NINE PERSONS DEAD AS TOWNS ON OREGON COAST ARE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Bandon and Prosper Wiped Out and Other Communities Menaced—Several Persons Missing—Northern California Also Ablaze

BANDON, Ore., Sept. 28.—Nine persons were known dead and several were missing last night after this thriving little town of five thousand people at the mouth of the Coquille River had been virtually wiped out by uncontrollable forest fires. The village of Prosper, some three miles up the river, had also been practically destroyed and the people of Coquille, further up and across the river, were preparing to evacuate. Up the coast the Mayor of North Bend on Coos Bay near Marshfield was asking for aid as the forest fire situation there became menacing. Never before has Coos County faced a more serious situation.

Northern California Too
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—Serious and extensive forest fires were sweeping over thousands of acres of valuable timber lands in various parts of Northern California at the week-end, threatening entire communities in some cases. Along the coast some valuable stands of redwood were ablaze. Ten miles of coastline was a wall of fire north of Trinidad which town itself was in danger. Across the top of the state two towns near the Nevada border were being menaced by approaching flame.

WILL NOT LOCK-OUT

Employers on Seattle Waterfront Will Not Take Initiative Against Unions

SEATTLE, Sept. 28.—The Seattle Waterfront Employer's Association, in a statement at the week-end, declared there would be no lock-out of union marine workers following expiry of the agreement with the union on September 30. Delegate Anthony C. Dimond of Alaska has asked the federal government, in the event of a marine tie-up here, to ensure a service for Alaska by taking over ships and operating them if necessary.

McGreedy on Scene
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—To make a final effort, by a series of conferences, to bring about a settlement of the dispute between the shipowners and marine workers' union which will reach a crisis this week with the expiry of the present working agreement, Edward F. McGreedy, assistant secretary of labor, reached the coast on Saturday. The first of the conferences was held yesterday.

FOREIGNERS ARE BANNED

Belgian Government Not Permitting them to Take Part in Political Demonstrations

BRUSSELS, Sept. 28.—The Belgian government issued a decree yesterday whereby none but bona-fide Belgian citizens will be permitted to take part in political demonstrations in Belgium.

HER BODY IS FOUND

Mystery in Connection With Death Of Victoria Woman and Disappearance of Husband

VICTORIA, Sept. 28. (CP)—The body of Mrs. Doris Gravin, who had been missing since last Tuesday, was found Sunday in a shallow depression on a beach near Oak Bay covered with logs. The police, who said they believed death to have been due to strangulation, are continuing an intensive search for the husband, Vic Gravin, former Victoria sports editor, who has also been missing since Tuesday. He had been recuperating from a lengthy illness.

CHURCH OBJECTED

LEWIS, Hebrides, Sept. 28. (CP)—Fearing children may fall to the temptation of "cinema-going, so hurtful to the youth of today," the Free Church presbytery has protested against school children being taken to see "educational" films.

BIG DRIVE CONTINUES

Spanish Rebels Last Night Captured Toledo—Bilboa Under Heavy Siege

TOLEDO, Sept. 28.—After heavy and bitter fighting during which 300 loyalist soldiers were slain and the streets ran red, Toledo fell to the Fascists at 9:25 last night. The fall of the city was at first denied by the government but later admitted.

WITH THE FASCIST ARMY NEAR TOLEDO, Sept. 28. (CP)—Advancing rebels, driving their outposts to within a few miles of Toledo at the week-end in preparation for a decisive advance, seized an important bridge head on the Guardaramma River.

At Bilboa ten insurgent planes rained bombs into the city as anarchists continued to kill insurgent sympathizers held as hostages. The bombing killed hundreds. Shrieking mobs killed sixty hostages. Many parts of the seaport were set afire.

President Manuel Azana had asked for refuge in the Argentine embassy or on an Argentine warship off the southeast coast it was said. His request being forwarded by the embassy to Buenos Aires.

Supplying Munitions
WASHINGTON D.C., Sept. 28.—Federal authorities are investigating reports that American munitions makers have been shipping arms to Spain via another country.

