GERMANY'S EQUALITY IS CONCEDED

EXPLAINS JUDGMENT

Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald Gives Reasons for Decision in Prudhomme Appeal

Following is the text of the reasons for judgment given by Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald in the appeal of Alexander J. Prudhomme vs City of Prince Rupert in Supreme Court here last week:

"Having heard read the important portions of the judgment of Gregory J. delivered in 1927 in the appeal of Canadian National Railways, no good purpose can be served by repeating what was there said. I can only say that I entirely concur in what the learned Judge said, in so far at least as his remarks are referable to the facts before me in the present case.

"I have given the best attention of which I am capable to the evidence as it was delivered, and I have re-read my notes in an effort to reach a conclusion upon that evidence. Keeping before me what has been said in previous cases and particularly the opinions of the learned Judges of the Court of Appeal in Bishop of Victoria vs City of Victoria (1933)-3 W.W.R. I fix the actual value of each of the lots in question at \$750. The appellant will have his costs, which are fixed at \$50 and disbursements."

Carl Laemmle Has Sold Out

Warner Bros. Acquire Universal Pictures Corporation

HOLLYWOOD, March 16.—Carl Laemmle, veteran film producer, who has been having financial difficulties for some time, sold out control of Universal Pictures Corporation Saturday to Warner Bros. Laemmle, who started life in United States as an immigrant boy from Germany, became interested in pictures in 1906 when he acquired a small Chicago movie show. It was not many years before he entered the production end of the film business in which for many years he has been a prominent figure.

Sergei Lost His Life as Result of Being Thrown From Horse In Polo Game

PALM SPRINGS, Fla., March 16: (CP)—Prince Sergei Mdivani, aged 33, one of the widely known "marrying Mdivani brothers," was killed when thrown from his horse and trampled while playing polo yesterday. He was kicked in the head and was dead of hemorrhage ten minutes after being thrown. He was a brother of Prince Alexis Mdivani who was killed last year in an automobile accident in Spain.

Sergei's wife, the former Louise Astor van Allen, who was a former wife of Alexis, was present when the accident occurred.

Pola Negri, motion picture actress, and Mary McCormack, opera singer, were former wives of Sergei.

Maple Leafs And Black Hawks To Visit This Coast

TORONTO, March 16.—Connie Smythe, in an interview Saturday night, confirmed reports that negotiations had been practically completed for the Toronto Maple Leafs, of which he is managing director, and the Chicago Black Hawks to make a tour west as far as the Pacific Coast after the close of the National League Hockey season at the end of this month. Smythe expressed confidence as to the chances of the Maple Leafs to win the league play-offs and the Stanley Cup. His team, he suggested, was actually in better shape to enter the post-season play-offs this spring than it was last.

Complete Custody Now Being Sought

League Council, However, Refuses To Accept Conditions of Hitler For Discussing Peace Proposals

TRAGEDY ON FARM

Case of Double Murder And Suicide Near Lethbridge At End of Week

LETHBRIDGE, March 16: (CP)—The bodies of Alaire, aged 18, and Lauren, 16, daughters of C. R. Eliason, were found in the burning Eliason farm home near Turin, twenty-five miles north-east of here, late Saturday.

The remains of Louis Czaba, aged 36, Eliason's hired man, burned to a skeleton, were found in the smouldering ruins of the barn.

The police believe that it was a case of double murder and suicide. The girls are believed to have been slain while other members of the family were absent and Czaba suicided in the barn after firing both structures.

Neighbors discovered the fire and took the girls' bodies from the house.

Floods in New England Still On

At Least Ten Persons Have So Far Lost Lives

BOSTON, March 16.—Flood conditions are still general today in the New England States although slightly lower temperatures have caused the waters to recede at some points. At least ten persons have lost their lives and damage has been extensive.

Baltimore, Maryland, March 16.—The Pan American Airways big flying boat Hawaiian Clipper will be given test flights by her builders this week and will shortly leave for the Pacific Coast to join her sister ships, China and Philippine Clipper, for trans-Pacific service.

France and Other Nations Line Up Against Talking About New Treaty in Connection With Remilitarization of Rhineland—Week-End Developments In European Crisis

LONDON, March 16: (CP)—The League of Nations council, in secret session here today, agreed to Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler's demands for equality but flatly rejected his "conditions" that the council must discuss his peace proposals. Hitler had offered to send a representative to the council's deliberations on Germany's remilitarization of the Rhineland only on the basis of full equality in the conference and with the understanding that his recent offer of new peace pacts would be considered.

Six nations headed by France opposed Hitler's insistence on bringing his peace proposals up simultaneously with discussion of the Rhineland re-occupation. The other nations with France were Turkey, Spain, Russia, Poland and Roumania. The council then voted unanimously to accept Hitler's first condition and to reject the second. The vote was interpreted as tantamount to qualified refusal of Hitler's conditions.

