Atrocities Are Continuing in Spain

RUSSIA IS AGITATED

Soviet Circles Have Jitters As Result of Purge—Numerous Arrests Being Made

Case of Trotsky

Norway Indicates it Will Not Be Stamped by Soviet Demand

MOSCOW, Aug. 31: (CP)—Reports of wholesale arrests being carried out by the Soviet government in the wake of the recent trial which was climaxed by the execution of sixteen "old Bolsheviks" have spread panic through the ranks of all party circles in the Soviet capital. A number of important government officials are being arrested daily. With Dictator Joseph Stalin facing a tense political crisis, the purge is being continued with a firm and vigorous hand. Mrs. Lenin, widow of Nikolai Lenin, has been restrained from political utterances.

from political utterances. The Soviet secret police over the week-end began a sweeping drive against all elements in government, theatrical and literary classes suspected of disloyalty to the Stalin regime.

A note handed by the Soviet government on Saturday to the Norwegian minister demanding that Leon Trotsky be expelled from Norway made it plain that Norway's refusal to expel the noted Bolshevik leader, who is alleged to have plotted against Dictator Joseph Stalin and his government, would prejudice good relations between the two governments and would be considered a violation of international law. There was no indication, however, that the Soviet government had demanded the return of the exile to Russia. The Soviet protest at Norwegian harboring of Trotsky, charged with fomenting a terrorist plot against the Soviet Union's leader, is a vigorous one.

Norway's Reply
OSLO, Aug. 31:—The Norwegian Premier yesterday indicated that Norway had no intention of taking any further action in connection with the peremptory demand of the Russian Soviet government that Leon Trotsky be immediately expelled. The demand was characterized as being an unreasonable one and Norway indicates its intention of handling the matter in its own way. It was stated however, that Trotsky's permit to remain in Norway would expire on December 18 and that the Norwegian government would be glad if he could secure a visa to some other country by that time.

JAP SHIP FOR LOGS

Steamer Tونغawa Maru Arrives Here on Way to Queen Charlotte Islands

After a speedy and uneventful voyage across the Pacific Ocean from Muroran, Japan, which port she left on August 17, the Japanese freighter Tونغawa Maru, Capt. S. Muto, dropped anchor in Prince Rupert Harbor at 8 o'clock last evening. After going through customs, immigration and quarantine formalities here, the vessel will leave late this afternoon or evening for Sedgewick Bay, Queen Charlotte Islands, to load a full cargo of hemlock and spruce logs from the camp of J. R. Morgan Logging Co. for delivery to the Orient.

Capt. A. E. Lewis of Nanaimo is acting as pilot for the vessel and will stay with her while she is in coastal waters.

QUEEN MARY MAKES MARK

Great British Steamer Batters Round Trip Record Of Normandie

SOUTHAMPTON, Aug. 31: (CP)—The giant new British liner Queen Mary rounded Bishop's Rock at 8:12 last night, having set a new high speed Atlantic round trip record, undisputedly beating the former record of the French liner Normandie. The Queen Mary made the trip from New York in three days, 23 hours, 51 minutes, three hours, 31 minutes less than the Normandie's time. The average speed was 30.63 knots as compared with Normandie's 30.34 knots last year. The Queen Mary up to Saturday night had covered 713 knots at a speed of 31 knots per hour and 2000 knots at 30.59 knots per hour record, undisputedly beating the Normandie. The Queen Mary captured the westward record outbound a little over a week ago and now has surpassed every mark set by the Normandie.

Her Disappearance Is Still Unsolved

Police Unable to Reach Solution In Case of Mrs. Mathew Davis

VANCOUVER, Aug. 31:—Police investigation of the disappearance of Mrs. Mathew Davis of Victoria from the steamer Princess Joan between Victoria and Vancouver at the end of the week continues but so far without success. The woman could not be accounted for after the steamer docked in Vancouver. It has been learned that she suffered a nervous breakdown recently.

Premier Ends Island Tour

Mr. Pattullo Back in Victoria After Flight in Which Number Of Points Were Visited

VICTORIA, Aug. 31: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo landed here late Friday after completing a flight around Vancouver Island in a chartered plane. Stops were made at several points for the purpose of permitting the Premier to study local requirements. The plane was piloted by Capt. E. C. W. Dobbin and the Premier was accompanied by his secretary, Ben Hethy, and Kenneth Drury, editor of the Victoria Times.

