KING GEORGE IS GRADUALLY DYING

Condition of His Majesty Is Conceded to be Critical And Council of State in Charge

Official Bulletin Today is Most Serious Since Friday—Disquieting Reports Followed Rather Hopeful Outlook Sunday and Early Today

SANDRINGHAM, Eng., Jan. 20: (CP)—The three physicians of King George, in an official bulletin tonight, said: "The King's life is moving peacefully toward its close."

LONDON, Jan. 20: (CP)—An official bulletin issued at 5:30 this evening from Sandringham Palace stated that the strength of King George, who is seriously ill with bronchial catarrh and cardiac weakness, was "diminishing." The bulletin, signed by three physicians, said: "The condition of the King shows diminishing strength."

The statement, revealing the King was in a critical condition, is considered the most serious to be issued since Friday.

Probe Not Opportune

GENEVA, Jan. 20: (CP)—The League of Nations committee of thirteen today decided that the questions of sending a commission of inquiry to Ethiopia to look into the Italo-Ethiopian war and financial assistance for Ethiopia were not opportune and furthermore were outside the competency of the committee.

Doug Frizzell arrived in town at the end of the week from Kwinitsa where, with Stewart Donaldson of Port Essington, he has the contract to salvage for the Canadian National Railways some 150,000 feet of fir bridge timber which was washed away from Kwinitsa last fall by floods.

Surgeons Remove Whetstone From Abdomen of Man

GUELPH, Ont., Jan. 20:—George Berberich, aged 45, of New Germany, had a ten-inch whetstone removed from his abdomen and is reported to be in a critical condition.

EPIDEMIC OF FLU IN CENTRAL CANADA

WINNIPEG, Jan. 20: (CP)—An epidemic of influenza is sweeping Manitoba and North-western Ontario. It has already taken at least twelve lives and thousands of persons are ill with the disease.

Paul Kozoolin Coming From Vancouver This Week To Assume Post of Chief Instructor—Will Have Comprehensive Curricula

A provincial recreation centre is to be established in Prince Rupert immediately, it is announced, and Paul Kozoolin B.A., a graduate of the University of British Columbia, will arrive here on Wednesday morning aboard the steamer Prince George from Vancouver to take charge of the local scheme in the capacity of chief instructor. The classes, organized by the Department of Education, Recreation and Physical Education Branch, are for men and women and will be free to the public.

AVIATORS INTERNED

Britain Regards Landing of Italians In Sudan as Overt Act

ROME, Jan. 20: (CP)—The Italian government is officially advised by the British foreign office of the internment at Port Sudan of four Italian airmen who made a landing near there with a tri-motored military plane sixty miles within the British frontier.

SINCERITY IS QUESTIONED

Senator Nye Says Commercial Interest Was Uppermost In Wilson's Mind In Entering Great War

WASHINGTON D. C., Jan. 20:—Commercial interests and not the much-vaunted love of freedom and democracy caused the United States to enter the World War, declared Senator Gerald Nye of the North Dakota, chairman of the special Senate committee investigating the causes of United States entry into the war, at a session of the committee. He asserted flatly that the commercial interest was uppermost in the mind of President Woodrow Wilson in deciding to enter the war.

REFUNDING OF TAXES

U. S. Government Ordered To Repay Processing Fees Under Triple A

CHICAGO, Jan. 20:—Federal Judge John P. Barnes has ordered the United States to pay Chicago packers the sum of \$55,000,000 in processing taxes under the invalidated Agricultural Adjustment Act.

LONDON, Jan. 20: (CP)—Rudyard Kipling, eminent British poet, whose death occurred at the end of the week, will be buried on Thursday in Poet's Corner of Westminster Abbey, Very Rev. William Foxley Norris, Dean of Westminster, announces.

RUDYARD KIPLING

At one time it was thought that Rudyard Kipling might have been appointed Poet Laureate of Great Britain. His verses have become more popular than those of most poets. Take as an example "Lest We Forget." But Kipling was not a poet all the time. Also he lived for many years outside the Empire. He was a very hard worker and his writings often startled England and amused America. In later years everything he wrote was cabled to this continent. As an American publisher remarked "It travelled first class." He is said to have commanded the highest price per word for his later writings ever paid to any author.

REARMING AND PROSPERITY

Britain is providing work and wages for her people by the simple process of rearming. She is building ships, airplanes and other war necessities and in doing so is increasing the prosperity of the Islands, already well on the road toward recovery.

