EXTENDING INSURANCE

Connelly Thinks Small And Prospectors Should be Included—Gov't Endorsed

VICTORIA, Oct. 29: (CP)—M. M. Connelly, Omineca, moving the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne in the Legislature yesterday, said he thought that the benefits of health insurance should be extended to the "small farmer and prospector as well as other people not employees of industry."

J. Howard Forester, Vancouver-Barrard, seconding the address, said that both Connelly and himself had won their elections on the government's record which thereby had been endorsed both in the city and country within the past few months.

The Speech from the Throne was presented to the House Tuesday following the formal opening which was attended by the usual colorful ceremonies including the twenty-one gun salute. There is speculation as to whether or not this will be the last session before dissolution next year. The general expectation, however, is that there will be at least a spring session following this.

Immediately after the formal opening, the two new members were duly introduced.

Army Officer Goes Up Naas

Br. Carruthers of Salvation Army Visits Canyon City Mission And Other Points

Brigadier W. J. Carruthers, divisional commander of the Salvation Army for Northern British Columbia and Alaska with headquarters in Wrangell, returned this week from a trip up the Naas River to visit the Salvation Army mission at Canyon City. He also made calls at Dinolth, Greenville, Alyansh and Atkadamix.

At Canyon City where Lieut. Carruthers is in charge of the Army work, extensive overhaul is being made of the mission building. The people there complain of the inconvenient mails. In the winter there is a monthly service. The mailman lives at Alyansh, brings the mail down to the steamer at the mouth of the river and returns with the incoming mail. Then there is no opportunity to answer mail for a month. Also the mail is sent in canvas bags, which become wet through by the time they reach their destination at Alyansh and the newspapers have to be spread on a line to dry before they can be read.

Brig. Carruthers is leaving for Wrangell on the Princess Norah tomorrow.

NEW GRAIN IS COMING

Revival of Wheat Shipping Through Local Elevator To Begin Next Week

Grain is about to start rolling again into the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator. Advice has been received that two hundred carloads or about a quarter of the capacity of the elevator will be on the way within the next ten days. It will be the first of the new season's grain to come here from the prairies.

The loading of the Norwegian motorship Heina and the British steamer Swiftpool, due respectively on Monday and Wednesday of next week, with full cargoes for the United Kingdom or Continent will make room for the new grain.

Market conditions are responsible for the revival of grain shipping through this port, it is stated at elevator offices.

SUSTAINED BAD BURNS

Elderly Kitkatla Indian Meets With Severe Accident—Died Here Today

Severely burned about the abdomen as a result of having fallen against a coal oil lamp in his home where he lived alone, Ben Wilson, 70-year old Kitkatla native, was brought to the city from that village yesterday afternoon and admitted to the Prince Rupert General Hospital. He died early this afternoon and his remains will be taken to the native village tomorrow for burial.

It was at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon that the elderly native met with the accident. Five hours later his painful plight was discovered by natives who heard his groans and feeble cries for help. He was brought here aboard the seiboat Collision by Charles Wilson. Other villagers also came in on the Norma G.

Wilson was a fisherman and all his life has been in the employ of the B. C. Packers. His wife died a couple of years ago.

Former Premier Dies—TORONTO—Almost simultaneously with the formal finish of forty years of public life, Hon. T. C. Norris, former Premier of Manitoba, died today. His term as member of the Board of Railway Commissioners expired last month at the age of 75.

Marine Strike Delayed—SAN FRANCISCO—Threat of a coastwise maritime strike, involving 37,000 men, was averted early today for at least 24 hours by last minute negotiations to reach working agreements between shipping companies and sea-going unions.

Plane At Terrace—TERRACE—On its way to Anyox, a plane of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., piloted by H. D. Anderson and with C. H. Currie and E. G. Randall on board, landed in the Skeena River a mile below the bridge yesterday afternoon. It was forced down by fog and is still here today awaiting an improvement in conditions.

Saunders, veteran British Columbia master mariner and former agent of the Marine Department at Prince Rupert, who has retired.

Spent Fifty Years At Sea; Sir Edgar Britten's Career

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., Oct. 29: (CP)—Captain Sir Edgar Britten, commodore of the Cunard-White Star Line and commander of the great new speed queen of the Atlantic, Queen Mary, who died in a Southampton nursing home yesterday after suffering a heart attack, had followed the sea since he was thirteen years old. He started out as an apprentice on a sailing barque. Sixty-two years of age, he was a Yorkshireman and was noted for his taciturnity.