OFFICERS ARE SLAIN

Three Lose Lives at Hands of Men They Sought to Apprehend

YREKA, Cal., Aug. 31:—Deputy Sheriffs Martin Lange, 45, and Joseph Clark, 65, and Fred Seaborn, 48, United States Navy pilot at Mare Island, were killed Sunday in a gun battle with John and Coke Bright, brothers whom the sheriffs sought to arrest for assaulting a neighbor. The brothers, both of whom are miners, fled to the hills.

Madrid Is Terrorized

Spanish Capital Under Martial Law—Organized Massacres—San Sebastian Siege

U. S. Protest

Bombing of American Destroyer Is Latest International Incident

MADRID, Aug. 31: (CP)—Madrid is under virtual martial law as troops patrol the streets in the endeavor to keep order among the people who have become terrorized and panic-stricken as a result of the first rebel air raid of the city. Organized massacres are being reported from all parts of the country. Two thousand are said to have been assassinated in Madrid since the civil war started.

Rebel forces were making another determined effort to capture San Sebastian, key port of the north coast. A rebel threat that Irún, northern Spanish town, would be bombarded by land, sea and air, has caused the flight of women and children from there to Hendaye, France.

There was bloody fighting on all fronts yesterday with little change in the general situation.

Prisoners Exposed

IRUN, Spain, Aug. 31: (CP)—Government defenders of Irún brought three hundred rebel prisoners into the bombarded city tonight and announced they would be exposed at the most dangerous points to insurgent bombs.

All old men, women and children of Republican families were sent across the border to safety at Hendaye, France, but anti-Republicans were forced to remain as combined land, sea and air bombardment was believed imminent.

Burnings at Stake

BURGOS, Spain, Aug. 31: (CP)—Public burning at the stake of seven suspected rebel sympathizers and murder of the bishops of Segovia and Cuenca were included in a new series of atrocities charged against loyalist forces by rebel leaders today.

American Ship Bombed

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 31:—United States was projected into the centre of the international situation arising out of the Spanish civil war last night when Secretary of State Cordell Hull, on instructions of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, sent a strong protest to both the government and rebels at the attempted bombing of U. S. S. Kane, a destroyer, by an unidentified airplane thirty-eight miles off the coast of Spain Sunday afternoon. The Kane was not struck but returned the fire of the aircraft, which dropped six bombs, without effect. The protest to the Spanish government was sent through the United States ambassador at Madrid and that to General Francisco Franco, supreme rebel commander, through the American minister at Seville.

The Kane had been sent to the Spanish coast to evacuate American refugees.

Record Is Set In Vancouver To Prairie Hop

LETHBRIDGE, Aug. 31:—Herbert Hollick-Kenyon landed here at the end of the week after topping three hours off the previous record for a flight from the Pacific Coast city to this point.

CHANGES IN SCHOOLS

There is to be a change in the outlook of the public schools, if the efforts of Dr. Weir and his associates at Victoria are successful. A new curriculum is being worked out, designed to "orient the child in life rather than cram him full of facts." According to a despatch from Victoria the second bulletin of a series is being sent out which makes provision for social studies in the lower grades and geography, general character education and elementary science in the middle classes. Other changes are to be made, according to the despatch.

While there does not seem to be anything very new in the suggested changes, it is probably a good thing to emphasize the higher things of life and it is to be expected that along similar lines particular stress will be laid in future bulletins on the value in education of music, literature and art. There was a time when a big fight was made for the right of every child to an education in reading, writing and arithmetic. The next big fight will be to secure to every child at least preliminary training in music and the other arts with a view to developing a fuller life and better appreciation of the things that have in the past been the privileges of the wealthy. There would be no extra cost in this. Already in some of the provinces of Canada every teacher is equipped for the teaching of elementary music including the theory of sound and harmony. The total cost is the acquiring of a pitch pipe or tuning fork. The day has evidently arrived when the time of the school should be devoted to something other than learning how to acquire an education through reading, writing and arithmetic, important as these preliminaries are. Actual education should commence in the schools instead of being relegated to the haphazard post-school period.

