133 DEAD IN STORM

Winter Tempest Takes Heavy Toll In Southern Europe, Particularly In Balkans

LONDON, Feb. 13:-A survey of the results of a severe storm which has swept over practically the whole of southern Europe during the past three days showed one hundred and thirty-three dead. The Balkans, Austria and Hungary seem to have been the most severly hit. Several persons were frozen to death. At least five ships are reported to have been wrecked with hundreds of smaller craft lost. As well as Europe, the icy storms

have also swept Asia Miner. With communications disrupted at many points, it is feared the death list may be even greater.

Available reports include 68 dead in Bulgaria, 25 in Macedonia, 12 in Thrace. In the Gulf of Salonika 10 were drowned and in the Adriatic Sea 18.

Brittain and France have a score or more dead.

OTTAWA, Feb. 13: (CP)-Parliamentary investigation into the regulations of the new Wheat Board relating to night sales will be held, it was announced in the House of Commons yesterday by Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce, after it was requested by Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Leader of the Conservative Opposition. he investigation will likely take

in more ground than night sales or REPRIEVE finally constituted.

Mr. Euler made a general defence of the government's dismissal of John I. McFarland and his two conferees from the government wheat sales agency and the initiation of a policy of selling rather than hoarding of wheat. Under the McFarland regime, Mr. Euler said, surplus wheat holdings mounted from 127,000,000 to 300,000,000 bushels. In the last nine and a half weeks of the McFarland board, sales totalled 12,500,000 bushels and in the first six weeks of the Murray board, 65,000,000 bushels.

TRENTON, N.J., Feb. 13:-The thirty-day reprieve granted by Governor Harold Hoffman of New Jersey to Bruno Richard Hauptmann, convicted kidnap-slayer of the Lindbergh baby, will expire on Saturday after which steps will be immediately taken to have Hauptmann re-sentenced by Justice Trenchard of Flemington.
