LEAGUE APPEALS AGAINST GAS USE

DIRIGIBLE IS EXPERIENCING DIFFICULTY

Plea is Being Sent Italy and Ethiopia To Eliminate Poison

Hindenburg Signals She is Having Grave Mechanical Troubles

Emergency Authorization Is Given to Fly Over France in Event of Forced Landing Having to Be Made on Homeward Trip.

BORDEAUX, France, April 9: (CP)—The new German dirigible Hindenburg, with Dr. Hugo Eckener in charge, signalled tonight that she was having grave engine difficulty over the Moroccan coast on her return flight from Brazil to Germany and asked emergency authorization to fly over France which was given. It was considered possible the great new ship might have to make a forced landing.

The Hindenburg was unreported last night for six hours and some anxiety was felt but she later reported that she was making her way north along the African coast homeward bound.

READY FOR BOAT RACE

BROWN IS PRESIDENT

Jack Preece Retires as Head of Legion—Reports on Convention Presented

The half-yearly meeting of the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Legion was held last evening in the club rooms with President Jack Preece in the chair.

Reports of the delegates to the Dominion convention and the provincial caucus were given by J. S. Wilson and, after the disposal of routine business, the election of officers for the ensuing six months was proceeded with. Resigning from the presidency after holding office for three and a half years Jack Preece referred to the work that had been done. The renovation of the building and the formation of a Women's Auxiliary had been outstanding accomplishments and the membership of the branch had increased considerably. This had been made possible through the co-operation of the executive and the members generally. He hoped that similar support would be accorded his successor. The thanks of the meeting were expressed with loud applause.

SILVER IS BEING SOLD

PARLIAMENT ADJOURNS

OTTAWA, April 9: (CP)—Parliament adjourned for a twelve-day Easter recess last night after Chief Justice Lyman Duff gave royal assent to accumulated legislation passed by both Houses including the bill providing for a national unemployment commission, the personnel of which, it is expected, will be named during the recess.

NEW SPANISH PRESIDENT

MADRID, April 9: (CP)—Diego Martinez Barrio, left Republican, assumed the presidency of Spain yesterday after Parliament had ousted President Niceto Aamora. In several quarters fresh outbreaks of political violence have occurred.

Norah Here Today With 83 Passengers

With a capacity list of passengers including many northerners returning for the season after spending the winter outside, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 8:15 this morning from Vancouver and sailed an hour later for Skagway and other Alaska points. The vessel is due here next Monday afternoon southbound. There were 83 passengers aboard the vessel. None disembarked here but nine went north aboard her from this port.

HONORS TO DECEASED

Cathedral Service For Late G. A. Woodland This Afternoon—Masonic Service Tonight

There was a large and representative congregation this afternoon at St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral for the funeral service of the late George A. Woodland, prominent pioneer citizen, whose death occurred suddenly this week. The remains will be forwarded aboard the steamer Prince Rupert tonight to Vancouver where interment will be made. The widow and her niece, Miss Gertrude McKenzie, will accompany the body south.

Rev. G. A. Rix D.D., Bishop of Caledonia, gave the address at the service in the the Cathedral which was conducted by Very Rev. James B. Gibson, the Dean. The choir was in attendance under the direction of A. J. Lancaster, choir master. Peter Lien presided at the organ. Hymns were "Abide With Me" and "Lead Kindly Light."

From the Cathedral, the flag-draped casket with arms, military decorations and poppy wreath, in view of deceased's military service, was removed to the Masonic Temple where it will lie in state until this evening when a Masonic service will be held before the departure of the steamer for the south.

The pallbearers this afternoon were William Bailey Russell M. Smith, William Millar, S. C. Thomson, Dan Kristmannson and H. W. Birch.

The Masonic pallbearers tonight will be James H. Thompson, G. P. Tinker, Frank Dibb, W. R. McAfee, Alex McRae and G. H. Munro, past masters of the local lodges.

There will be a guard of honor provided by First North B. C. Regiment.

Little Boy Of Skidegate Dies

Five Year Old Boy Passes Away Not Long After His Father

SKIDEGATE MISSION, April 9:—The people of Skidegate and district were shocked by the death of little George Price on March 26 at 9:30 a.m. He was the only son of George Price, who died about five months ago, and a grandson of Thomas Moodie, a well respected citizen of Skidegate Mission.

The funeral took place on March 28 at 2 p.m.

Although only a boy of five and a half years, George was a regular attendant at the Sunday School.

A very fitting tribute was given him when the Sunday School scholars under the supervision of the teachers sang "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" at the grave-side.

The whole village sympathizes with his widowed mother, little sister, grandfather and many relatives and friends.

Mussolini Refuses Request Of Geneva to Check Invasion—Claims Abyssinians Were Latest to Take Initiative in Warfare.

GENEVA, April 9: (CP)—The League of Nations committee of thirteen today decided to send a supreme appeal to Italy and Ethiopia to abstain from using poison gas in the African war. This action, suggested by Capt. Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, was approved without passing upon allegations that Italy had already used poison gas in the invasion of Ethiopia.

In Rome it was authoritatively said that Premier Benito Mussolini will refuse to check the invasion before April 14 as the League requests and will assert that Ethiopia has taken the initiative in the war this month.