It is understood that the council decided to draft still another invitation to Germany to attend the League of Nations.

Taking No Backwater

BERLIN, March 16.—A fiery speech made by Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler Saturday night before a wildly enthusiastic assemblage of three hundred thousand persons in Bavaria and transmitted throughout the country by radio intimated Germany's rejection of the invitation to attend a conference of League Council nations in London today to discuss the situation arising out of the military re-occupation of the Rhineland unless Germany was received as an equal. Hitler flatly declined to permit Germany to face the League council in the role of an accused nation when "right is unmistakably on our side." Nor would he allow Germany to be dictated to by any neutral nations. If France and Belgium continued to insist upon military withdrawal from the Rhineland there could be no peace negotiations and Germany's participation in any conference would be impossible.

Strive For Settlement

LONDON, March 16.—British statesmen are continuing their efforts to reach a basis in the European crisis which will obviate the necessity of imposing sanctions against Germany and a possible European war. Belgium is showing a more conciliatory attitude towards Germany.

NEW YORK, March 16.—Albert Einstein, celebrated German scientist, observed his fifty-seventh birthday Saturday.

ADMIRAL AT REST

Highest Honors Paid to Earl Beatty At Rites Today—Interred Alongside Jellicoe

LONDON, March 16: (CP)—The coffin draped with the same Union Jack which flew from the Lion, flagship of the battle cruiser squadron which Admiral David Beatty commanded at the Battle of Jutland during the Great War, the body of the famous British admiral was taken with due pomp today to rest beside that of Admiral Jellicoe, close to Nelson's tomb in St. Paul's Cathedral. The funeral followed lines such as were adopted at the burial of Earl Jellicoe last November. The Duke of York represented King Edward VIII at the funeral.

New York Stock Mart Moves Up

Steadied on Saturday With General Gains After War Scare

NEW YORK, March 16.—After a week's depression on account of the European war scare, the New York stock market showed a distinct steadying and upward trend Saturday when 1,430,000 shares changed hands during the short session. Closing averages were: Industrials, 154.07, up 3.65; rails, 47.13, up 1.17; utilities, 31.84, up 1.13.

In dedicating the gift, Lieut. Hilda Bridge prayed that God would bless the giver, and sanctify the gift to his honor and glory.