Report Denied
MADRID, Sept. 28.—The report, attributed to Fascist propaganda that President Azana had asked Argentina for refuge, was declared here, following a conference last night between the President and the Premier, to be absurd. With five government warships speeding to the north coast in the Bay of Biscay to relieve beleaguered ports there, it was thought the first major naval engagement of the civil war might be impending.

FATHER COUGHLIN IS NO COMMUNIST
CINCINNATI, Sept. 28.—Father Charles Coughlin, Detroit's radio priest, declared here yesterday that he would not hesitate if necessary, to take up arms in defence of American liberty against communism. This was not to be taken to mean, however, that he was not as keen as ever for a new social order.

Big Air Race Is On Tuesday

Fifteen Planes to Take Off From London Tomorrow For Johannesburg

LONDON, Sept. 28.—The great London to Johannesburg air race commences tomorrow morning with fifteen planes taking to the air for the sprint.

Donor of \$50,000 for the London-to-Johannesburg air "derby" to celebrate the opening of the British Empire Exhibition at Johannesburg, Isadore W. Schlessinger, is a millionaire and head of numerous companies.

He is reputed the biggest sheep farmer and fruit grower in South Africa. He was responsible for the development of the broadcasting service in the Union of South Africa.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 28.—Trial of John Harmsworth, former United States naval officer, on charges of selling American naval secrets to the Japanese will take place this week. If found guilty, he is subject to a term of up to 20 years' imprisonment. Such an offence during war would be punishable by death.

FRANC DEVALUATION PLAN APPROVED; DEPUTIES BACK UP NEW MONETARY POLICY

Effect is Widespread and is Expected to be Forerunner Of Permanent World Prosperity—Switzerland, Holland, Latvia and Greece Go Off Gold Standard

LONDON, Sept. 28. (CP)—Five nations have joined in the break-up of the gold bloc and the march toward currency adjustment led off by France under protection of a "monetary equilibrium" agreement with Great Britain and the United States. It is generally felt here that the international monetary moves since the week-end will lead to a stabilization of currency such as is held to be essential to permanent world recovery.

While the Socialist government of Premier Leon Blum in France won a majority in the first Parliament test of the devaluation program, Switzerland, the Netherlands, Latvia and Greece announced currency stabilization programs. Sixth Japanese Meets Violent Death In China

PEIPING, Sept. 28.—The sixth violent death of a Japanese in China within a month occurred here at the week-end but was considered accidental and not an international incident.

The Blum government presented to Parliament sixteen bills embodying its new devaluation of the franc program from gold content of 65.5 milligrams to 43.49 milligrams. Pending readjustment, the Bourse will remain closed until Tuesday and possibly later.

It was reported early today that Italy had decided to devalue. The effect of the French devaluation upon Germany and Russia will also be followed with interest.

The Russian State Bank at Moscow denied accusations that its sales of British pounds were intended as an effort to force down the British currency rate. The sales were "ordinary banking transactions," the Bank declared.

TAKES UP NEW WORK

Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth Given Leave of Absence By Presbyterian Church

Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, advised his congregation yesterday that he had accepted appointment as missionary organizer of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for British Columbia. Expressing regret at his departure, a congregational meeting granted Mr. Hollingworth a year's leave of absence from the pulpit here.

Mr. Hollingworth will be leaving here for Vancouver about the end of October to assume his new duties as from November 1. He will travel extensively through the province including the central interior.

At a meeting of the Presbytery of Westminster on October 12 arrangements will be made for a substitute for Mr. Hollingworth. Mr. Hollingworth will go south next week to attend the Presbytery meeting as well as sessions of the provincial synod.

IS THIS REVOLUTION?

At a demonstration at the King's Cross centre, London, a ton of maize a day is being produced in a large galvanized-iron cabinet, says the Victoria Times editorially. Inside the cabinet are rows of trays, each tray holding maize at a different stage of growth. In ten days the maize is fully grown and ready for consumption. No soil is used. On top of the cabinet is a tank of water containing solutions of the chemicals essential to plant life and growth, and from this tank the plants are fed. By the tenth day the tray with the maize fully grown is ready to be removed from the cabinet and placed in a trough for the animals to eat. There is no waste and no dirt.