APPEAL TURNED DOWN BY BANK OF CANADA

EDMONTON, Oct. 29: (CP)—Premier William Aberhart's Social Credit government of Alberta met with another financial setback yesterday when the Bank of Canada refused to loan \$3,500,000 which was sought to pay off two bond maturities, one which fell due last April and on which only interest has been paid and another which becomes due on November 1.

PATROL IS PROPOSED

Great Britain Presents Plan For Preventing Outside Intervention in Spain

LONDON, Oct. 29: (CP)—Great Britain yesterday suggested to the Spanish civil war international non-intervention committee naval patrols of the Spanish and Portuguese coasts as a means of preventing arms shipments to either side in the civil war.

Signor Grandi of Italy charged Russia with twenty specific breaches of the non-intervention accord and demanded an investigation.

PORTUGAL, ITALY CLEARED—Russia protested strenuously at Portugal and Italy being cleared by the committee of charges of violating the "Hands Off Spain" policy. Three separate votes on various charges were taken and all were unanimous for "acquittal" except for Russia's dissent.

HOW BRITISH STAND

Great Britain stands by non-intervention in the Spanish civil war, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the House of Commons today, declaring that the alternative would be rival groupings of powers supplying arms to the combatants in Spain. This would mean confusion, international recriminations and might mean war.

Italo-German Accord Could Be Extended

BERLIN, Oct. 29:—The new Italo-German accord is designed as a measure of preserving peace in Europe and it is open to any nations which wish to subscribe to its terms, it is stated officially here.

ANYOX NOW GHOST TOWN

Resuscitation of the Corpse Sees Not at all Likely at Present

Just one of hundreds of ghost towns on this continent, Anyox has lost all its life, its activity, its usefulness. It is now a huge junkshop from which the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company draws supplies to help carry on its other activities.

In visiting Anyox this week I was anxious not so much to see as to feel what a ghost town was like. I was directed to the bunkhouse at the other end of the town by Mr. Evans, who represents the Consolidated there now. But there were bunhouses everywhere and all of them seemed to be empty. No sign of life. There was no one in sight from whom to inquire I was lost amid the emptiness of the place.

At last I spied smoke coming from a small building and, making my way to it, I found it was the mess house for the remaining group of mechanics who were dismantling some of the machinery. Charlie, the Chinese cook, was there and he directed me to one of the smaller bunkhouses where the men sojourned. I was allotted to number 47, a room opening on to a balcony. It had two beds, clean sheets, electric light and heat, so I remained and felt myself fortunate in securing so pleasant and useful a place to spend a couple of days.

The building was constructed of concrete so, both walls and floors were concrete, the latter being cold to the feet but, as the electric stove was going night and day, it was pleasant enough.

The men at the mess allowed me to join them, paying a very reasonable fee for meals. Charlie was a good cook and there seemed no lack of luxuries such as grapefruit for breakfast and fresh celery for dinner. Food and companionship were excellent, the only lack being the one common to most mining towns, that of fresh milk. I was told that the cost of the mess to each man was only about \$22 a month.

From the Hill

I climbed the hill at the back of the smelter and looked down at the huge work now idle. It seemed to me that the town was a corpse and the few men there were undertakers slowly disposing of the remains. The community that once occupied the houses, the bunkhouses, the apartments and hotel were now doing their stuff elsewhere, tiny puppets on the human stage. The movie theatre, the bowling alleys, the tennis courts, the golf course, all were deserted and the footsteps of the intruder echoed and re-echoed in the solitude. The only ones left carrying on their regular duties are the government agent, the postmaster, the storekeeper, the provincial constable, the coroner and the United Church minister. All of these will probably be moved soon.

During my trip I have visited several points of interest and in each there have been evidences of growth, of development, in some cases of resuscitation but in Anyox there is not the slightest sign of hope. The town is dead and it looks as if it will remain dead for some time to come. True, the corpse may yet come to life, but just now the resurrection day looks to be a long way off. The corpse has begun to decay and only a few of its gold teeth are being skillfully removed.—H. F. P.

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THE SPANISH SITUATION

There are still some who think the Spanish government forces have a chance to win in the civil war against the Fascist rebels. Lloyd George evidently does not think so. He writes that, while the Fascists are well armed and well organized under strong military leaders, the government troops are little more than an undrilled rabble without strong leaders and lacking in co-operation and unity of purpose. He sees little hope of the government forces winning.

Other writers claim that the Spanish government will eventually win, but probably their prophecies are born more of hope than reason. In reading the claims for each side without bias to either it looks as if the present united front in Spain is doomed.

