alaska, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 11:20 yesterday morning from Vancouver and sailed an hour later for Skagway and other northern points. The vessel, which is scheduled to call here southbound next Thursday afternoon, had on board 130 passengers. There were three disembarking at Prince Rupert while 22 boarded the ship at this point for Alaska.

Returning south after a special voyage to Alaska, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 3:30 yesterday afternoon from Skagway and sailed a couple of hours later for Vancouver. The vessel had on board a capacity passenger list of 250, consisting principally of Alaskans who have been tied up owing to the cessation of American boat operations due to the maritime workers' strike. There were 110 from Juneau and 50 from Ketchikan. Four persons disembarked here and one went aboard here.

Delayed by fog on the lower coast and heavy freights for way-points, Union steamer Catala, Capt. John Muir, did not arrive in port until 11:30 last night from the south and sailed an hour or so later for Port Simpson, Stewart, Anxox and other northern points whence she will return here Tuesday afternoon southbound.

Capt. Pete Byrne was in port this morning with his Helen II bringing in a load of 2000 pounds of flatfish for the Bacon Fisheries.

Motorship Atlas was in port this morning from Ketchikan with another load of mild cured salmon in tins for transshipment East over the Canadian National Railways.

Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Lily, Capt. Reg Green, arrived in port Saturday night from Dundas Island with a scowload of clamshells. Several smaller scowloads will be assembled here and delivered to Seattle in a large scow.

To assist in straightening up a tow of logs bound from the Morge Logging Co.'s camp at Sedgewick Bay, Queen Charlotte Islands, the Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Lily, Capt. Reg Charlie Edwards, left early Sunday morning for Captain's Cove.

ARMY HEAD WAS HEARD

Commissioner McMillan Tells Rotary Club of Salvation Work

The work of the Salvation Army commenced only seventy-one years ago in Whitechapel, the poorer section of London, but today it is a world-wide organization with 12,500 centres and 20,000 officers devoting their full time to the work of the organization, according to Commissioner John McMillan, head of the Army in Canada, Alaska, Newfoundland and Bermuda, in an address to the Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon in the Commodore Cafe Friday afternoon.

Telling further about the activities of the Salvation Army, Commissioner McMillan said the work was being carried out in sixty different languages and in most of the countries of the world. They had been thrown out of Soviet Russia at the time of the revolution, their leader being led to the border and told to go. Of the members some escaped across the border.

The work began in Canada in 1832, fifty years ago, and now the Army was represented by 1800 officers trying to be useful in the various communities. There were no classes of work being carried out. One was the evangelization work on the street corners and the other was the social service work in which they cared for the destitute, the heart-broken, bringing to them the message of joy and good cheer.

The Commissioner spoke of the splendid work being carried out by the Army girls. At Prince Rupert they had an excellent officer in charge and he was surprised to hear from her that there was destitution even here.

The Salvation Army, the Commissioner said, did not set out to do social service work. They had no definite plan which they were carrying out. The work just grew and extended as the need was seen in their maternity hospitals no

fewer than 45,000 babies had been born. They had training schools for registered nurses and also short courses for practical nurses who carried out special work.

The Commissioner told of a visit to Scotland two years ago. This was the country in which he was born and which he had left when only five years of age. He mentioned a visit to the Army in Glasgow where he heard testimonies in a dialect of which he gave an excellent imitation.

Concluding the Army leader said they were trying to make Canada a better Canada. They were co-operating with other organizations and were helping to tackle the youth problem which today was the responsibility of everyone. He thanked the members of the Rotary Club for the practical help they had given the Salvation Army in the past.

Dean Gibson presided at the luncheon Friday and visitors included Right Rev. G. A. Wells Dr. J. P. Cade, Rev. Dr. Victor McLean, Dr. J. T. Mandy, W. H. Wilson-Murray, Gunnar Anderson and Dr. A. S. Lamb.