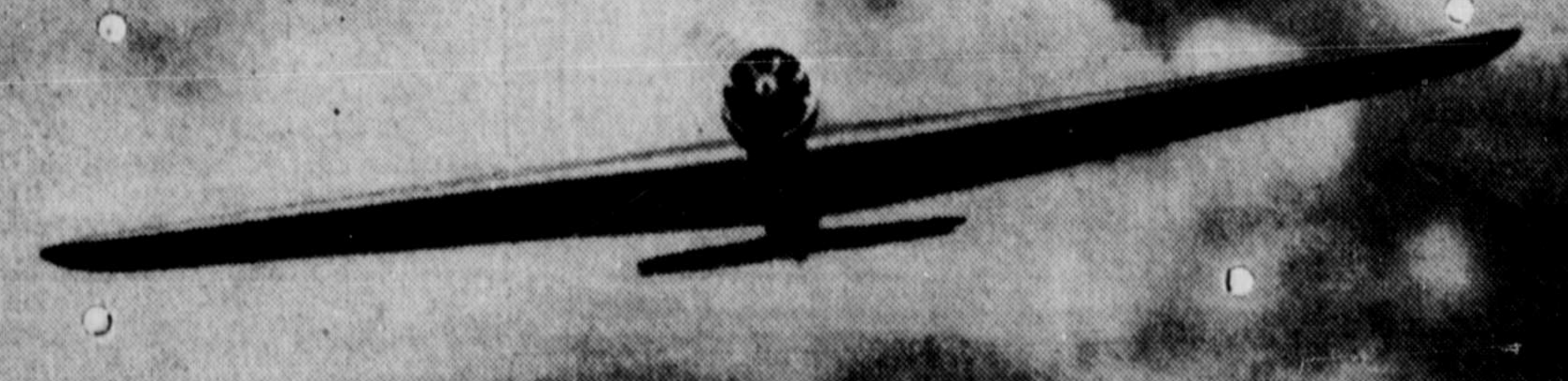
QUEEN CHARLOTTES MAY GET NEW SALMON CANNERY

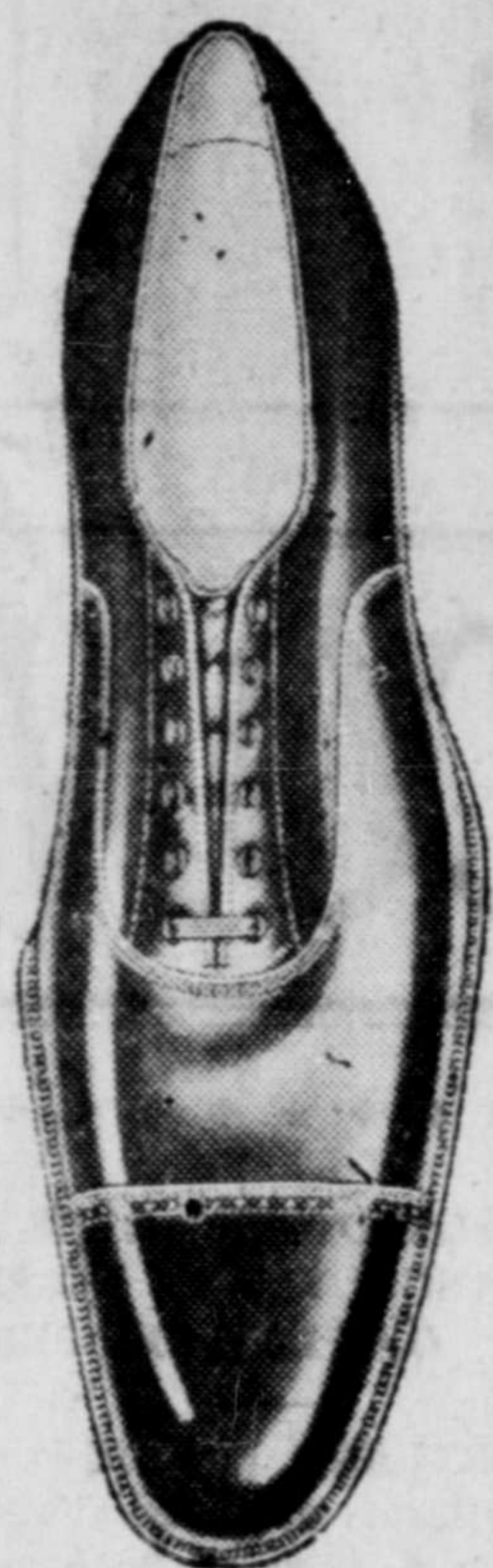

The Letter Box

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS

Editor, Daily News:

May I have some space in your paper to answer a few of the questions which I am being asked repeatedly by parents in the city on the subject of medical examinations of school children? There is, apparently, considerable misunderstanding regarding the reports which are sent home with the children and I would like to endeavor to clear this up.
First of all, in regard to the examination of the eyes. You can easily understand that there is neither the time nor equipment available to thoroughly examine the eyes of each child in the school. The test we use is reading a card of graduated letters at a specific distance. Those children who are able to read the letters prescribed as normal for that distance are marked as normal on their card. If the child has difficulty or is unable to read the letters with either eye a note is made to that effect and the parents are advised that the child needs attention for his eyes. This does not mean that the child requires glasses, although in most cases it does. Whether there is sufficient disturbance of eyesight to necessitate the use of glasses should be settled by some one specially equipped for and trained in that type of work. We only attempt to detect the variation from normal.
Again, in regard to tonsils, I would like to point out that the report to the parents that a child needs attention for tonsil trouble does not necessarily mean that the tonsils have to be removed. In the cursory examination which we are able to give in the school we make a note of any tonsils which appear to be diseased or abnormal in any way. Without the opportunity of talking to the parents we are unable to find out whether the child has been suffering from tonsillar trouble or not. Such things as frequent sore throats, frequent colds, rheumatic pains, snoring at night and other disturbances of health are factors which have to be taken into consideration when the problem of dealing with tonsils and adenoids is to be solved. Obviously, all these facts are not before us and the family physician is the one who should make the final decision regarding the child's tonsils.

The Garden

Beverly Nicholls, the British author, journalist and playwright, in his book "Down the Garden Path," suggested that he was particularly well qualified to write a book about gardening because he knew so little about the subject. That is why I write notes about gardening. I can see the things that interest the ordinary amateur without becoming technical. At any rate I hope I see them and I am told I do.

Those who have not read Beverly Nicholls' book should do so. It has been out about four years and deals with gardening in Huntingdonshire, England, where the climate is somewhat similar to that of Prince Rupert. One particular feature is a chapter on winter blooming plants that might very well be adapted to this coast.

I take a lot of pleasure from walking around the garden when it is clear of snow and watching for the perennials to show the first sign of growth after their long winter sleep. This year they have been dormant longer than usual and their coming is more interesting than usual. Most interest is in the flowers that may have been frost-killed. Most of the roses have a dead appearance just now but that does not mean anything. Very soon some of them will be sending up shoots and it will be a month or two before one can be sure that any are dead. Last year two of my roses looked dead and it was well on in May before they commenced to shoot but they eventually grew more wood than any other bush in the bed.