COMMUNISM IS BOLD

There is an increasing boldness being shown by the Communists in Canada during the past few months. A big effort has been made to capture the labor organizations and to some extent it has succeeded. The C. C. F. in British Columbia has split in two over the tendencies of some of their leaders to go Red. Newspapers have been circularized in regard to Communist activities. The Communists have made a big effort to send a shipload of supplies to the government forces in Spain from Canada. More and more they have been pushing to the fore and getting their cause discussed in public, all pointing to a revival of subversive effort.

The difficulty has been that this Communistic revival has been fed by the federal government in the leisurely manner in which it is tackling the unemployment question. It was laid before the former government and the present with ability and force by British Columbia's representatives but, as the business journals state, unemployment is still a major problem in Canada. Once it is dealt with effectively Communism will disappear as an active and subversive force in Canada.

The evening was spent in playing bridge. Prize winners were: first, Miss Sheila Stuart; second, Miss Helen Walker.

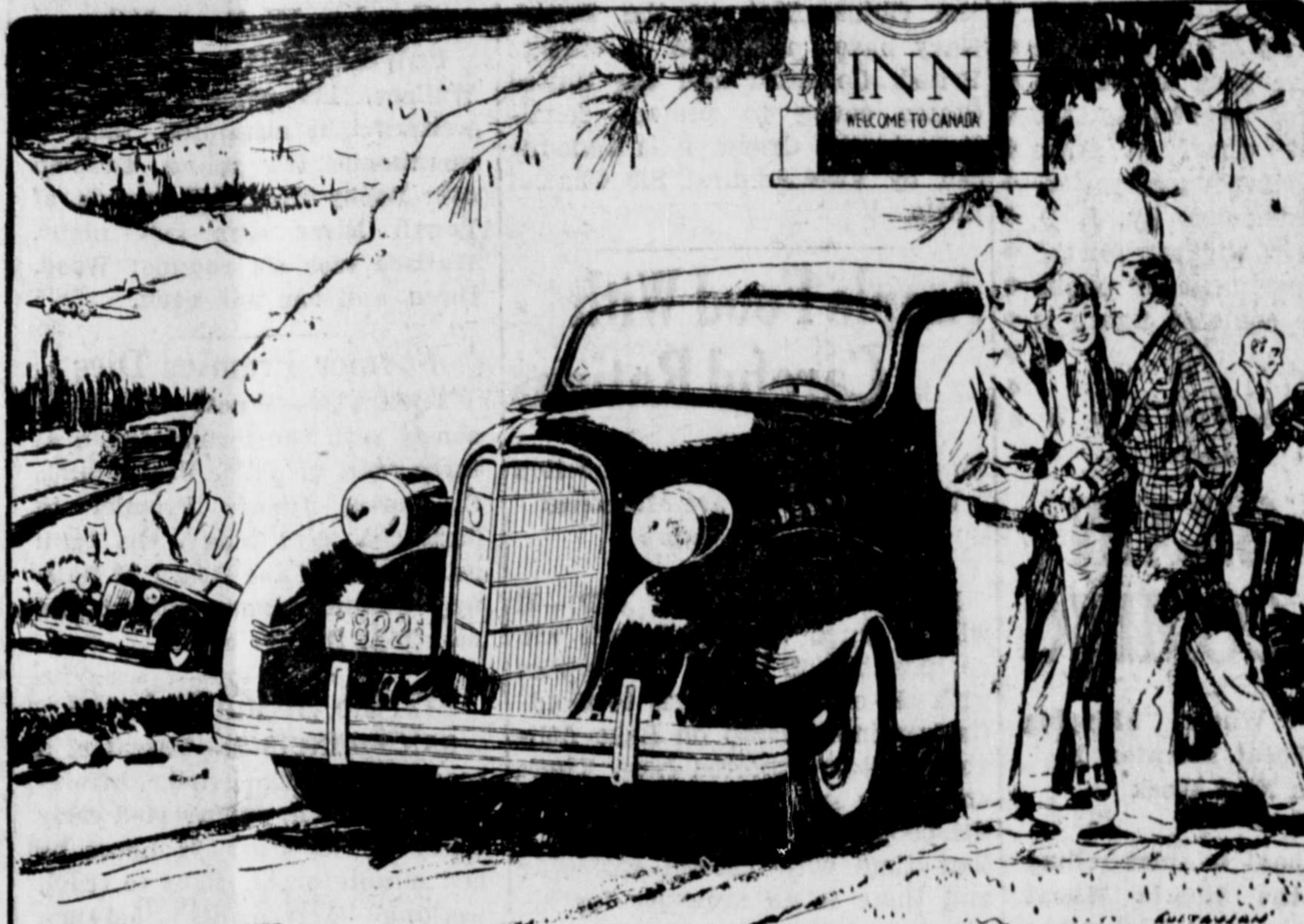

During Mr. Walkem's first term of office, the construction of the Transcontinental Railway was a very controversial matter. The Federal Government, then in power, refused to go ahead with the construction of the railway beyond Lake Superior. Lord Carnarvon was appointed by Queen Victoria, as arbitrator of the railway question under the Confederation agreement, from which developed the famous "Carnarvon Terms". These terms called for building a railroad from Esquimalt to Nanaimo, but no work on the Transcontinental railroad.

