### SOVIET PROGRESS

Sir Frederick G. Banting K.B.E., co-discoverer of insulin, paid a visit to Russia recently and, as a result of what he sa wand heard there, he writes very enthusiastically about the progress being made in that country in an article in "Canadian Business," just published. He says that scientific research and the application of science to faulted). industry and agriculture is the most impressive activity in the Soviet Union. There is no country in the world that is progressing so rapidly in this regard.

He quotes an array of figures, supplied doubtless by Trojans Soviet officials, to show the remarkable progress made in many phases of activity. Speaking of education he says that in 1931 over nineteen million adult people learned to read and write. At present every child must attend school until 15 years of age. The difficulty of the task can be understood when it is stated that children are taught in 70 different national languages.

Showing the application of science to agriculture, Sir Frederick points out that there was a shortage of pure bred stock. In order to make up for that, artificial fertilization was carried out with cattle and sheep so that the increase of high bred stock was tremendous. 