Twenty centres for the development of this agrobiological farming are to be opened in England, with the Ministry of Agriculture taking an interest in the experiments. It has already been proved that vegetables by this means grow just as well as fodder. In fact, in California "garden" produce from some of the laboratories under Dr. Gericke has been coming on the market this season. Several San Francisco florists who have been working under Dr. Gericke are now actually selling flowers thus produced rapidly and at lower cost. Wheat is also being grown, with an area the size of a barn yielding the equal of a crop from a full section farm—and without being subject to any weather uncertainties.

Basically, agriculture has changed little since man settled down to community life and began to till the soil. As a farmer, through the ages, he has had to carry on subject to the weather, the seasons, the natural seed time and harvest time. But now these limits are being removed, with knowledge and new methods making possible production at will of enormously increased food supplies and at lower costs.

An agricultural revolution which will parallel in its economic and social effects the industrial revolution that came upon the western world with the advent of steam power, seems impending.

As to how it will bear on domestic and foreign trade, employment, price of lands, ways of life for millions and on international politics through making food self-sufficiency possible to nations in war—we leave the reader to draw his own conclusions.

Synopsis of Land Act

PRE-EMPTIONS
VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning Pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or any Government Agent. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre west of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land-Commissioner of the Land-Boarding-Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

Pre-emption carrying part time conditions of occupation are also granted.

PURCHASE OR LEASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes. Minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land, \$2.50 per acre.

As a partial relief measure, reverted lands may be secured by purchase in ten equal instalments, with the first payment suspended for two years, provided taxes are paid within due and improvements are made during the first two years of not less than 10% of the appraised value.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year. Title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under grazing regulations amended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain monthly rates per head of stock. Priority in grazing privileges is given to resident stock owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partially free permits available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to two head.

WOMEN FOR MINISTRY

United Church General Council Hears Result of Presbytery Voting on Question

OTTAWA, Sept. 28: (CP)—Reports of a commission on theological colleges and of a remit on the ordination of women were received at the week-end by General Council of the United Church of Canada which passed a resolution favoring ordination of women in principle.

Opening of the ministry to women on terms of equality with men has been agitated for years. Two years ago the General Council adopted the principle and remitted the question to all the presbyteries of the United Church for co-ordinate decision on enabling legislation.

Since the last General Council the voting had taken place in the presbyteries on the following remit: "that the ministry shall be open to both men and women." It was disclosed in report that 80 presbyteries voted in favor of this legislation and 26 presbyteries were opposed. No result was available from eight presbyteries.

Theological education in the church was the subject of a thorough-going report by a commission of which Rev. Dr. R. P. Bowles is chairman. One report stated that reduction in the number of colleges and questions of curriculum and standards of examination have caused "much discussion and considerable dissatisfaction." The commission recommended a temporary policy of mergers, with St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon, to serve as the one centre of theological education on the prairies.

College Mergers

Queen's Theological College, Kingston, is to seek co-operation with Emmanuel College, Toronto, according to this report. It is recommended that a council on theological education be formed to have oversight of curricula, scholarships, postgraduate work and the qualifications of professors. In order that greater care be taken in the admission of young men as candidates for the ministry, the using of a questionnaire for applicants was urged. A uniform age of retirement for professors was recommended.

The commission on secondary schools recommended that a small expert committee be formed in accordance with the Massey Foundation Committee report to have oversight of these institutions. The commission urged that these schools be declared financially independent of the church.

Sealed tenders are being called by the federal department of public works for alterations and additions to Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve building for which an appropriation was made at the last session of Parliament. The tenders will close October 13. It has been estimated that the cost of the work will be about \$7000.

The snagboat Esington, Capt. J. D. Watson, having completed her season's work, arrived in port Friday and was tied up at the ocean dock over the week-end until today when she moved over to Digby Island to be hauled out of the water on her ways for the winter.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 8:30 last evening from the south and sailed a couple of hours later for Stewart, Anxox and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow afternoon south-bound.

The etchikan motorships Zapora and Kingsmill were both in port this morning with fish for trans-shipment East. The Zapora had two carloads of frozen fish and the Kingsmill a carload of tierced mild cured salmon.