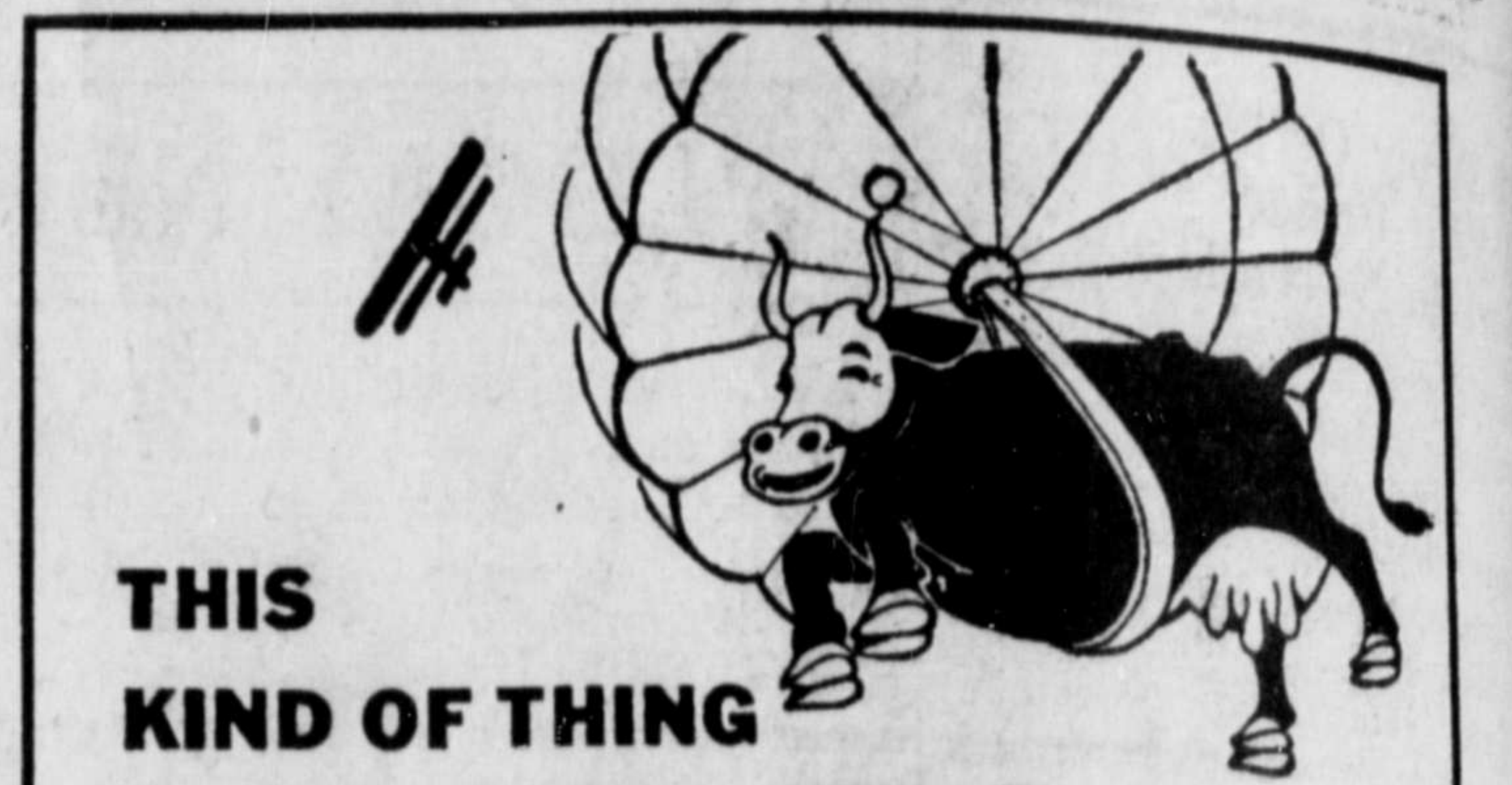