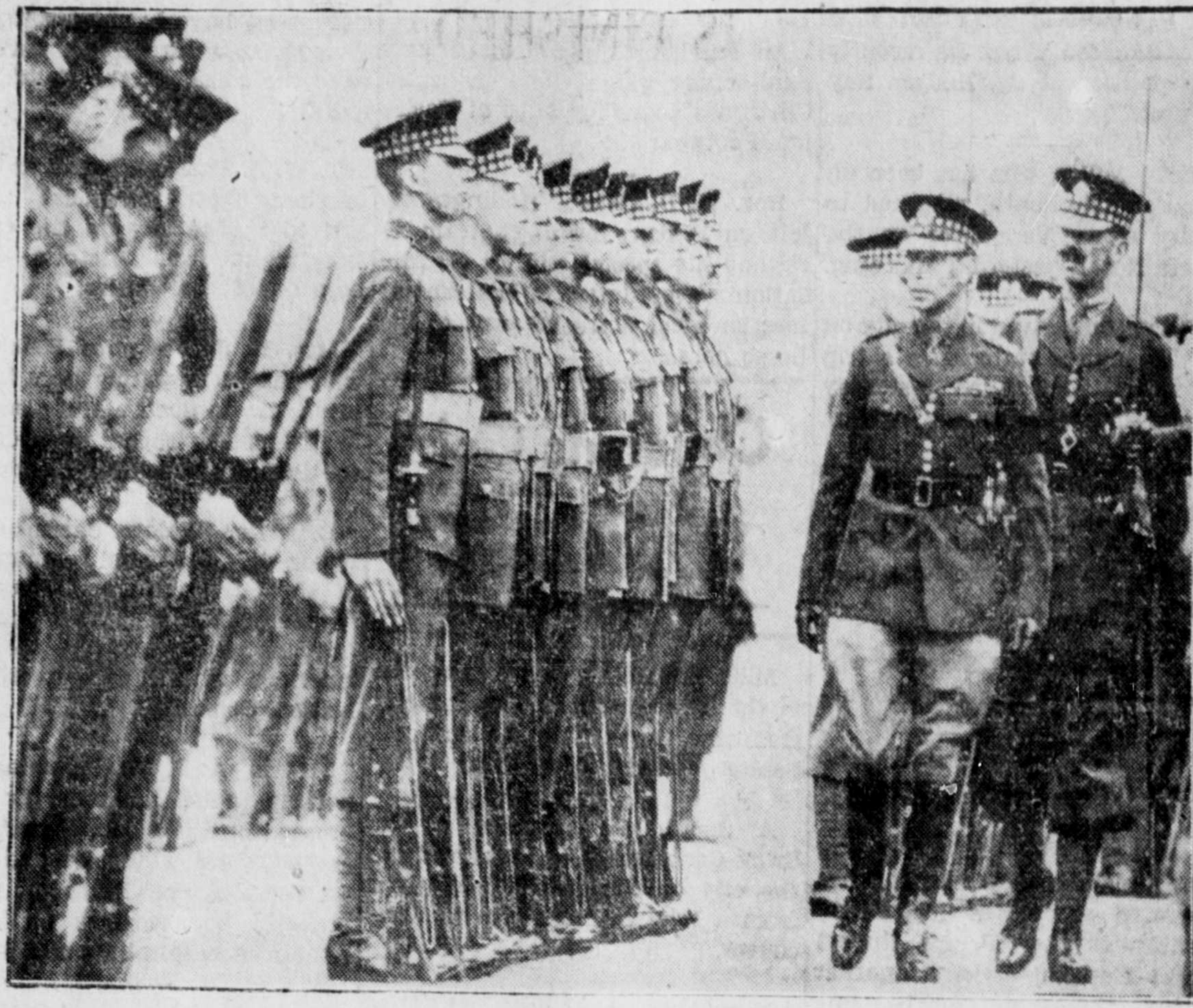

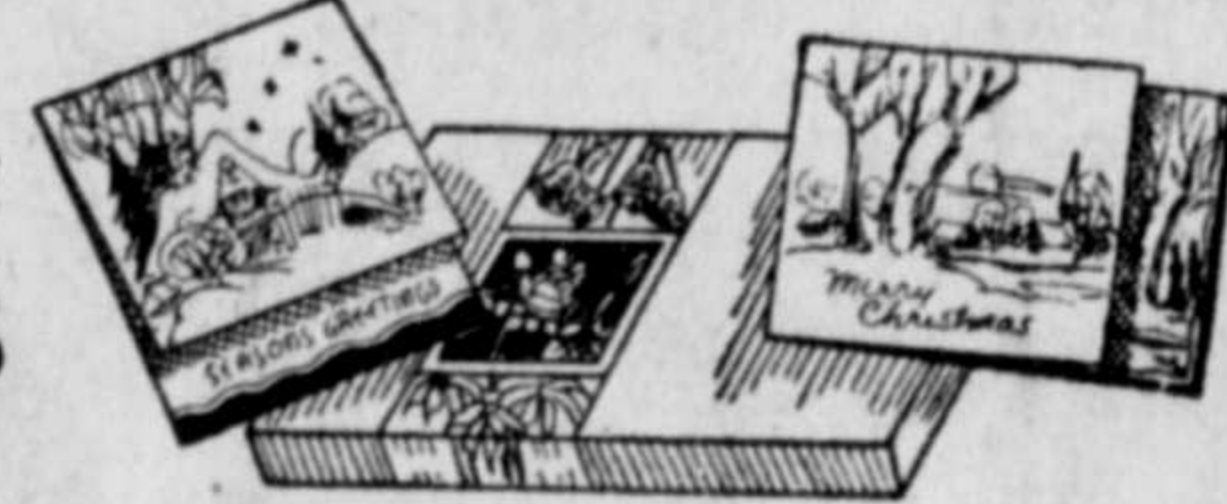

ROUSING MEETING

Commissioner and Mrs. John McMillan Conclude Visit To Prince Rupert

The concluding event in connection with the visit to Prince Rupert the latter part of the week of Commissioner John McMillan, territorial commander of the Salvation Army for Canada, Newfoundland, Bermuda and Alaska, was a rousing army meeting Saturday evening in the local Citadel, which was practically filled for the occasion. Commissioner and Mrs. McMillan both gave revival addresses and one of the features of the proceedings was the presentation to the distinguished Army leaders by Rev. W. H. Mark McKay from Kitselas, and Mrs. (Captain) Richard Tomlinson from Cedarvale. The local officers, Adjutant Eva Laycock and Capt. E. Robertson, also took a leading part.

In her address, Mrs. McMillan regretted that there was so much selfishness and indifference to God's claims today. "Let us be encouraged to serve in spite of temptations," she exhorted.

Commissioner McMillan told the interesting story of his conversion with his parents when he was a boy in Scotland. That was nearly sixty years ago. He had been in the Salvation Army ever since. God was still working powerfully in the hearts of men and women. He wished, however, that the faith of many was stronger. At the conclusion he appealed for converts and there was at least one response.
