THE CITY ENGINEER AND THE RAW DEAL

The News has always been careful in criticising public men and public affairs to avoid any attack on public servants. There are two reasons for this. A public servant has little opportunity to reply to attacks, and his actions are invariably the result of obeying the orders of his official head.

But there are times, when a public servant should not be screened; when he should prove his integrity by handing in his resignation rather than consent to obey orders that constitute a breach of good faith to the general public.

An occasion such as this has arisen in regard to the City Engineer's action over the Woodworth Lake clearing contracts. No one knows better than the City Engineer the impropriety of opening the contractors' and station-gangs' tenders before putting in his own price. That he should have been a party to Alderman Hilditch's scheme, is more than a matter of departmental discipline. It is a public issue.

The News is not at all concerned with any disciplinary relations that Colonel Davis may have with the Chairman of the Public Works Committee. Colonel Davis is free to eat out of Alderman Hilditch's hand if he so please. But his duty is not personal to Alderman Hilditch. His duty is to the city at large. His fidelity is due to every citizen, including the contractors and citizens who composed the station gangs.

Colonel Davis would have enhanced his professional standing, by refusing to be a party to such a contemptible trick as that which Alderman Hilditch and his colleagues played on the contractors and the men of the station gangs.

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
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