At the week-end I heard of an enthusiastic gardener who took his holidays just before the last snow with the intention of spending the time in the garden. It must have been a great disappointment to have the ground covered with snow for nearly a week.

I am told this is a good time to re-pot indoor plants, giving them some new earth and a slightly larger receptacle. I did some of mine at the week-end and put in a number of geranium cuttings. Most of these will be to give away as I shall not have room for any more geraniums as soon as the begonias are ready to pot. The begonias are just showing their first buds.

In my begonia box there was a little spare space so I put two or three dahlia roots in the corner. They started to shoot at once and are now about four inches above ground. When they get large enough I plan to take cuttings and have good strong plants ready for bedding in May—H. F. P.

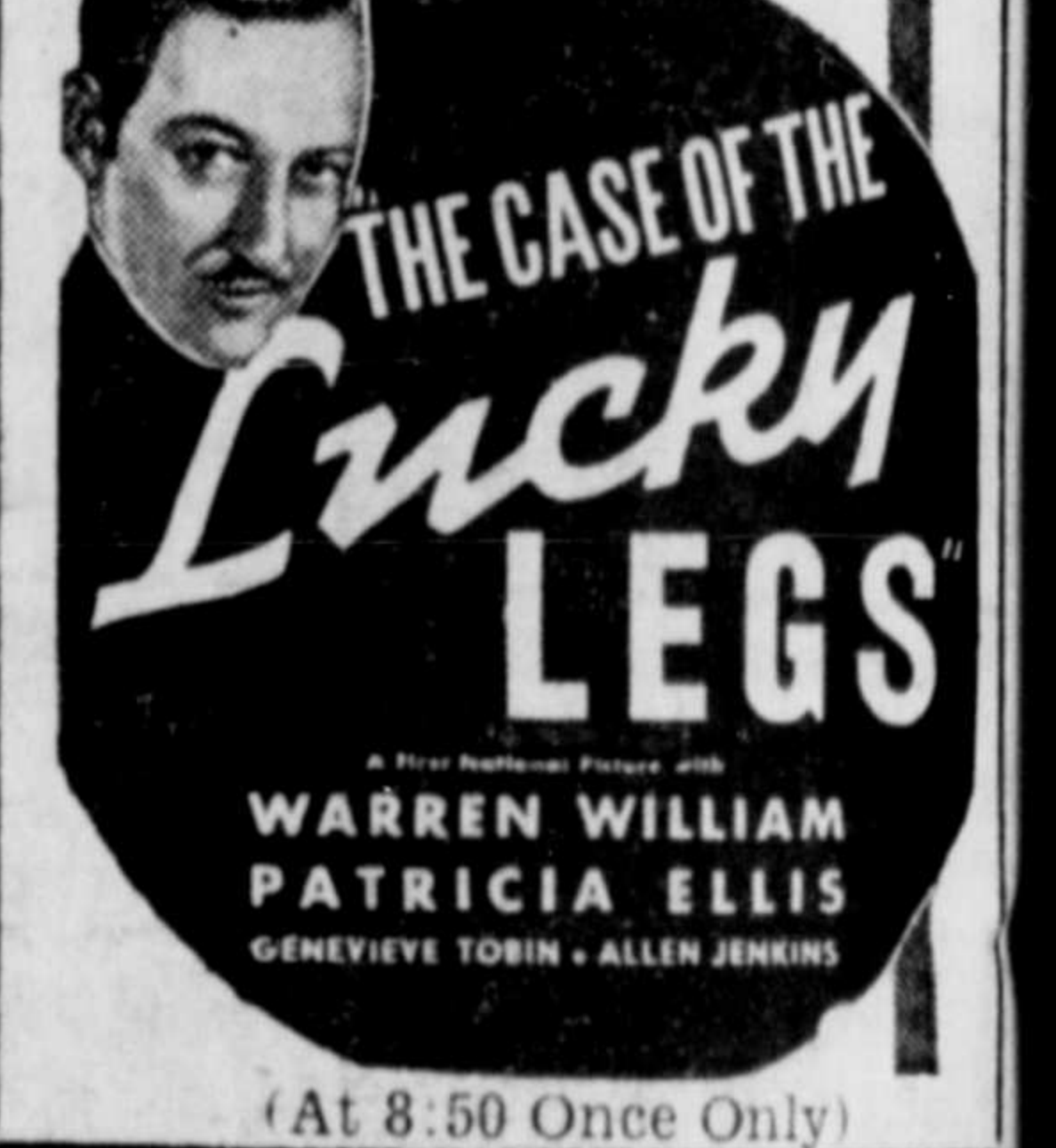