BOAT FARE EXCESSIVE

Port Clements Merchant Shows Where Prince Rupert is Losing District Business

The present high steamship fare, which people of the Queen Charlotte Islands consider excessive beyond reason, is keeping many of the residents there from coming to Prince Rupert to do business and make purchases and the city, as a result, is losing considerable business, it is declared by Horatio Ross, well known Port Clements merchant, who is spending a couple of days in town. If it were not for this high fare, Mr. Ross says, many more people would visit Prince Rupert. On account of the short run and in view of the substantial mail subsidy which the steamers plying between Prince Rupert and the Islands receive, the people of the Islands do not believe they are getting value for the fare which they have to pay.

The people of the Islands are manifesting much interest in the proposed pulp mill undertaking at Prince Rupert, says Mr. Ross. Its consummation would undoubtedly mean a great deal of activity on the Islands as a source of timber supply.

It is Mr. Ross' first trip off the Islands in fourteen years. He arrived on the Prince John yesterday morning and will be returning to Port Clements tomorrow night.

FOSTER FISHING INDUSTRY

We are in full agreement with G. W. Nickerson who, in addressing the Junior Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night, urged the young men to use their influence to try to secure the establishment of the industry at Prince Rupert. As it was, much of the benefit from the fishing in this district went to the south. The great thing was to make Prince Rupert the distributing point for fish, both canned and fresh, and to have it shipped away in vessels calling here from Europe.

It has been mentioned before that Prince Rupert is located in the centre of this industry but that the city does not benefit from its location as much as it should. Since writing a previous article on this subject the News has received protests from one or two canneries that spend a good deal of money in Prince Rupert. Local people will appreciate this. What is needed, however, is to bring pressure to bear to secure the great part of the business in Prince Rupert. It can be done if the people here are in earnest in the matter.

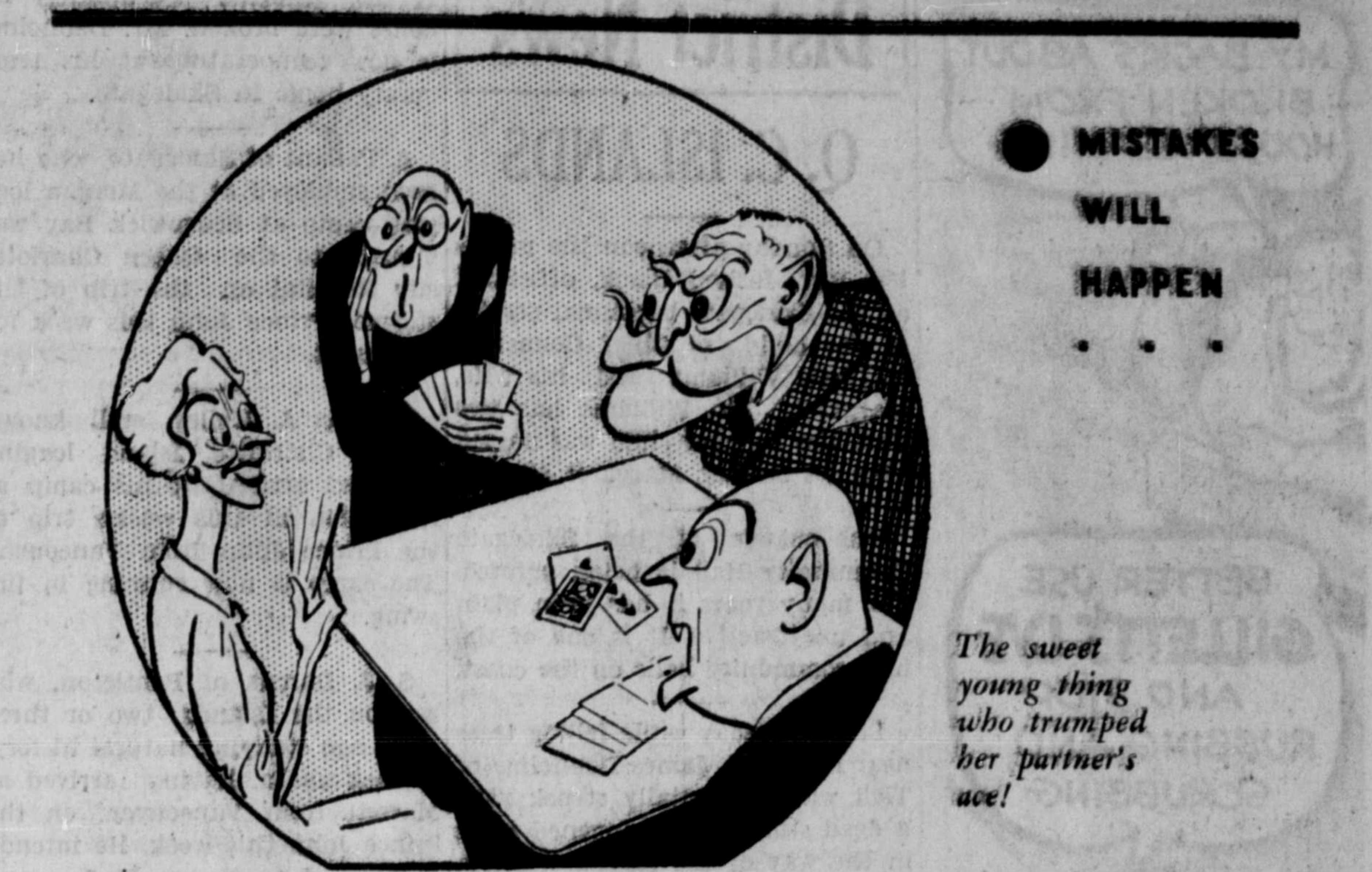