SPORT CHAT

Contrary to general expectations the man behind the gun on the prairies will not enjoy the banner season predicted in 1936 when the ducks started their annual flight from the northward. Lowering of water levels in the nurseries across the three prairie provinces and the drying up of pot holes, sloughs and lakes has resulted in a shortage of waterfowl according to early reports. Thousands of duck were reported to have perished.

Largest nesting area for game birds on the American continent, south and southwestern Saskatchewan and Alberta have suffered most from lack of rainfall. The situation is not serious in Manitoba where concentration is reported at wider intervals than in former years. The far north remained a question mark on the duck crop chart. Conditions bordering on the critical were reported from extensive sections of southern Saskatchewan. Some species of duck were met with only at rare intervals while others were so reduced in numbers they were said to be in need of more protection.

Breeding conditions for canvasbacks and redheads were at a dangerously low level in the wheat province, a government survey stated. The supply of green-winged teal and ruddy duck was near depletion, officials of the Saskatchewan game branch said. Similar conditions prevailed in southern Alberta. Northern areas, with more water than in previous years, have benefitted from the drought conditions to the south. To what extent breeding grounds in the far north will contribute to the hunter's restricted bag this year was not known. Biological survey parties are engaged in a widespread survey in the Yukon and other districts.

A survey conducted by land and air last year showed more than 40,000,000 ducks nesting in regions adjacent to the Great Lakes, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba with large increases in border states to the south. Largest migration in six years was reported in prospect.

GIANTS WIN STREAK OFF

Suffered Defeat at Hands of Pittsburgh Pirates Saturday—Cards In Second Place

PITTSBURG, Aug. 31.—(OP)—The fifteen game winning streak of the New York Giants came to an end on Saturday when they were defeated 7 to 4 by the Pittsburgh Pirates. Four pitchers were unable to stay the batting attack of the Pirates who made 14 hits. The Giants, however, maintained a three-game lead in the standing over the Chicago Cubs and St. Louis Cardinals who went into a temporary tie for second place as a result of the former losing to Boston Bees after having won six straight while the Cards ended their losing streak by blanking the Phillies. Yesterday the Giants—Carl Hubbel pitching the first and Mel Ott hitting a homer in the second—won two games of a double-header from the Cubs who were driven back into third place below the Cards who split with Brooklyn Dodgers, the second game going 13 innings before Dodgers won. Dizzy Dean pitched St. Louis to victory in the opener.

In the American League New York Yankees again vanquished the Detroit Tigers and "School Boy" Rowe.

The St. Louis Browns are now in the cellar below Philadelphia Athletics.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

There were 251 passengers on board C. P. R. steamer Princess Louis which was in port Saturday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Seven persons disembarked from the vessel at this port while one boarded her here for Vancouver.

Halibut landings at Seattle last week totalled 624,000 pounds, the daily price average being 10 1/4c to 12 1/2c per pound which was unusually strong. Booth Fisheries was the heaviest purchaser for the week with 139,000 pounds, Sebastian, Whiz, San Juan, New England and Washington following in the order mentioned. On Saturday three boats sold catches totalling 74,000 pounds at Seattle as follows: Pacific, 36,000 pounds, 10 1/4c straight to Booth; Federal, 20,000 pounds, 11 1/4c and 10 3/4c to San Juan; National, 18,000 pounds, 10 1/4c and 10 3/4c to Sebastian.

Quite a number of Seattle halibut boats, following the closing of Area No. 2 to halibut fishing, have taken up sable fishing until November 1. Landings of sablefish at Seattle are becoming quite heavy, 51,000 pounds having been sold there Saturday at 3 3/4c per pound.

At Ketchikan on Saturday a total of 62,500 pounds of halibut was sold as follows: Akutan, 37,000 pounds, 7c and 6c; Garland, 8,500 pounds, 8 1/4c and 6c; Lansing, 17,000 pounds, 8 1/2c and 6c. Marilyn Fish Co. bought all three catches.

James Findlay, arrived in port at 11:30 last night from the south and sailed a couple of hours later for Stewart, Anyox and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow afternoon southbound.
