## ONTARIO LIBERALS TRY A CHANGE OF LEADERS

### HAVE CITY BAND FOR RUPERT

Live Effort on Foot to Organise a Proper Brass and Reed Instrument Band of Musicians to Form Regular Prince Rupert's Own Band.

Determined to organise if possible this winter a city band, a number of the players of band instruments both brass and reed, got together the other evening and discussed the proposition. As a result of enquiry it is found that there are already over a score of residents of Prince Rupert who not only can play band instruments, but who are willing to join the city band, and are working now to have the band organised. It is considered by many residents of Prince Rupert rather a reproach to the city that the band music at public open air gatherings on Dominion holidays should have to be supplied by Indians when the more educated white residents might so easily have a band of their own. The excellence of the Indian bands available is only the more pointedly a hint to Prince Rupert's white population to have a city band and not let the Indians show them the way. Many local business men have promised financial support if the band is not going this winter, and the fund for the supply of instruments if once started will rapidly grow. The idea is to have the city furnish a substantial nucleus subscription, when the business men will help out, and the bands men you may be certain will play up. Meanwhile all interested especially those who can play band instruments might kindly communicate with William Godson at the Provincial Government Building.

### Mr. A. W. McLean Demonstrates That Giant Tubers Can be Produced There.

Just to satisfy himself whether or no good potatoes could be grown on Digby Island, Mr. A. W. McLean who is assisting Engineer Jennings in the supervision of the Marine Depot, in his spare time this summer planted a few potatoes outside his shack. In due course the plants appeared. They grew to the ordinary size of potato plants, but refused to stop there. Like the beanstalk in the fable they kept on growing. Not until they were as high as a man's head did those plants quit growing. The fear was freely expressed that the plants had run all to top, and that no tubers would be found at the roots.

Yesterday, Mr. McLean dug up his plants. What he saw so surprised him that in order to save himself from the charge of exaggeration he sent some of the potatoes to the News office as proof. The potatoes were big enough to match the plants. Scarcely one was less than six inches long, and some of them touched close to eight inches. Fine, full bodied, thin skinned and dry,

### DECLARED GREATEST COAL FIELD IN AMERICA

The Coal is Hard, Smokeless Carbon, Showing 84 Per Cent. Burning Quality—Rivals the Quality of Welsh and Pennsylvania Coals—Five Railroads Will be Used to Develop the District—Stewart is the Nearest Port of Shipment, But Prince Rupert Will Benefit by Shipments Via Hazelton—Company Will Build Bunker Ports on Coast

Round about the headwaters of the Skeena, the Naas, the Stikine, and the Klappan rivers is situated a coal field seventy miles long by thirty miles wide, containing wide deep, rich seams of fine anthracite non-coking and smokeless coal the coal most suitable of all for naval purposes, for the mercantile, marine and for domestic use in cities. The seams of this huge coal field are unbroken by volcanic rock, laid in the most perfect geological formation for cheap mining known to mining engineers as "Synclines" which give frequent out-croppings and make the seams easy of access for working without need for deep shaft-sinking. The analysis of the coal is between 84 and 85 per cent fixed carbon giving from 6 to 8 per cent of ash.

**Second to None in America**  
The magnificent coal field is known by its discoverer R. Campbell Johnstone, the best known mining engineer in Northern British Columbia to be second to none ever yet discovered on the American continent and in fact, the only coal field in the world equal to the Pennsylvania coal fields and the British Welsh coal country from which the coal supplies of the navies of the world are today supplied.

From its position the new coal field can command and control the whole coal market of the Pacific Ocean including the markets of the Orient where the Hankow and Japanese coal is soft and smoky unsuitable for naval use. **Will Build a Railway**  
Means of communication with the coal fields are at present lacking, but the Mackenzie & Mann short line for Stewart to the interior is one of the quickest means of development at present under construction. Stewart and the Portland Canal form the nearest means of easy access, but five railways are completing charter arrangements into that district—one of them being R. Campbell Johnstone's own concern. He himself went into the district from Hazelton to the Ground Hog Mountain, two hundred miles beyond, with a big pack train. His wife and son accompanied him on one of the most extensive, interesting, and arduous journeys ever

completed this summer in a land where such big journeys are not unusual.  
**How Coal Was Hardened**  
The geological reason for the splendid quality of the coal is that hundreds of thousands of years ago, after the coal forming era, the soft coal measures became carbonised by the terrific heat of superheated steam generated during the tertiary period.

**To Build Coast Bunkers**  
The tremendous value and possibilities of the discovery may be estimated by the far-reaching plan under contemplation to have bunkers erected along the entire Pacific Coast list of ports for the supply of shipping both naval and mercantile.  
**Will Build up the North**  
Mr. Campbell Johnstone confidently believes that owing to the splendid quality of the anthracite, its ease of access by mining, and the fact that the seams are unbroken by volcanic rock these coal beds will completely out do those of Alaska which are badly impaired by volcanic rock. Development of the new great coal mining district is now striding towards the stage of commercial activity as fast as railway construction can go.

### LOCAL LONGSHOREMEN DECLARE A STRIKE

Notice of Reduction of Wage Scale from Fifty to Forty Cents an Hour Precipitates a Conflict—May be Trouble When the Prince Rupert Arrives Today

As a result of the action of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and Pacific Coast Stevedoring Company's posting a notice reducing the wages paid longshoremen on the wharf here from 50 cent per hour to 40 cents, the men are said to have struck.  
W. Dinny, secretary of the Longshoremen's Union here, a branch of the I. L. A., positively refused this morning to make any definite statement to the News of the men's attitude or demands, not even admitting that there is any strike. "All I can say is that the notice posted at the wharf covers

the situation," he said. The notice simply announces that after the first of November the wages paid longshoremen by the G. T. P. and Pacific Coast Stevedoring Company will be 40 cents per hour.  
From Mr. A. E. McMaster confirmation was obtained of a wharfside rumor that the longshoremen are demanding 50 cents per hour for general freight handling, 60 cents an hour for handling coal either by day or by night, and 75 cents per hour for overtime and Sunday work. W. Dinny did not contradict, or affirm this.