Canada is not indulging in the luxury of preparing for defence and is not expending national funds to any large extent on public works, so her recovery is slower.

We are not urging the spending of money on armaments but simply stating that in the country so often quoted as prosperous, the state does provide work and wages for the people without calling it by that name.

OPTIMISTIC BANKER

Morris W. Wilson, president and managing director of the Royal Bank of Canada, according to a report of his address at the annual meeting published in this paper Saturday while admitting that serious problems still confront the people of Canada concluded with these encouraging words:

"The upward trend in business would now seem to be definitely established. In fact I believe we may look forward to the coming year with a greater optimism than has been possible at any time in the past six years."

We take it that if there is a general upward trend, Prince Rupert will share in that prosperity.

Collision, stationed at Prince Rupert, requesting what ever little help they can afford.

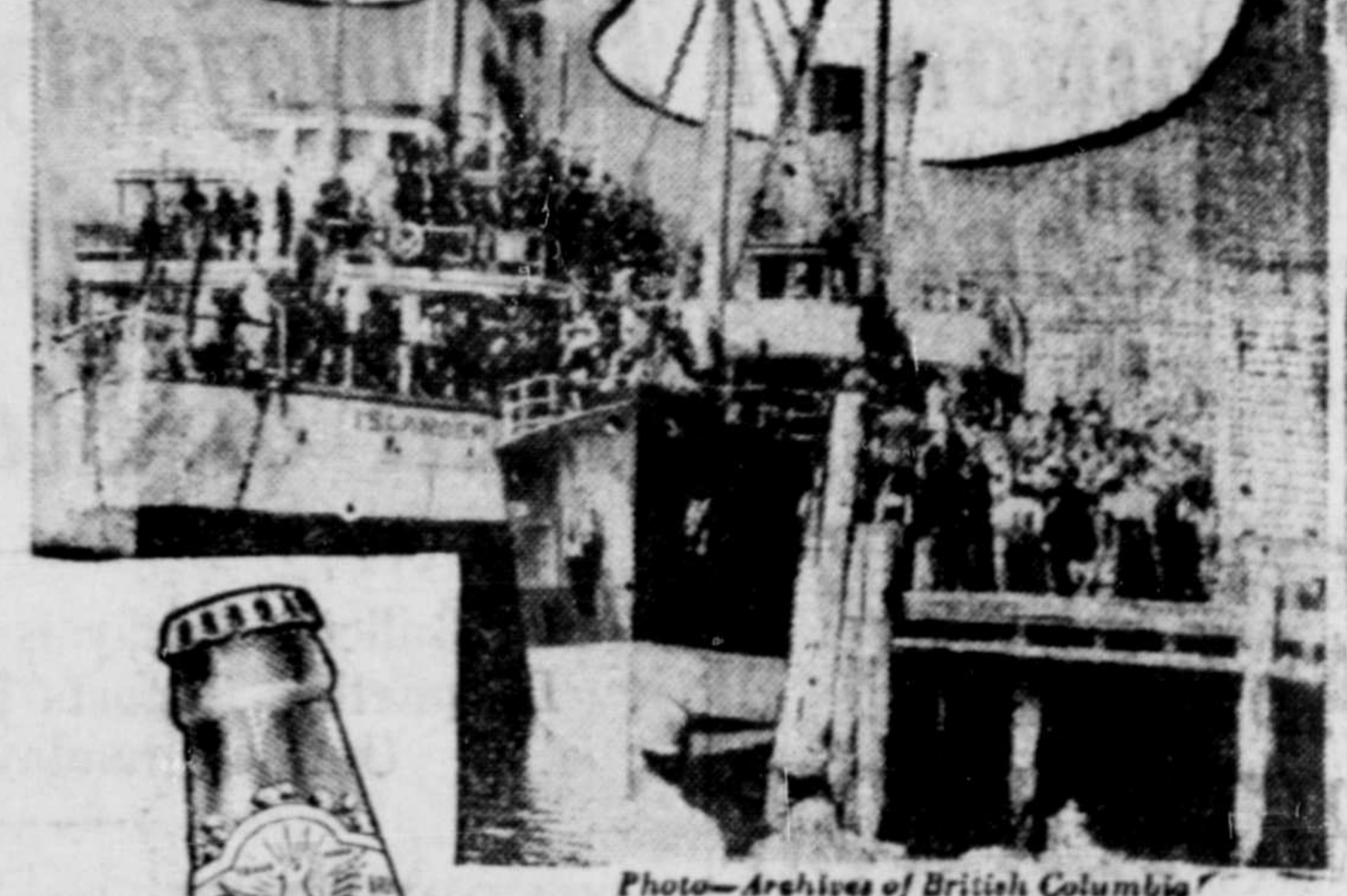

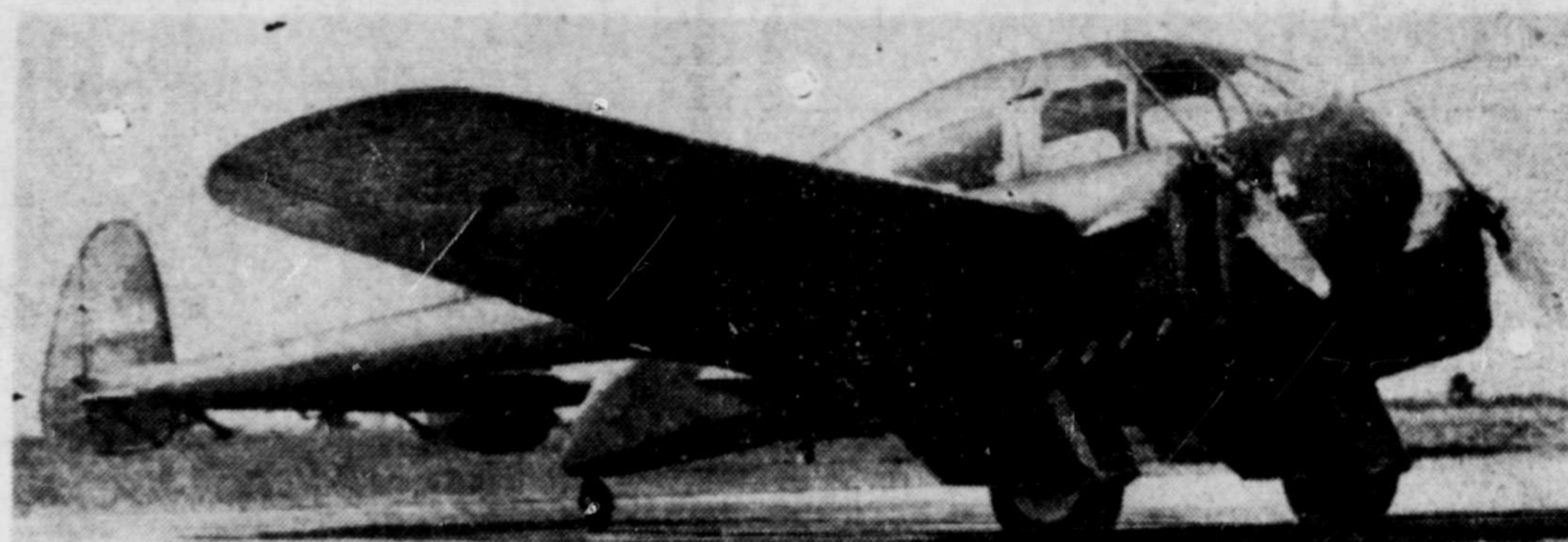

PASSING OF MRS. LOVE

Well Known Pioneer Woman Passes Away at Advanced Age

Member of a prominent United Empire Loyalist family of the Maritimes which traces its history in this country as far back as 1765 and an esteemed resident of Prince Rupert since 1911. Mrs. Charlotte A. (Callbeck) Love passed away at 3 o'clock Sunday morning at her home on Fourth Avenue East after a brief illness. The late Mrs. Love, who was in her eighty-second year, had been in good health, considering her advanced age, and only recently had returned from a five weeks' trip to California. Early Saturday afternoon she was taken suddenly ill and her condition became swiftly worse until she expired.

The late Mrs. Love was born in Charlottetown, P.E.I. She was the daughter of the late Hon. Henry J. Callbeck who was a member of a Liberal government of Prince Edward Island prior to Confederation and who was associated with the late John Stanfield in the founding of the famous woolen business. Others of Mrs. Love's ancestors had figured prominently in the early history of the Maritimes and New England prior to the Declaration of Independence.

Mrs. Love was predeceased in 1929 by her husband, the late A. H. Love. Since then she had made her home with her sons, Harry and Ray. She is survived by four sons, H. R. Love, A. B. Love and W. R. Love of Prince Rupert and Ernest Love of Stewart. There is one sister, Mrs. H. H. Schaffer of Shediac, N.B. The bereaved will have the deep sympathy of their numerous friends.

The remains are resting at the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers and the funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon.