"Forty cents an hour," said Mr. McMaster, "was formerly paid here. The men struck for, and obtained fifty cents. Now it becomes impossible for the G. T. P. to pay this rate and do a reasonably profitable business, and the company is in a position to go back to the old rate. The trouble has, of course, a bearing on the wage rates in the city, and is important according as it is looked at in that light, but no serious difficulty is anticipated over it."  
Some idea existed on the waterfront this morning that there might be a disturbance on the arrival of the Prince Rupert at four p.m. this afternoon.

### TO ABOLISH STRIKE METHOD

British Strike Commission of Investigation Reports Propounding a New Industrial Plan.

London, Eng., Oct. 31.—(Special)—The report of the commissioners who recently enquired into the working of the Railway Conciliation Board has been issued. The Commission recommends the adoption of a new scheme to be operative until November 6, 1914, by which all questions affecting hours, wages and condition of service are not to be settled by negotiation but to be referred to the Conciliation Board.  
The Commissioners think that with their great responsibilities the companies cannot and should not be expected to permit any intervention between them and the men on the subject of discipline and management.

### MONTREAL CHURCH BURNED

Church of St. Irene is Total Loss—Building was Valued at \$90,000

Montreal, Nov. 1.—The Church of St. Irene, a Roman Catholic church, was totally destroyed by fire this afternoon. The loss is \$90,000.

### TURKS HOPE TO RECAPTURE TRIPOLI

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
Trieste, Nov. 1.—Italy has seized and occupied the Turkish islands of Rhodes and Lesbos according to Milan despatches. This is part of a naval demonstration threatened against Turkey in retaliation for Turkey's recent Tripoli successes.  
The action is viewed with alarm in Trieste, as it is known to be offensive to Austria, and may be followed by a demand for explanations by the Austrian government.  
Washington, D. C.—Officials of the Turkish Embassy look for the re-capture of Tripoli in the light of the advices received from Constantinople. The Turks have taken more forts and been shelling the town. The Italian losses are said to be enormous while that of the Turks is light by comparison.

### BLAMED FR. VAUGHAN FOR LIBERAL DEFEAT

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
Montreal, Nov. 1.—Hon. Rudolphe Lemieux speaking before the St. Louis Liberal Club last night, said it was prejudice not reason that won the day for the Conservatives and gave them an overwhelming majority in Ontario. The presence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the Eucharistic Congress, he said, had done much to cause religious antagonism, but he attributed the Ontario vote in a large measure to the indiscreet, unwise, and impudent sermons of Father Vaughan, whose arraignment of protestantism as a soulless religion had been peculiarly ill-timed.

### THE RICHEST BABY

But a Few Days Old and She is Worth \$30,000,000

New York Nov. 1.—The richest infant in the world is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Drexel, Jr., born at the end of October at 1015 Fifth avenue. With her inheritances from the Gould and Drexel estates, it is estimated she will have at least \$30,000,000. This is the first grandchild born to the George J. Goulds.

### CREOSOTED TIES FOR THE C. N. R.

G. T. P. is Not Likely to Require Them for Several Years Yet Says Gen. Supt. Mehan, but C. N. R. Erects Plant to Make Them.  
While General Superintendent Mehan does not believe that creosoted ties will be needed on the G. T. P. for some years yet, a creosoting plant for the treating of ties for the Canadian Northern Railway is being established at Fort Francis by a Scottish firm. It is the intention of the company to have all their ties creosoted in future in order to prolong their life. It is also probable that experiments will be made with creosoted poplar ties owing to the growing scarcity and consequently increased cost of harder wood now used.  
Sir William Mackenzie has been considering the adoption of poplar sleepers had as had tests with creosote treatment under observation.  
Railway men have been growing quite concerned about this matter of tie supply. Year by year ties are becoming more costly and something will have to be done before the price becomes prohibitive. A great fortune awaits the man who will find a substitute combining cheapness and durability for the present wooden ties the supply of which will not last many more years at the present rate of consumption.

### UNPROFITABLE WAR

Recent curtailment of the cut at Washington Mills has resulted in lessening the market supply by 334,000,000 feet.

Cucumber Relish

Two quarts of chopped cucumbers, two quarts of chopped white onions. Put in a colander and sprinkle with a quarter of a cup of salt. Let it stand one hour. Wash and drain. Stir a tablespoonful of mustard and one-half tablespoonful of tumeric into a cup of sugar; add to it one quart of vinegar and bring it to a boil. Put in the cucumbers and onions and boil up once.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

If table silver is placed in hot soapsuds immediately after being used, and dried with a soft, clean cloth, much of the work of polishing will be saved.

To make a tough steak tender rub it on both sides with vinegar and olive oil, thoroughly mixed, and allow it to stand for two hours before cooking.

CONVENIENT CAKE

Idea of It is to Satisfy All Tastes at Once

A good way to satisfy the members of a family who do not care for the same kind of cake is this: Make a batch of cake batter which will make six layers. From this put in two layer tins the plain white dough, then what is left divide and put half in another dish. To one part can be added lemon, orange, or spices to flavor. To another can be added some bitter chocolate melted in hot water, making a nice chocolate cake, or one can add either currants which have been washed, dried and put in flour or a half cupful of coconut, thereby giving enough varieties of cake to last a week through, besides
